A Message from Fr. Gary

Alleluia, Christ is Risen!

I hope, as you read this greeting, you smiled and said, shouted, whispered or thought the response, "The Lord is Risen indeed!" This is the time in which we are living. Having just celebrated The Second Sunday of Easter when we read the story of Jesus coming into the locked Upper Room and giving "peace" to the scared and lonely disciples, we are reminded that Jesus comes to us where we are, as we are. No criticism or anger was uttered by our Risen Lord, only the "Peace" that passeth all under-

standing. "It already is."

Barth once remarked that to say the line from the creed, "I believe in the Holy Catholic Church" does not mean that we believe in the church. It means, rather, to believe that God is present and at work in the church, that "in this assembly, the work of the Holy Spirit takes place ... We do not believe in the Church: but we do believe that, in this congregation, the work of the Holy Spirit becomes an event."

Barth's words rang true for me some years ago. A preacher was invited to be the worship leader at a special evening communion service. The church staff had planned the service to be educational as well as worshipful. The idea was that, first, the congregation would gather in the sanctuary, and the pastor would give a brief talk about the meanings of the Lord's Supper. Then, we would go into the fellowship hall and be seated around tables for the service itself.

At each table there would be flour and other ingredients to form the dough for the communion loaves. The plan called for each table to prepare a loaf and, while the loaves baked in the church kitchen, the people at each table were to engage in various exercises designed to get them talking about their experiences in the faith.

It was a good idea, but like many well-planned events, things looked better on the drawing board than they turned out in reality. There were problems. Children at many tables began to play in the baking ingredients and white clouds of flour floated around the room. There were delays and the communion bread baked with agonizing slowness. The planners had dreamed of an event of excitement, innovation, peak learning and moving worship.

What happened was noise, exhaustion, and people making the best of a difficult situation. In

other words, despite the rosy plans, it was the *real* church worshipping down there in the basement.

Finally, the service ended, and with a little relief, the pastor was able to pronounce the benediction, "The peace of the Lord be with you." And just as he did, a child's voice from somewhere in the room called out strong and true, "It already is."

"It already is." With those words the service was transformed into an event of joy and holy mystery. That small voice captured what the Gospel of John is trying to say about that new 1st Century Church in the locked Upper Room. In the midst of a church that can claim nothing for itself, a church of noise, confusion, weariness, and even fear, the risen Christ comes to give peace. The risen Christ comes to inhabit our empty places, and then, as the child said, "It already is," and the church with nothing becomes the church with everything.

"It already is." Jesus' peace is already with us. For that we are thankful and we embrace the mystery of this Holy Season of Eastertide.

What a month April was at Grace Church! On April 11, the Vestry and the Discernment Committee shared a meal together and heard Canon Augusta Anderson lay out the road ahead as the Discernment Committee starts its work. I ask that we as Grace Church keep the members of the Discernment Committee and their families and support networks in our prayers as they start their journey. Also, on Palm Sunday, we collected the GO Boxes for the Outreach Committee. What a wonderful outpouring from our congregation: we collected \$782.00, mostly in pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters! Thank you!

Any English major can tell you that liturgy and theater are intricately linked. Coming out of one of the most meaningful Holy Week commemorations I have experienced, I can only say that this connection once again became very clear to me.

Anamnesis is the recreation of the events of the history of salvation. We share in this every time we celebrate the Eucharist. Holy Week raises this experience to another level. Father Gary used a term I hadn't heard before—the Triduum—to describe the three services allowing us to experience anamnesis through Jesus' last meal with his followers, his betrayal and crucifixion, and His triumphant resurrection. This year, Holy Week gave us a wonderful experience of anamnesis. From the wonderful Seder led by Sarah Wood (and planned and executed by Mark Silver and Shannon Townsend, with help from many others) through the liturgies for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday to the baptism of two catechumens and the first Alleluia of Easter at the Easter Vigil, we had the opportunity to participate in the story of our salvation.

So, back to that English-major thing.... The goal of theater is to elicit catharsis—the emotional roller-coaster and outpouring of emotions that we experience when we allow ourselves to get caught up in something. I can think of no better catharsis than the joy of Easter Sunday. From the packed sanctuary to the number of children lined up to flower the cross from Father Gary using an empty egg to tell the children about the Empty Tomb—"He ain't in there!"—to the laughter of Father Bob and Father Gary as they asperged the congregation following the Renewal of our Baptismal Vows, the sheer joy in the liturgy made this Easter one of the most memorable ones I've experienced.

Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

The Lord is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

Our Discernment Committee has had an excellent first meeting. Moving forward, please be watching early next month for a *very* important survey that needs a response from *all* of us! Your feedback is vital and will guide our search.

Grace's New Season!

Generous Bequest Affects Positive Variance

Pledge receipts through the end of March totaled \$97,032, compared to projected pledges of \$85,518. Considering all income sources, income received for the period totaled \$145,994, while we projected income to be \$106,626. We ended the month with a positive income variance of \$39,368. This positive variance is largely the result of a decision by the vestry to transfer a portion of a recently received bequest for:

- funding the discernment process (\$10,000);
- using a one-time donation from a parishioner (\$10,000) received for operations; and
- transferring the savings from 2018 (\$23,144) to use for operations in 2019.

These additions totaled \$43,144 and were included with income.

Expenses through the end of March totaled \$98,410, while we projected expenses to be \$108,979. These savings totaled \$10,569 for the first 3 months.

As a reminder, the budget is \$9,410 in deficit to provide support for key programs even though projected income was unavailable. As we proceed through the year, we will continue to monitor and adjust to eventually eliminate this shortfall. In the meantime, parish financial reports will reflect an unbalanced budget.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts as we journey through this transition period for our ministries at Grace.
