Parson to Person

Dear People of Grace,

As I write this edition of "Parson to Person," I am just four days away from the second and, hopefully, final surgery on my left foot. From time to time over the last five years or so, you have probably seen me limping during worship, due to pain from a chronic case of plantar fasciitus in my left foot.

During this surgery on July 21, the

surgeon is taking the drastic measure of severing the plantar fascia, which will cause me to lose some of my arch, but should reduce my pain significantly. What an exciting prospect!

I am sharing this with you for two reasons. The first is simply to keep you

informed and to ask for your prayers. The recovery period begins with six weeks in a cast bearing no weight on my foot. I plan to participate in worship using crutches and/or a "knee scooter." We'll see how that goes!

The second reason for bringing this up is to share with you my experience with chronic pain. At times over the last five years, I haven't been able to stand or walk without experiencing significant pain in my left heel.

This chronic, ever-present pain has made me depressed at times. It has diminished a lot of the joy that one normally experiences in the little things of life. It has been a terrible distraction and has at times worn me down, making me more physically tired than normal.

I wish I could say there has been some great benefit to this pain, that I have learned something significant from it. But other than having more empathy for others who are in pain, I can't. I do know now what it is like

Catechesis: The Relationship of God and Child



Children have deep needs to experience God and a special capacity to enjoy the presence of God. We are fortunate at Grace to have an invested team of people who teach our children each Sunday in Sunday school. Our Sunday school curriculum and approach is known as the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS). The approach is designed for students ages three through twelve. Its origins go back to 1954 in Rome, Italy, with the founding of a children's centre known as an "atrium." Our Sunday school classrooms are called "Atrium I," "Atrium II" and "Atrium III" in keeping with the origin of the CGS.

CGS is based on the affirmation that God and child are in relationship. Children have deep needs to experience God and a special capacity to enjoy the presence of God. The task of the teachers within CGS is to help the children live fully the encounter with God. Teachers do this through intense training, preparing an environment that is in keeping with Montessori methods for teaching, and helping the children to understand the holiness of sacred spaces. The lessons and "works" teach about the liturgy, baptism, the Eucharist, the preaching of Jesus and moral formation — all done by discovery at the direction of the children.

In order to be in true relationship with God, God's covenant requires a peaceful enjoyment of God's presence, as called forth by the image of Christ the Good Shepherd. After six years of age, the response extends to action, inspiring a certain quality of behavior. The child is drawn to bear fruit as part of the True Vine, resolving to make a contribution to the history of salvation. After age nine, the child begins to explore the questions that inevitably come as a response to faith. Bible study in the CGS comes at an ordered pace, emphasizing how to use the Bible (book, chapter, verse) and understanding the mystery of the history of the Kingdom of God.

Our team of teachers is dedicated to learning to be Catechists, which requires several years of training. The materials in the Atria have all been created by the teachers, and all lessons are acquired through study and group work. CGS is truly a tradition that is handed down, rather than a curriculum that is purchased or randomly pieced together.

We encourage Grace members to stop by and visit any Atrium to see this fascinating program in action.

Shannon Townsend signed on to teach Sunday school at Grace for one year. That was a decade and a half ago. Since then, with her amazing teaching skills and instincts, she has worked tirelessly to give life and breath not only to what was then just a fledgling Catechesis program, but also to the highly successful Marketplace event, an interdenominational summer program for youngsters that is now seventeen years old and going strong. "The teacher in me said 'This is good," she reminisced about those formative years.

Today, however, with sons William and Robert grown and husband Greg now retired, Shannon says it's time to step back. "It has been an absolute honor to do [Catechesis] for the kids in this parish, to take the journey with them," she said, estimating that between 200 and 250 children have passed through the program so far. She adds, "I've fed off the children; they've fed off me; and God has always been right there in the middle. It's been a good way to serve."

Shannon, we'll miss you in the classroom every Sunday, but we're glad to hear you will still be close by. (She says she hopes to continue her Catechesis training and eventually become a trainer, herself.) Thank you so much for your years of loving service to our children.

