Dear People of Grace,

By the time you get this there should be some "for real" signs of spring all around! We have had sporadic days of winter and spring over and over again since January, but now, as the trees begin to leaf out and flowers start to bloom, it is easy to see the resurrection of nature all around us, which coincides beautifully with our celebration of Jesus' resurrection.

Those of you who have been in the Episcopal Church will remember that we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus not just on Easter Day, but for fifty days starting with Easter Day and ending with the Day of Pentecost on June 4. of Pentecost on June 4. The resurrection of Jesus hold us forever in is simply too wonderful to celebrate for just one, or even for a few days.

During these fifty days of Easter, we hear readings in church of what happened after Jesus' resurrection from the dead. We hear about the resurrection appearances in the Gospels which cover the forty days between Jesus' resurrection and His Ascension into heaven. And then, during those last ten days after His Ascension, we hear about how, before He ascended, Jesus told His followers to wait there in Jerusalem to be baptized with the Holy Spirit, which of course, happened on the Day of Pentecost.

In the readings from The Acts of the Apostles, which we read in worship during the Easter season, we hear about Jesus' Ascension into heaven, the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the Church, and how the Church spread the message of Jesus' life, death and resurrection from Jerusalem outward.

As we think of the resurrection and how we celebrate the fifty days of Easter, we might ask ourselves the "so what" question.

Jesus was raised from the dead. So what? What does that have to do with you and me and the rest of the world?

To answer that question, we might turn to what we call the commentary section of the New Testament — the epistles written by St. Paul and others. The writers of the epistles are those who reflected upon the great truths of the Christian faith, the

foremost of which is The 'so what' of Christ's resurrection from the dead

> I would suggest that we all turn in our Bibles to First Corinthians, St. Paul's first letter to the Church at Corinth. First Corinthians, chapter 15, is St. Paul's great chapter on the resurrection. We can all benefit from reading and meditating on that passage during the Easter Season.

I am including a sample from First Corinthians 15 to whet your appetites for this passage.

"If corpses can't be raised, then Christ wasn't, because He was indeed dead. And if Christ weren't raised, then all you're doing is wandering about in the dark, as lost as ever. It's even worse for those who died hoping in Christ and resurrection, because they are already in their graves. If all we get out of Christ is a little inspiration for a few short years, we're a pretty sorry lot. But the truth is that Christ has been raised up, the first in a long legacy of those who are going to leave the cemeteries." (I Cor. 15:16-20, The

The "so what?" of the resurrection, Beloved, is that death cannot hold us forever in its grip. We are among "those who are leaving the cemeteries!" Thanks be to God!



# Learn More about Palm Sunday

**Hosanna!** This is a Hebrew word, not New Testament Greek. Its literal translation is "lead us!" Naturally this held political implications in the mind of both the crowds and the authorities, causing a rather tense situation. Upon entrance to the Temple, which was closely monitored by the Roman garrison to the north, the children were the only ones shouting "lead us!" As it turns out, children could not be arrested and tried under Roman law. It is a perfectly reasonable request of the Lord, as is His command to His disciples found elsewhere: "Follow Me!"

The use of the foal of a donkey held two historical significances: First, there was a current debate among rabbis and scholars as to how far one could carry the bread of the Passover without violating the laws against working on the Sabbath. One school of thought insisted it could only be within your house; another held that it could be within the city walls; and the third allowed it to be carried anywhere within the city limits so long as it was on a beast of burden. Bethany being right on the city limits, Jesus implied by His actions that He in fact was the bread of the Passover, a theme re-asserted in the Lord's Supper only a few nights later. Secondly, it was tradition in the ancient Near East for a conquering leader to ride into a defeated city on a horse. A returning monarch entering his recaptured and rescued city however, rode in on a donkey. Again by His action Jesus identified Himself as a rightful King, returning to reclaim what was His own.

Palm Branches as well had two significances: They were a national symbol of independence for about a century from the time the Maccabeans drove the Greeks out until the rise of Roman power. In Jesus' day they continued to be an emblem of nationalism and anti-Roman fervor, and it is not uncommon to find a palm leaf stamped over the portrait of Caesar on coins from Jerusalem from that time period. The second meaning of the Palm, and most likely the

reason it was such a powerful national emblem from the time of the restoration of the Temple, is suggested even in its modern name: phoenix dactylifera. Even in ancient times this was referred to as the phoenix tree because of the shape of the leaf and its ability to grow new foliage even after being burned. The idea of rising from death was meaningful for the nation to be sure, and far more significant to early Christians who continued to use the phoenix (plant and legendary bird) as a symbol of the resurrection. On the occasion of Jesus' entry to the city, He was the only one who fully realized how significant this was.


I ask you to join me in the journey of faith as part of the Jesus Movement in supporting the Good Friday Offering again this year.

# Eleven Interesting Facts About Easter

- 1. Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ in the Christian religion.
- 2. Eggs have been seen as ancient symbols of fertility, while springtime is considered to bring new life and rebirth.
- 3. Americans annually spend \$1.9 billion on Easter candy. That's the second biggest candy holiday after Halloween.
- 4. 70% of Easter candy purchased is chocolate.
- 5. 76% of Americans think the ears of a chocolate bunny should be the first part to be eaten.
- 6. Egg dyes were once made out of natural items such as onion peels, tree bark, flower petals, and juices.
- 7. There's much debate about the practice of dyeing chicks. Many hatcheries no longer participate, but others say that it isn't dangerous to the chick's health because the dye only lasts until the chicks shed their fluff and grow their feathers.
- 8. The first story of a rabbit (later named the "Easter Bunny") hiding eggs in a garden was published in 1680.
- 9. Easter takes place on a Sunday, after the 40-day period called Lent. Lent is referred to as a time of fasting, but participants focus more on giving up one significant indulgence.

Pledge receipts through the end of February totaled \$48,523 compared to projected pledges of \$57,174. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$66,488, while we projected income to be \$70,823. We ended the month with a negative income variance of \$4335.

The negative variance thus far was offset by expenses which were less than budgeted amounts by \$2319. When these savings were applied to the negative income variance of \$4335 our income less expenses resulted in a deficit of \$2016 at the end of February.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.
