Dear People of Grace,

It's too bad that the word disciple and discipline come from the same root word. After all, we sometimes use the word discipline for punishment, as in, "she disciplined the child for his behavior." The word disciple theologically means "follower" or "student". Wouldn't you agree that someone being someone's student or even following someone down the street is

a choice? Think about it. Someone is out there leading. You can choose to follow that person or not. It's hard to compel someone to follow someone else. They pretty much have to choose to follow that person because they want to or at least decide to.

Therefore, being a disciple or follower or student of Jesus is not something that someone or something outside of yourself can really compel you to do. The Church cannot compel you to follow Jesus. Your friends or relatives, as hard as they may try, cannot compel you to be Jesus' disciple. It is a choice that each of

us makes, to follow Jesus or not. This is really the difference between Law and Gospel, isn't it? The Law is external, something outside of ourselves telling us what we OUGHT to do. The Law has sometimes been caricatured as "a bony finger shaking in our faces". The choice to be Jesus' disciple cannot be forced by something outside of us telling us we ought to do it. The Gospel comes to us by invitation, just as it did to Jesus' disciples as He said to them and says to us, "Come and follow me."

As you may have heard me say before, the Reformers, and maybe even St. Paul himself overstated themselves to make a point. One of the watchwords of the Reformation was "By faith alone!" St. Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians writes, "By grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing, it is the gift of God, lest anyone should boast" (Eph. 2:8-9). The wonderful thing about what the Reformers and St. Paul are saying about faith is that our salvation, our right standing with God, is based on what

Christ did in His death and resurrection rather than on the good works that we may do. As God's forgiven ones, our sins are forgiven, past, present and future, because of our faith in Christ. That is a wonderful thing.

But there is also the path that Christ invites us to take. Here, Christianity becomes like most of the other major religions. There is a Way. In fact, early Christians, you may remember, were called "Followers of the Way." Jesus proclaimed Himself to be that Way, that path. It is the path of grace and love and prayer and worship and humility and service to others. Jesus said that He came, not

to be served, but to serve and that those who follow His path will be servants of others as He was.

We gather together each week to worship God and to remind one another who we are as disciples or servants of Jesus and servants of others. We are strengthened by Word and Sacrament each week to go in peace and to love and serve the Lord. We invite others to come and follow Jesus with us as we discover what it means to be disciples or followers or students of the Savior of the world.

Positive Trend Continues

Pledge receipts through the end of March totaled \$105,337 compared to projected pledges of \$82,250. Considering all income sources, income received to date totaled \$135,655, while we projected income to be \$100,613. We ended the month with another positive variance in overall projected income of \$35,042. Even considering the large donation which we received earlier, we are still experiencing a very positive trend in pledged income.

The positive income variance thus far was reduced somewhat by expenses which were greater than budgeted amounts by \$12,154. When subtracted from the positive income variance of \$35,042, our income less expenses resulted in a still healthy surplus of \$22,888 for the year.

While we have begun the year in a very positive manner, we do need to be aware that a single donation has greatly influenced our financial position. We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.


A Request from Our Depositors

Pentecost: Sunday, May 15

Pentecost is the day the church was born. Christ was crucified, rose again, spent forty days with his disciples, then ascended to heaven. Pentecost followed immediately. For two millennia, Christians have been celebrating the church's birthday with joy and exuberance. Pentecost takes place fifty days after Easter Sunday.



Our Pentecost Story. According to the book of Acts, the Church came into being on the day of Pentecost. As 120 worshipers, including the Disciples, were fasting and praying in an upper room in Jerusalem, the Holy Spirit descended upon them in a violent rushing wind that was heard throughout the city. Small flames of fire rested upon their heads, and they began to speak in other languages. As crowds came to investigate the commotion, the Apostle Peter spoke to them about Jesus and exhorted them to repent. Three thousand realized the truth of Peter's words that day and became followers of Jesus.

Pentecost History. Believed to be the oldest feast in the Church, the story of Pentecost dates back to the first century A.D. The feast of Pentecost coincided with the Jewish Feast of Weeks, which occurs fifty days after the Passover. According to Jewish tradition, the Ten Commandments were given to Moses fifty days after the first Passover, which freed the Hebrews from their bondage in Egypt.

As the Hebrews settled into Canaan, the feast became a time to honor the Lord for blessing the fruits of their labors. In Palestine, the grain harvest lasted seven weeks beginning with the barley harvest during the Passover and ending with the harvesting of the wheat at Pentecost (wheat was the last to ripen). Pentecost was thus the concluding festival of the grain harvest.

Named Pentecost by Greek-speaking Jews, it is also known in Jewish tradition as Feast of the Fiftieth Day, Feast of Harvest, Feast of Weeks, Day of the First-Fruits, the closing festival, and the closing season of the Passover.

Some Pentecost Traditions. The main sign of Pentecost in the West is the color red. It symbolizes joy and the fire of the Holy Spirit. In the Orthodox tradition, the liturgical color used at Pentecost is green.

In the Middle Ages, cathedrals and great churches throughout Western Europe were fitted with a peculiar architectural feature known as a Holy Ghost hole; a small circular opening in the roof that symbolized the entrance of the Holy Spirit into the midst of the assembled worshipers. At Pentecost, these Holy Ghost holes would be decorated with flowers, and sometimes a dove figure was lowered through into the church while the story of Pentecost was read.

In Italy, rose petals are scattered from the ceilings of the churches to recall the miracle of the fiery tongues. In France, trumpets are blown during the Divine service to recall the sound of the mighty wind which accompanied the Descent of the Holy Spirit. In the northwest of England, church and chapel parades called Whit Walks take place.
