Jim Wallis, who wrote *God's Politics* that we read in Sunday School several years ago, is associated with Sojourners. Anyway you can imagine my delight when I read that both of the young people writing the article had found their Christian faith renewed by discovering and attending an Episcopal parish.

They talked about some of the things that churches are doing today to try to appeal to young adults. For the two of them our Episcopal Church, with its sacramental traditions and roots going all the way back to the early Church, is a huge attraction. Also the Episcopal Church's emphasis on mystery and on the living God, who is in many ways beyond the grasp of our finite human minds, made them and I would say makes all of us feel that as members

of the Episcopal Church and thereby as members of the Kingdom of God, we are part of something far bigger than ourselves.

There is something special about participating in rites of worship that date all the way back to Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River and his serving as the host at the Last Supper. We say that as a people we participate in *anamnesis*,

that Last Supper with Jesus and really sensing His presence with us as we receive Him in the sacrament of Holy Communion.

In participating in the Church Year we relive the waiting for His birth in Advent, the Incarnation of the living God into the world in the person of the baby Jesus at Christmas, the various manifestations of His glory in Epiphany, His forty days in the wilderness during Lent and most amazingly His death for us and His resurrection in us during Holy Week and the fifty days of Easter. Year after year we participate in that rhythm and even though we can't understand it all, time and again we are awed and amazed by it. Beloved, never be hesitant to invite someone to your church. For many have found the life that is life here.

The annual Blessing of the Animals offers individuals with pets an opportunity to reflect upon the positive impact that animals have on our



emotional and physical well-being. The annual event attracts a wide variety of animals and their human friends. Eye to eye a man and his dog or a woman and her cat are two creatures of love.

Grace Outreach Notes

GO Boxes - NetsforLife

We will collect our GO boxes on Sunday, April 7 at all three services. This year the funds collected from the GO boxes will be donated to NetsforLife. NetsforLife provides mosquito nets for use in sub-Saharan Africa to help people to avoid contracting malaria. Malaria remains a very deadly disease in that area. The NetsforLife program, with help from corporations, foundations and faith communities like Episcopal Relief and Development, focuses on helping to end the spread of the disease. NetsforLife has reduced the malaria-related death rate by 45% in communities where the organization is active. Remember that any spare change that you put in your GO box will be combined with spare change from other members of the parish. The combination can make a difference in the lives of people who are currently being exposed to malaria. Fruit for BackPacker Program

Our Backpacker program currently serves more than 40 children each week. The children in the program are students at Jones Elementary School who have been identified by school staff as being in danger of going hungry on weekends when they do not have access to the school food program. Grace Outreach provides enough food for the weekends for each of the students. We are able to obtain much of the food from MANNA Food Bank. However MANNA does not usually have fresh fruit. Since we want to provide the students with balanced meals, we like to include fresh fruit. If you would like to help to fill the need, please either purchase fresh fruit or make a monetary donation. If you bring fruit for the program, please leave it in the kitchen before 5:00 on Thursday afternoons when we pack the bags. Please label the fruit "Backpackers." If you would prefer to make a monetary donation to help to defray the cost of the fruit, please write a check payable to Grace Episcopal Church and write "Backpacker program" on the memo line. We are thankful for your help with the program.

Don't miss Mary's presentation on April 14 during the Sunday School hour.

When I left Asheville four and a half years ago for college, I never dreamed that I would travel halfway around the world and co-found a non-profit organization. In fact as I prepared for my graduation from UNC-Chapel Hill last spring, I still didn't know what I wanted to do with my life. It was only when I stopped trying to figure it out for myself and started listening that God made it clear. And that's how just two days after graduation I found myself boarding a plane to Cape Town, South Africa.

The purpose of my internship in South Africa was threefold. The main purpose was to do a feasibility study for a tutoring program in one of the poor townships just outside Cape Town. As a

journalism major I also captured people's stories through articles in South African newspapers, a documentary and a blog (http://maryinsouthafrica.wordpress.com/). It was also a mission trip. I worked with a high school youth group and a sports ministry organization, and I learned what it means to love others as Christ does.

South Africa was different from any other place where I'd traveled. Though the country is said to be leading economic development in Africa, there are still many impoverished areas. We worked in a township called Ocean View. The township isn't actually on the ocean. It was given its name when it was founded in the 1970s because its residents had been displaced from their seaside homes.

