Dear People of Grace,

I want to put an end to a vicious rumor that has been circulating through the Church for years. The rumor is that you are supposed to take the summer off from church. I am writing here in May to let you know that we will be holding to our regular schedule of services during the summer. You will be able to come to Grace on any Sunday morning during this summer, and we will await you with Word and Sacrament! What a blessing, right!?!

All jokes aside, where did we ever get that idea? I think we send the wrong message by not continuing Sunday School for our children during the summer. Unfortunately, that has been the tradition in every Episcopal congregation I have ever served. In fact, I have never even heard of an Episco-

pal congregation who has Children's Sunday School during the summer. I say this as an observation and without judgment. But, as Arsenio Hall used to say on his comedy show, it is one of those things that makes you go, "Hmmmmmmmm."

What I really want to talk with you about in this month's "Parson to Person" are our new nametags. If you have not seem them, they are lovely and are displayed in the oak cabinet to the right as you walk through the foyer where our old nametags were displayed. These nametags are brightly colored with your name and an Episcopal shield on them. They are

magnetic, and unlike nametags with pins or clips, they will not tear your clothing.

Some of our snowbirds who spend the winters in Florida told me about these magnetic nametags a couple of years ago. What they liked about them is that they wore them home and put them on the refrigerator during the week. On the refrigerator, they become a reminder to pray for their parish church and are a quiet, gentle witness to guests in their homes. I would commend this prac-

tice to you and hope that you, too, will store your nametags on your refrigerators.

I believe wearing our nametags at church is the kindest thing we can possibly do for our guests and newcomers to Grace. They assist them in connecting names with faces. I am hoping to get some equally attractive stick-on nametags

with our Episcopal shield in color so that our guests and newcomers will be known to us as well.

An added benefit, of course, is that it will assist us in getting to know other parishioners by name, too.

If you discover we do not have a nametag for you, please let us know, and we will order one right away. If you don't want to wear your nametag, I would ask you to make this little sacrifice for our Lord Jesus, who has welcomed us and expects us to welcome others in His Name.

WORSHIP. Last month during worship, we let our acolytes know how much they were appreciated. The following, "10 Hidden Benefits of Acolyting," by Lisa Brown, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Pittsburgh, PA, is an excerpt from that service.

- 1. Acolyting is essential. Think of services where no acolytes are present. Much of the beauty and the glorious pageantry is missing. Processions without torches and crosses, and a Gospel reading without anyone to hold the book? Not as impactful. Furthermore, services without acolytes mean clergy have less support when preparing Communion and facilitating worship.
- 2. Acolyting allows young people to be active participants in worship. Everyone I spoke with echoed the same refrain. They felt much more engaged in the worship service by playing an active role rather than sitting in the pews. Even young people who reported that their parents had at first "forced" them to acolyte, expressed a newfound connection to worship and an enthusiasm for being at church.
- 3. Acolyting is intergenerational. A young person who acolytes is more likely to feel a connection to adults serving in other worship-related ministries: clergy, altar guild members, greeters, ushers, lectors, lay eucharistic ministers, and choir members.

This is truly important! Young people who connect to generations of adults in the congregation – rather than only forming relationships with youth peers – are more likely to feel a deep connection to their church community. Faith formation is strengthened by these intergenerational relationships.

- 4. Acolyting is relational. Acolyting helps young people form bonds with their peers, and with older and younger teens at church. Faith is meant to be practiced in community, and when a young person finds community for themselves, they are more likely to grow in faith. Young acolytes spoke proudly of having older teen friends who they knew through acolyting; older teens spoke proudly of acting as role models to the younger teens on their acolyte teams.
- 5. Acolyting is a family affair. Many young people recalled that they began to acolyte as a way of emulating older siblings. Families are more likely to attend and be connected to a church community when their children serve at the altar.
- 6. Acolyting allows kids to play with fire. Admit it, everybody likes to play with fire. But more importantly, when we trust young people with significant and potentially dangerous tasks, we show them that we see them as capable and competent. Inevitably they then live up to our expectations.
- 7. Acolyting makes a young person the center of attention. This surprised me. Many young people commented on how they enjoyed the feeling of having all eyes on them as they walked down the aisle with the cross. But isn't it supposed to be about God? Yes. So are we raising a generation of egomaniacs? I don't think so. Everyone's deepest desire is to be known, accepted, and loved. We want to have value in the eyes of others. Consider scripture and the many instances where Jesus paused to truly see and engage people who were otherwise invisible in society.

