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### Parson to Person

Dear People of Grace,

First, on a personal note, it looks like I may need another surgery for my foot problem. I know you have noticed me limping on some Sundays, and for a year or so now, I have been sitting to preach. Anyway, I would ask for your prayers as I make these medical decisons. I'll send an all-parish email if and when I have the surgery so that you can

include me in your prayers on that day.

Secondly, you will be receiving a mailing in July that is very important to us as a community of faith. We are updating our ministry data base. This mailing will direct you to a spiritual gifts inventory online. It would be a personal favor to me as your priest and a blessing to you, as well, I believe, to think through the spiritual gifts God has given you. There will also be a few questions to help you determine your personal style and passion.

The inventory questions will take about fifteen minutes to answer plus another fifteen minutes to look at the results and think about how they apply to you. The personal style questions and the passion questions together might take another twenty or thirty minutes. SO, what I am asking for is about an hour of your time during July to think about how God has wired you up for ministry.

This gift of an hour will accomplish two wonderful things: First, it will help you see how God has gifted you to serve in this world. This will give you the confidence to step forward as needed when a situation in your life calls for the gifts you have been given. Here is a simple example. Let's say you have the spiritual gift of leadership. Your personal style is "people/structured," which

means you prefer working with people rather than doing a task on your own and you are a structured or organized person. Let's also say you have a passion for making newcomers feel welcomed at church. In light of this spiritual gift of leadership, your people/structured personal style and your passion to welcome newcomers at church, one way in which you

might offer yourself is as a Vestry member. Then, this fall when you see something in the *Team* about either nominating someone for Vestry or stepping forward to serve, you may feel much more confident about submitting your name to be a Vestry member at Grace.

That is the personal benefit to giving God this hour to inventory your gifts and find where you fit in ministry.

The second, corporate part is that, as you mail this information back to us regarding your spiritual gifts, personal style and

passion, we will enter it into the computer here at Grace. Then, in the case of our example, as we look for people to serve on the Vestry, we can search this data base for people with the spiritual gift of leadership, find that you "fit," and ask you to consider serving. This way, since the Vestry is the leadership body of our church, we can have a parish that is actually *led by leaders*. What a concept!

This effort during July to have folks give an hour of their time to think about their ministry will bear much fruit IF, and this is the big "if" — IF folks will just do it. So, when this comes in the mail, like Nike says, JUST DO IT, and get your results back to us. I think you'll be glad you did.

#### **Grace Outreach**

Welcome Home Boxes for Homeward Bound. Homeward Bound is the main organization in WNC helping homeless men, women, and children move into housing. They operate on the "housing first" model and currently have a retention rate of 89%, which means that 89% of the people they have moved into permanent housing have stayed in housing rather than returning to homelessness. As part of this program, Homeward Bound provides their newly housed clients with supplies in the form of **Welcome Home Boxes**. These boxes contain household and cleaning supplies that are helpful for someone who is moving into a new home.

Homeward Bound is always in need of paper towels, sandwich bags, cleaning supplies, skillets, pots, and shower curtains. Donations of basic household items (such as sheets and towels) and cleaning supplies are gratefully accepted at 19 North Ann Street between 1:00 and 3:00 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. There is more

### Be a Snow-Day Hero

This past winter, during a snow event, I was volunteering at the church when a call came in from an elderly woman who was calling for herself and her mother. They were out of food and hungry. Because of the snow, they could not get to a food pantry. Was there something I could do?

Our church takes care of people through the local county-wide food and assistance agencies, but those agencies do not deliver to individuals. So, I called my son. He's a good young man who loves the challenge of helping others when the weather is bad. I gave him the names, address, and phone number of the women and sent him to the store.

Then, I went to work on the bigger issue: taking care of the needy in bad weather. Who likes the challenge of getting around in bad weather? Aside from my son, I thought of my brother, who, as a scout master, used to pack a deuce-and-a-half with provisions and scouts and head up into places like Nantahala in many feet of snow to go camping. So, I called the local scout district office and presented the situation. The district secretary ran it by the district director and got back to me. They were willing to announce the need at troop meetings but would assume no responsibility for coordination or communication...and no liability. They would pass on contact information. I was grateful.

I then went looking for 4-wheel drive vehicle clubs. There are none in Asheville. So I went to a dealership. The general manager was excited by the idea and said he would much rather spend his marketing and advertising budget

helping the community, than just selling cars.