Even though apartheid ended nearly 20 years ago, the brokenness it caused is still apparent. Ocean View is the kind of community where people live in tin "windy houses" meant for outdoor storage, where gangs, drugs and alcoholism are rampant and where children aren't asked what they want to be when they grow up. Combatting those problems can be a daunting task. But I learned that in that environment, even a little encouragement can make a world of difference.

During my stay I worked with a group of high school girls from rough backgrounds. We planned a "Girls' Day" dedicated to them—encouraging them, listening to them, feeding them and taking them to the beach. At the

end of that day several of them told us that it had been the best day of their lives.

On another occasion we took them on a tour of the University of Cape Town. Though they were high school sophomores, juniors and seniors, it was the first time that many of them had thought about what they would do after graduation from high school. I believe that that's how the cycle of poverty can change—it starts with giving hope and opportunity to a small group of students and it expands from that.

Now I'm back in the US and along with a full-time job in Raleigh, I'm working to establish Amanzi Education Center. One of my team members will move to Ocean View permanently in May

— a whole day dedicated to the girls. Many of them said that it was the best day of their lives.

to implement the program. The goal is to empower underprivileged high school students with education, support and tools and to give them opportunities they wouldn't otherwise have. I'm inviting my Grace family to join me. I will speak about my ministry in South Africa and Amanzi Education Center during the Sunday School hour on April 14 in the parish hall. I hope to see you there.

We dress in robes, attend synagogue (learn from a real Rabbi!), bake our own bread, pay shekels to the tax collector, create crafts in the market, and explore the teachings of Jesus through drama, songs, games and storytelling.



An Ecumenical Experience

Marketplace 29 A.D. began in 1998 as a collaboration among Grace

Covenant Presbyterian, Grace Episcopal, First Presbyterian, and the Basilica of St. Lawrence. The program began with fewer than thirty children but we have really grown! Marketplace now averages seven to ten churches and has grown to serving a hundred and fifty children!

How can you participate?

With many children representing many congregations, Marketplace is truly a wonderful ecumenical experience. The experience is rich for both the children and the many volunteers. There are several ways that you can participate in the wonderful event, and no experience is necessary!

Volunteer Opportunities — Needed for all four days:

Tribal Parent/Tribal Assistant – Be a vital part of the experience. Usher a preschool or elementary group of ten to the synagogue, the shops, the storyteller and the musician. Enjoy the excitement of the market, and delight in the creations of your tribe. Help the children to knead the daily bread, and then enjoy it with them in your tribal tent. Tribal Parent/Assistant training required: June 13 from 9:45 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

Needed for one, two, three or four days:

Shopkeeper – Enjoy crafts? Choose an already prepared craft, and invite children to sample your wares. No experience necessary. From belt-making to food-sampling, be a part of the shops! We will provide a brief training. Shopkeeper training optional: June 19 from 10 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

Drama – Join the drama troupe as we act out the daily Bible stories. Older children (sixth - twelfth grades) love to play the parts and are especially welcome.

Registration – Assist with registration and welcoming the children to Marketplace, 29 A.D.

Helper (Kitchen, Hallway, Nursery) – Want to be a part of the action but can only spare a couple of days? Be an extra pair of hands, and help wherever the need arises.

Beggar, Tax Collector, Roman Soldier (adults only) – Have a talent for drama? Help enliven the atmosphere of Marketplace, 29 A.D. We provide the costumes!

Set-Up or Take-Down – Come to drape cloth around our tents, tack a mural to the wall or set up the pottery area. Set-up will be on Friday morning, June 21 and Sunday afternoon, June 23. Take-down will be on Thursday afternoon, June 27.

March Endowment Fund Honorees and Contributors

Grace Church is a truly generous community of faith. It is from the income from the Endowment Fund that distributions will be available for needs that fall outside the church's annual operating budget.

We gratefully recognize those persons contributing to the Endowment Fund in March: Joyce and Walt Noble.

Continued Slow Start

All general contributions were under budget in February: pledges \$4740 under budget; non-pledged offerings \$1221 under budget; and open offerings \$568 under budget. When those were combined with other income that was \$33 under budget, total income for February was \$6561 under budget. Year to date (January and February) total income is \$14,437.17 under budget. Because total February expenses were \$3681 under budget, we ended the month with a \$1379 shortfall.

Year to date a net \$10,758 shortfall exists. Going forward our hope is that income will increase to cover the ongoing expenses of the parish.
