Parson to Person

Dear People of Grace,

Here we are approaching the middle of summer. Our mountains take on a lush beauty at this time of the year. When Astrid and I lived in Iowa and we would come to visit my parents in western North Carolina, I remember that the lushness of the vegetation was striking. Coming from the parched

Midwest, where all the grass that's not watered turns brown during the summer, it was amazing and wonderful to come home to where everything is so green at this time of the year. Let's get outside and enjoy it.

I want to say a word about summer church attendance. And as I do so, I am so incredibly thankful that what I have to say has everything to do with grace and absolutely nothing to do with guilt. Our God is a God of grace and abundance. God, in my opinion, has no

intention of controlling us, God's children, with guilt or fear of retribution. Jesus came to invite us into the abundant life of forgiveness and grace. Rather than constantly warning us of the danger of dying of thirst in the desert of a sinful existence, God invites us into the flowing living waters of grace and forgiveness. That way, when we *do* sin, Jesus comes to us, reaches down His hand, pulls us to our feet, forgives us and walks with us toward the refreshing waters which He has for us.

Regarding summer attendance at church, I recommend it to you. When you are in town on a Sunday morning, come join us for worship. Why? Because we are fed by God in worship. We hear God's Word read and talked about, and God speaks to us through it. We receive Jesus in the bread and wine of Holy Communion. How can receiving Him not

strengthen us for the coming week? We are encouraged by all the others who are present in worship and are reminded that we are not alone in our life of faith. What is the down side to showing up for worship on a Sunday morning? I don't think there is one.

I think the temptation for us is to take

the summer off from church because we need a break from the Sunday routine. In my opinion as your priest, this is absolutely not true. It is our wonderful God who feeds us and who sustains us in this life with God's presence. One way in which God feeds us is in our worship of God. To say we need a break from God is like saying a breastfeeding infant needs a break from the loving embrace and care of his or her mother. Like all temptations, it is something that kind of seems to makes sense, so we are apt to be tempted by

it. But, if we resist it, God rewards us with an even deeper experience of Love.

So, in closing, God will love you more than you can imagine if you come to church this summer, and God will love you more than you can imagine if you *don't* come to church this summer. The experience of the faithful for hundreds of years says you will benefit from coming to worship God whenever you are able. It is the beauty of creation, the warm temperatures of summer and time off with those we love, not staying away from worship, that help us be re-created during this season.

Soup Supper Annual Report

The first annual report of the **North Asheville Welcome Table** was recently sent to the Diocese's Human Hurt and Hope Committee, which funded the endeavor with a grant for the 2013-14 season. Twenty-one volunteers from our parish served simple soup suppers on thirty Monday evenings beginning September 23, 2013 and ending the season with a final meal on May 19. Several suppers were cancelled because of severe weather when travel was dangerous. Attendance ranged from thirteen to thirty-seven persons served. The cost per meal served was \$3.46 for a total expense of \$2,445.36. We are grateful for the faithful volunteers who have made this ministry possible. We have prayed, learned, laughed and enjoyed our share of soup and fellowship. The Simple Soup Supper Committee plans an August meeting to discuss plans for this fall. You are welcome to attend and offer your ideas. Watch for an announcement of the meeting.



Continued Slow Climb in Pledges

As of May 31, our year-to-date total income fell \$7,228 short of budget. Income from all sources for the five months ending May 31 was \$182,113, with projected income of \$189,341. Pledged income year-to-date was \$9,871 under budget.

Year-to-date expenses of \$178,362 were \$10,979 under budget primarily due to the timing of future Mission/Outreach and Building and Grounds costs. As we move forward, these budgeted needs will have to be met. As of May 31, the under-budget expenses resulted in a net positive operating variance of \$3,750. As noted, this will approach zero as needs come due.

It is our prayer that all budgeted expenses will be covered for the remainder of the year.
