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## Parson to Person

Dear People of Grace,

As some of you know, I am a movie buff. Good movies, like good books, take us to other worlds, don't they? I can't remember for sure, but I don't think I have ever actually recommended a movie to you. That's pretty amazing in itself, as I see a lot of movies and some are worth recommending.

But now, I would like to recommend the movie called The Shack to all of you

who are thirteen years or older (as the PG-13 rating suggests). I know I mentioned this in a homily on April 23 and recommended it to those present at that service. But, as I thought about what to write for this month's

"Parson to Person," that movie came to mind again.

It is based on the book of the same name that you may have read sometime in the last few years. It is about a man who is stuck in grief and anger after his child is abducted and killed. What I like about the movie is how honestly this family's and, especially, this man's grief is portrayed. It is probably hard for us to imagine anything worse than losing a child in this way.

This man is particularly angry with God. He cannot imagine how or why God let such a terrible thing happen. The man is sent an invitation to come to the shack where his daughter was murdered and the invitation was signed "Papa," which is his family's familiar name for God. The man goes to the shack and is led into what appears to be another dimension where he meets the three members of the Trinity - Father, Son and

Holy Spirit.

As a priest in the Church, what I liked about the three members of the Trinity is how they listened to and responded to this man with love. The filmmakers, in my opinion, did a great job in casting the actors who played the members of the Trinity. I saw the movie by myself and remember thinking that I wish I had seen it with someone because

That said, when it comes out in video, my plan is to have a movie evening where we can watch it together and talk about it. I would love to hear what others

think about some of the things said and done in the film. It will be a great springboard into numerous topics like why God allows evil to exist and why bad things sometimes happen to the innocent and how we are sometimes quick to pass judgement on others, including passing judgment on God.

So, if you would like to and get a chance to see it, I would recommend it to you. If you don't see it now, perhaps we can see it together and have a discussion about it in the parish hall sometime this fall. In the meantime, it would be hard to see this film and not come away with this thought, "God is good. All the time. All the time. God is good."



### The Presiding Bishop's 2017 Easter Message

"God came among us in the person of Jesus to start a movement. A movement to change the face of the earth. A movement to change us who dwell upon the earth. A movement to change the creation from the nightmare that is often made of it into the dream that God intends for it."

It's taken me some years to realize it, but Jesus didn't just happen to be in Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday. He wasn't on vacation. He wasn't just hanging out in town. Jesus was in Jerusalem on purpose. He arrived in Jerusalem about the time of the Passover when pilgrims were in the city. When people's hopes and expectations for the dawn of freedom that Moses had promised in the first Passover might suddenly be realized for them in their time.

Jesus arranged his entrance into Jerusalem to send a message. He entered the city, having come in on one side of the city, the scholars tell us, at just about the same time that Pontius Pilate made his entrance on the exact opposite side of the city. Pilate, coming forth on a warhorse. Pilate, with soldiers around him. Pilate, with the insignias of Rome's Empire. Pilate, representing the Caesars who claimed to be son of god. Pilate, who had conquered through Rome the people of Jerusalem. Pilate, representing the Empire that had taken away their freedom. Pilate, who represented the Empire that would maintain the colonial status of the Jewish people by brute force and violence.

Jesus entered the city on the other side, not on a warhorse, but on a donkey, recalling the words of Zechariah:

Behold your King comes to you Triumphant and victorious is He Humble and riding on a donkey

Jesus entered the city at the same time as Pilate to show them, and to show us, that God has another way. That violence is not the way. That hatred is not the way. That brute force and brutality are not the way.

Jesus came to show us there is another way. The way of unselfish, sacrificial love. That's why he entered Jerusalem. That's why he went to the cross. It was the power of that love poured out from the throne of God, that even after the horror of the crucifixion would raise him from death to life.