Grace Episcopal Church is offering to coordinate between volunteers, the county-wide food and assistance agencies, and those who find themselves hungry and/or cold in a bad weather event.





### Thank You, Leeann!

Leeann Shearouse, who attends our 11:15 service, came up with the idea of having a beautiful waterfall in our Urban Memorial Garden, where we inter the ashes of members of Grace Church who wish to be buried there. We had a small pond there previously and rather than replace a failed liner, Leeann suggested a three-tiered waterfall.

Water Dance Creations built the waterfall, and Leeann, who is experienced in building and maintaining ponds like this, assisted them in the placement of the stones. Following installation, Leeann donated plants and landscaped around the waterfall, including a beautiful water lily in the new pond. She will also be donating special fish which will help in the balance of the water by consuming the algae which grows naturally in the pond. We welcome you to stop by to look at and listen to our new waterfall! To get to the Urban Garden, go down the steps from the foyer and straight through the glass door opposite the foot of the stairs.

The cost of the waterfall was underwritten by the Urban Memorial Garden Fund which consists of the one-time \$500 fees which our people pay to be interred there. We also have an architect, Keith Hargrove, working on a drawing for a new way to display the bronze plaques bearing the names of those interred in the garden. We were extremely careful to see that the footprint of the waterfall is between the areas where ashes were previously interred. No one's ashes were disturbed by the construction of the waterfall.

Our Love and Condolences to Martha Boyette in the loss of her mother who died on June 1. May our Lord comfort you in your grief.

Pledge receipts through the end of May totaled \$141,276 compared to budgeted pledges of \$146,638. Considering all income sources, income for the first five months totaled \$171,937; while we had projected income to be \$185,447. We ended May with a negative variance in income of (\$13,509).

The negative income variance for the first five months was offset by expenses in the first five months which were less than budgeted amounts by \$14,386. When added to the negative income variance of (\$13,509), year-to-date income less expenses resulted in an overall surplus for our first five months.

We are currently experiencing a surplus of \$877 while at this point in 2014 we experienced a positive balance of \$3750.

We are grateful that all needs have been met thus far and continue to look forward to another successful year in 2015.

### Facing the Furnace

Catherine Godfrey's continuing review of the 3-part book Walking with God Through Pain and Suffering by Timothy Keller

Part 2, "Facing the Furnace," starts where Part 1 left off: We, with our finite minds, cannot know the infinite mind of God. There are several key ideas in Keller's book worth exploring, like "the evil we see today was not part of God's original design." "The world is too fallen and deeply broken to divide into a neat pattern of good people having good lives and bad people having bad lives." "We should not expect to be able to grasp all God's purposes, but through the cross and gospel of Jesus Christ, we can know His love." "(Some people) tend to assign blame to victims of tragedy especially if it is not possible to punish a perpetrator. This comes from a normal human impulse to make sense of things, but it also stems from the deep human need to believe we are in control of our own lives."

I cannot relate here all of the bits of wisdom and comfort that Keller imparts, so I highly recommend you read this book...particularly if you struggle to understand and accept the pain and suffering in your own life, or the life of a loved one. As Keller says, "It is looking to Jesus that enables you to function in God's (world). It takes away selfpity, as we consider what He endured for us without complaining. If He endured infinite suffering and loss for us, we should be able to endure finite grief and loss, knowing that God is working behind the hateful evil to bring out some good in our lives. If we keep our eyes 'fixed' on Jesus, we will come through the pain and experience with the deeper peace that can be the result."

Keller adds, however, that "suffering does not automatically or naturally lead to growth and good outcomes. It must be handled properly or faced patiently and faithfully." Furthermore, he emphasizes strongly that the best time to handle pain and suffering is BEFORE it ever strikes. (Hint: the answer is a strong relationship with God through prayer. Once you are in pain, that relationship is very difficult to establish.)

Keller concludes Part 2 emphasizing the importance of knowing how best to address the suffering and grief of someone else. What works for one person, in one situation, could be disastrous for another.

I was personally moved by Keller's retelling of aspects of Simone Weil's essay, "The Love of God and Affliction." The components of affliction are isolation, implosion (or self-absorption), numbness, anger, self condemnation and shame, and the temptation to embrace suffering.
