Dear People of God,

In preparing for a recent homily I was reminded of what studying the Bible, particularly in a group setting, has meant to me in my life. It has been huge. I grew up in the Church but first really became interested in the Bible after a renewal of faith that occurred in my early twenties. It was at that time, in the context of an ecumenical home Bible study group, that the Bible came alive to me, or actually I suppose I came alive to it!

I came to understand that the Bible is a history book, but it is much more than that. In addition to providing a history of the Jewish people, and of the life of Jesus and the early Church, the Bible is the vehicle through which we hear from God. For that reason we call it the Word of God, but technically the Word of God comes to us from the Bible through what scholars call historical critical interpretation. What that means is that we interpret the Bible considering its historical and cultural context and the intention of the author toward the group to whom he was writing.

The reformer John Calvin expressed a belief in what he called "the plain sense" of the Bible. What he said about that was that he believed that a reasonably intelligent person could read and understand the Bible from the plain sense of the text. That is, it doesn't require a great deal of interpretation or many tools or much scholarly input for a person to understand the Bible. I very much agree with Calvin about that.

You see, even without knowing the intention of the author nor anything about the people to whom he was writing, one can

read something like, "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for thou art with me, thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me," and understand thoroughly at a visceral or heart level that God's presence is worth everything to us during times when death encroaches upon us through our own deaths or through the deaths of those we love.

That is just one of thousands of examples that illustrate how the Bible fosters our intimate relationship with God. If you would like to become better acquainted with God through the Bible, I recommend that you

purchase a study Bible. I am partial to *The HarperCollins Study Bible*. The great thing about a study Bible is that you will be reading along and will have a question about something written in, say verse 4. With a good study Bible you simply look to the bottom of the page to a reference note for verse 4 and often it answers your question.

I will guarantee you that the more time you spend reading and studying the Bible, the more you will come to love it as God speaks to you through it. With a good study Bible, by reading the introduction to each book, the text and the notes at the bottom of the page, you can easily make your way through the Bible and increase your knowledge of it, but more importantly you will no doubt grow in your relationship with our wonderful God. People often find that reading through the Gospel of John is a good place to start.

The Coal Basket and The Bible

The story is told of an old man who lived on a farm in the mountains of Kentucky with his young grandson. Each morning Grandpa was up early sitting at the kitchen table reading from his old worn-out Bible. His grandson who wanted to be just like him tried to imitate him in any way he could.

One day the grandson inquired, “Papa, I try to read the Bible just like you but I don’t understand it, and what I do understand I forget as soon as I close the book. What good does reading the Bible do?”

The Grandfather quietly turned from putting coal in the stove and said, “Take this coal basket down to the river and bring back a basket of water.”

The boy did as he was told even though all the water leaked out before he could get back to the house. The grandfather laughed and said, “You will have to move a little faster next time,” and sent the boy back to the river with the basket to try again.

That time the boy ran faster but again the basket was empty before he returned home. Out of breath he told his grandfather that it was “impossible to carry water in a basket,” and he went to get a bucket instead.

The old man said, “I don’t want a bucket of

water; I want a basket of water. You can do that. You’re just not trying hard enough,” and he went out the door to watch the boy try again.

At that point the boy knew it was impossible, but he wanted to show his grandfather that even if he ran as fast as he could, the water would leak out before he got far at all. The boy scooped the water and ran hard, but when he reached his grandfather the basket was again empty. Out of breath he said, “See Papa, it’s useless!”

“So you think it is useless?” the old man said. “Look at the basket.”

The boy looked at the basket and for the first time he realized that the basket looked different. Instead of a dirty old coal basket, it was clean.

“Son, that’s what happens when you read the Bible. You might not understand or remember everything, but when you read it, it will change you from the inside out.”

That is the work of God in our lives: To change us from the inside out and slowly to transform us into the image of His Son. We should take time to read a portion of God’s word each day and to share our love with a friend.

Full of Worship Opportunities

Holy Week is the week leading up to the great feast in the Christian church, the Feast of the Resurrection or Easter Day. The first record of Holy Week services comes from a pilgrim named Egeria who traveled to Jerusalem in the fourth century. The Triduum or “three days” of Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Day begins at sundown on Maundy Thursday. Please join us for one or all of the days of special observance.

The Sunday of the Passion, Palm Sunday:

March 24 — “Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!” So begins the day of celebration commemorating Jesus’ triumphant entry into Jerusalem. We will gather on the lawn outside the church at 9:00 and 11:15 to proceed joyfully into the services. The tone turns however as we hear of Jesus’ betrayal and crucifixion. Holy Week begins today.

Reconciliation of a Penitent (confession):

The sacramental rite will be offered by appointment during Holy Week for those who wish to make a private confession as part of their preparation for Easter. If you’d like to schedule a time for confession please call Gary or Bob.

Wednesday in Holy Week:

March 27 — The Holy Eucharist with Healing Prayer is offered at 12:15 p.m.

Maundy Thursday:

March 28 — Service at 6:00 p.m.; Vigil from 7:00 - 8:00 p.m. As a sign of servanthood we

include the washing of feet (optional). Following the liturgy the altar is stripped, and Edwards Library is transformed into a chapel. You may observe a vigil in the library, keeping watch in the night as Jesus did with His disciples at Gethsemane.

Good Friday:

March 29 — The day marks the crucifixion of our Lord. We do not celebrate the Eucharist today but rather at 12:00 noon and at 6:00 p.m., we share a holy meal from the reserved Sacrament using the Liturgy for Good Friday. The church will be open from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. for those who wish to meditate on the death of Jesus.

Holy Saturday:

March 30 — Holy Saturday is a day of rest and quiet, the day when Jesus lay in the grave. A liturgy recalling those who have died takes place in the Urban Garden at 11:00 a.m.

Easter Day:

March 31 — Our celebration begins with the **Great Vigil and First Eucharist of Easter at 6:00 a.m.** The celebration continues with our regularly scheduled services at 7:45, 9:00, and 11:15 a.m. Bring bells to ring and flowers at 9:00 with which to “flower the cross.” Children ages three through fifth grade will enjoy an Easter Egg Hunt at 10:10 a.m.!

New Year Slow Start

January pledges were twenty percent under budget, while non-pledged and open offerings were nineteen percent under budget. When combined with \$1030 received for prior-year pledges, total contributions were nineteen percent or \$6588 under budget. When other income and building income are considered total income is \$7876 under budget.

Personnel expenses were over budget because of the payment of quarterly retirement premiums, whose budgeted costs are spread over three months. Overall expenses were \$38,722, which when compared to a budget of \$37,220 results in a negative variance of \$1501.

The net result for the month is a negative variance of \$9377.