Our Own Good Samaritan

Matthew is the son of Grace parishioner Zoe Davis. The following story is from The Quantico Sentry.

MARINE CORPS BASE QUANTICO, Va. — On the afternoon of June 21, 2nd Lt. Matthew George, a student with Charlie Company at The Basic School, was driving on US Route 1 in Dumfries when he witnessed a confrontation along the side of the road. As he drove past a group of people, he heard multiple gunshots ring out, and in his rearview mirror, he saw someone fall to the ground.

The perpetrator and his associates ran off, and "no one was doing anything" to help the victim, George said, an Ashville, N.C. native, so he turned his car around and drove back towards the scene. According to George, when he arrived at the site where the male victim had fallen, someone was on the phone with 911, and another person was standing nearby, but no one was directly assisting the victim.

Kneeling down on the side of Route 1, with cars moving past at about 40 miles per hour, George immediately assessed the situation. "I rotated the victim on his side, looked for a wound and asked for a shirt or something so I could apply pressure" to stop the bleeding, he said.

George said a bystander handed him a t-shirt, and he used that to apply pressure to the wound until another individual showed up with a first aid kit, and he was able to switch out the shirt with sterile padding.

"I had recently had the combat lifesaving course and kept trying to talk to him [the victim] and check for shock," George said. As he applied pressure, he looked for other wounds and relayed information about the victim's condition to the 911 caller, who in turn passed the information to the emergency dispatcher.

Police officers, firefighters and paramedics arrived within minutes of the incident, and George stepped back and passed off care of the victim to the paramedics. According to Detective J.C. Pena of the Prince William County Police Department, the victim had been shot multiple times and was transported to a trauma center; he survived the shooting and has since been released from the hospital.

After the event, George reflected on the combat lifesaver training at TBS. "It seemed like a 'far-away/if I ever have to do that' kind of thing. It was definitely not something I saw coming around the corner."

Given that George had received the instruction just three weeks prior to the incident, the lessons were fresh in his mind while he assisted the shooting victim. The course covers such topics as how to assess injuries, treat for shock, maintain an airway and breathing ability, and stop bleeding, among other topics. George said learning how to call in nine-line reports helped him to relay relevant information about the victim to the dispatcher via the person holding the phone.

George's staff platoon commander at TBS, Capt. Samuel Ryder, said George earned a 99 out of 100 on the practical exam for the combat lifesaver course. Ryder said that George has put a lot of "heart and effort into the training" and that he is decisive and regularly volunteers to take on extra duties.

The TBS course was not George's first experience with first aid training, however. According to George's mother, Zoe Davis, George served as a lifeguard in college and received first aid training for that. She said he worked at a pool in an urban area and sometimes had to break up fights too.

Davis said when she first heard about her son's involvement in the situation, she "was a little shaken and glad they [the perpetrators] didn't come back to see how they did." However, she said she was also "very proud that he would stop and involve himself with helping a stranger."

George's quick thinking and action enabled him to stop the bleeding before paramedics arrived and saved the victim's life. In recognition of his initiative and service, George was awarded a Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal. The award was presented to him by Col. Christian Wortman, commanding officer of TBS, during a brief break in the company's execution of a multi-night field exercise.

George is approximately halfway through the sixmonth training pipeline at TBS and is hoping to serve as an infantry officer when he graduates.

Pledges Still Not Meeting Projections

Pledge receipts through the end of June totaled \$167,725 compared to projected pledges of \$175,966. Considering all income sources, income for the first six months totaled \$205,506, while we had projected income to be \$222,536. We ended June with a negative variance in income of (\$17,030).

The negative income variance for the first six months was offset by expenses in the first six months which were less than budgeted amounts by \$16,921. When added to the negative income variance of (\$17,030), year-to-date income less expenses resulted in a small deficit of approximately \$100 for our first six months.

We are currently experiencing a deficit of \$110 while at this point in 2014 we experienced a positive balance of \$23,160.

We continue to meet our needs, largely through reduced expenditures, and remain cautiously optimistic that our programs and operation will continue successfully through the remainder of the year.