God came among us in the person of Jesus to start a movement. A movement to change the face of the earth. A movement to change us who dwell upon the earth. A movement to change the creation from the nightmare that is often made of it into the dream that God intends for it.

He didn't just happen to be in Jerusalem on that Palm Sunday. He went to Jerusalem for a reason. To send a message. That not even the titanic powers of death can stop the love of God. On that Easter morning, he rose from the dead, and proclaimed love wins.

So you have a blessed Easter. Go forth to be people of the Resurrection. Follow in the way of Jesus. Don't be ashamed to love. Don't be ashamed to follow Jesus.

Have a blessed Easter. And bless the world. Amen.

### **Bishop McLoughlin's Message on Immigration**

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In the past five months as your bishop, I have traveled extensively throughout Western North Carolina, visiting parishes and exploring the various communities that encompass our diocese. I am continually blessed by the opportunity to learn and know your congregation's story as well as the unique, personal narratives from many of our lay leaders. These stories have deepened my appreciation for the grace that flows through this wonderful diocese.

I also hope that through our conversations and prayers, you have heard my story and witnessed the grace of God that flows through my life. I hope you have come to know that it is not my custom to officially address every issue discussed in the public square. As your bishop, I value "the middle way," recognizing that our church is a community that welcomes all people, in the diversity of their convictions, to join together at the Lord's Table and share in the one bread and the one cup.

Nevertheless, I must speak out and stand firm in solidarity with the immigrants among us and the refugees seeking a safe harbor for their families.



As you might know, I am the son of a refugee. In 1961, my mother fled Cuba and the oppressive, communist regime of Fidel Castro. Along with other members of her family, my mother lost all she had and risked her life in pursuit of freedom and the possibility to realize her potential. My family made their way to Puerto Rico, where they were welcomed and given an opportunity to become citizens of the United States and contribute to the common good. And all along the journey, the Church demonstrated the radical welcome of Jesus, which profoundly shaped their new lives.

From the very first time I introduced myself to you, I shared my belief that I am called to be a bishop who not only proclaims the Gospel in words, but also in actions. This principle was set out in my ordination, when I was asked, "Will you boldly proclaim and interpret the Gospel of Christ, enlightening the minds and stirring up the conscience of your people?" Ever since, I have taken seriously how we nurture our lives as disciples of Jesus, as well as explore innovative ways to stand alongside and serve those in need.

Our Lord Jesus served within an ancient tradition that firmly welcomed immigrants and refugees. "The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19). Jesus himself was clear when he said, "I was a stranger, and you welcomed me" and "that which you did to the least of these, you did to me" (Matthew 25). We put our faith into action when we demonstrate radical hospitality and solidarity for all people, including the immigrant and refugee. We put our faith into action when we speak out against both hateful language and acts of bigotry.

Likewise, as Americans, one of our core values is echoed by the poem etched in the base of the Statue of Liberty: "give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free." My earlier years in law enforcement as well as serving at the Department of Justice emphasize that I will always honor the work necessary to ensure that proper safeguards are in place to help secure our nation. However, we also need to take every precaution not to impose restrictions or preferences based on religion, and we must always keep in mind that refugees and other immigrants have been a consistent source of creativity, ingenuity, and productivity - a true blessing to this nation and those who love it.

Finally, while there may be some in our communities who cheer the anti-immigrant sentiments and actions being unleashed, as your bishop, I entreat each of you to remember the grace of Christ that brought each of us into the safe harbor of God's love, and then I invite you to join me in proclaiming a Gospel message of peace and solidarity for the stranger and foreigner in our midst.



Pledge receipts through the end of March totaled \$81,749, compared to projected pledges of \$85,761. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$103,792, while we projected income to be \$106,235. We ended the month with a negative income variance of \$2,443.

The negative variance thus far was offset by expenses which were less than budgeted amounts by \$6,027. When these savings were applied to the negative income variance of \$2,443, our income less expenses resulted in a surplus of \$3,584 at the end of March.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.