Often our young people feel unseen and unimportant in our faith communities. Acolyting allows them to be seen, to be important, and to make a difference in our communal worship.

8. Acolyting makes young people nervous. When asked what they wished other people knew about being an acolyte, many young people said they wished others knew how seriously they take their role. They try very hard not to make mistakes, and when they do, it weighs heavily on them. Yet in talking about lessons learned as an acolyte, one young person told me the following: "Whatever I do, even if I'm not sure of what I'm doing, as long as I do it with confidence, it will be ok." Or as Julian of Norwich wrote, "All shall be well."

- 9. Acolyting is formational, and teaches liturgy. In conversations replete with teenage slang, I also heard vocabulary that reflected a deep knowledge of liturgy and church tradition. In fact, one of the many reasons youth enjoyed being acolytes is that they learned more about the shape, structure, and flow of liturgy and worship traditions. Young people even mentioned some of their favorite services: Maundy Thursday and Good Friday – services often under-attended, especially by young people.
- 10. Acolyting is leadership. A component of good church leadership is being able to grow more fully into a ministerial role. The young people I spoke with reflected on their evolving acolyte responsibilities, and how moving from torch to Eucharistic server was "...a big leap." One young person explained how managing her acolyte team was an opportunity for her to demonstrate maturity and responsibility. Some young people spoke proudly of how acolyting encouraged them to seek out other roles in the church – as vergers, altar guild members, lay eucharistic ministers, and as members of the church's worship commission.

So Let There Be Acolytes! Acolyting is an essential ministry, and one that imbues our worship with beauty, solemnity, and pageantry. Acolytes support both clergy and laity, ensuring that the behind-the-scenes tasks and logistics of worship flow smoothly.

Most importantly, our acolytes, whether they are 9 or 19 years old, are leaders in our communities, worthy of appreciation and respect. Next time you see a young person who is an acolyte, make sure to compliment them and thank them for their ministry!

The Pentecost Experience!

Following the celebration of Easter, Christians look forward to Pentecost. Pentecost is a Christian festival celebrating the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to his disciples to help them in their faith, and in continuing their work of establishing the church and spreading the Gospel.

The date of Pentecost varies every year as it take place fifty days after Easter. The word "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word "pentekoste," which means "fiftieth." This year, Pentecost is Sunday, May 20.

The significance of Pentecost lies in the baptism of the disciples with the Holy Spirit. Jesus made the promise in John 14:26 saying, "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you. After dying on the cross and being resurrected, Jesus reappeared in front of the disciples to prove He was alive and well. He told them to wait in Jerusalem.

On the day of Pentecost, the disciples were waiting in an upper room in Jerusalem, bonded in prayer together,

when they heard the sound of a strong wind inside the house. This was the Holy Spirit and they were filled with it. They were given the gift of tongues. Immediately, Peter began his ministry, while the other disciples also spread the word, giving way to the birth of the church.

Today, Pentecost Sunday is a celebration of the gift of the Holy Spirit. This holiday unites Christians everywhere, reminding us that we, too, can receive the gift of the Holy Spirit and be witnesses to the ends of the Earth.

The Pentecost Experience at Grace

On May 20, Pentecost Sunday at Grace, many of us will be wearing crimson or deep red. This is the color of Pentecost. At the 9:00 and 11:15 a.m. services, listen for the wind! Through readings and participation from within the congregation, we will remember and rejoice in that powerful moment when, with coming of the Holy Spirit to the disciples, Christianity was born.

Pledge receipts through the end of March totaled \$106,869 compared to projected pledges of \$88,403. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$112,713, while we projected income to be \$103,247. We ended the month with a positive income variance of \$9465.


The positive variance in income was offset somewhat by expenses which were greater than budgeted amounts by \$2550. When these overages were applied to the positive income variance of \$9465 our income less expenses resulted in a surplus of \$6915 at the end of March.
