Dear People of Grace,

It is said that someone was at a Christian gathering once, and when asked to give his testimony, the person responded, "I don't have a testimony. I have never been a Baptist or an alcoholic." To be sure, testimony, words about one's experience of the Divine in one's life, conjures up Baptist gatherings and Twelve Step Meetings.

Several years ago in Adult Sunday School, we studied a book that theologian and Episcopal priest Marcus Borg called, "The most important book of the decade about emerging Christianity and the renewal of mainline congregations." The book was written by Diana Butler-Bass and it is called Christianity for the Rest of Us, How the Neighborhood Church is Transforming the Faith.

I was fascinated with how Butler-Bass did her research for this book. She went around to mainline congregations, Our lives as well. like Presbyterian,

Lutheran, Methodist and Episcopal congregations, that were flourishing and showing signs of life and growth, and she looked for common things that these lively, life-transforming congregations exhibited. She identified what she called the ten sign posts of renewal: hospitality, discernment, healing, contemplation, testimony, diversity, justice, worship, reflection and beauty.

I agreed with Marcus Borg's comment regarding this book, and we read and studied it in Sunday school with great interest. But here's what I think about it in retrospect. Butler-Bass did the work for us. She went out and discovered all these things that were and are working to renew mainline churches, churches in denominations like ours, and she wrote about them. We read them with great

interest, as I said, and then never really thought about implementing any of them. What is wrong with that picture?

One of Butler-Bass's sign posts, testimony, has now popped up again in a book the Vestry is reading together on stewardship. A testimony, for our purposes in the church, is a story about how God has touched us in some way and changed or

> transformed our lives. This book that we are reading with the Vestry talks about how people want to be involved with organizations that change lives for the better. They cite the example of a St. Jude's Children's Hospital commercial that begins by showing a little 3year-old child headed towards death's door and ends with the

child playing on her swing set in the back yard. We see a testimony like that and many of us are moved to be a part

of the life-changing work of a place like St. Jude's.

One of the churches that Butler-Bass visited was The Church of the Redeemer, a historic New England Congregational Church in Connecticut. The reserved culture of this church reminded me of us tight-lipped Episcopalians when it comes to talking about our experiences with God.

In one of her final sermons at the congregation, the Rev. Lillian Daniel, citing the apostles in Acts praying for boldness, talked about how their congregation became interested in testimonies. "Words are an earthquake," she proclaims as she begins to recount her church's practice of testimony. In the late 1990's, the leadership


HOST FAMILIES NEEDED.

Choir



Outreach

Throughout the summer, we have been sharing more with you about the Outreach ministry at Grace Church—the various programs under the Outreach umbrella, how they function, who they serve and opportunities for involvement. This month, as shoppers begin stocking up on back-to-school supplies, we're taking a look at our partnership with area foster parents to help meet the needs of area children in foster care.

RESPONDING TO THE NEEDS OF CHILDREN IN FOSTER CARE WITH SCHOOL SUPPLIES AND

CHRISTMAS GIFTS. Most of the children we provide for through our annual Back-to-School Supplies Drive (this month!) and the Angel Tree Project (during Advent), are wards of the state although some of them have been placed with relatives in kinship placements (meaning they no longer live with

have been placed with relatives in kinship placements (meaning they no longer live with their parents and the court has given custody to a relative—often a grandparent). All of the children have been supervised by the Court at some point because their parents, often due to abuse or drug use, are unable to care for them. As budgets have been cut over the years, the amount of money provided to foster parents for school supplies and Christmas presents has decreased making it almost impossible for foster parents to provide the things these children want and/or need. For back-to-school, the Grace Church family helps provide for approximately thirty children. The Angel Tree has grown from twenty children in earlier years to 60-75 more recently. The generosity of the parish over the past two decades has been extraordinary! That being said, please read on...

BTS SCHOOL SUPPLIES NEEDED BY AUGUST 20. Can you donate a box of crayons, a notebook, pencils, paper, or other supplies? Would you consider donating a backpack for a needy student? Pledge receipts through the end of June totaled \$167,710, compared to projected pledges of \$171,521. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$210,358 while we projected income to be \$212,470. We ended the month with a negative income variance of \$2,112.

The negative income variance was reduced by expenses less than budgeted amounts by \$5,301. When these savings were applied to the negative income variance of \$2,112, our income less expenses resulted in a surplus of \$3,189 at the end of June.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.

realized that Redeemer's people wanted to talk in church and they identified this as "a desire for testimony," to speak about the faith in the context of Sunday worship. In a reserved culture like New England's, "we took a risk on these testimonies." Over five Sundays in Lent, the church heard five different testimonies, each powerful and moving, that opened their imaginations to telling stories of faith. As a result, they adopted a regular practice of testimony. And soon most people—even the most private of these Connecticut Congregationalists—were boldly and ably speaking of faith. "People are changed by giving their testimonies, and we can see the Holy Spirit moving them along," Lillian continues. "I have been changed, too. The practice of testimony was a process of releasing control and risking that testimony could outshine the sermon. The Holy Spirit uses all of us." (Taken from Christianity for the Rest of Us, c. 2006, Harper Collins Publisher, p. 131.)

For us to hear from another person about how God has touched his or her life helps us believe that God could touch our lives as well. When we begin to believe that God can touch our lives, our spiritual eyes are more open to see God's hand in our lives.

One's testimony is a powerful thing. I was reminded of a battle scene with Satan in the Book of Revelation where we read that "they conquered him by the blood of the Lamb and the word of their testimony, for they did not cling to life, even in the face of death."

I'm thinking that testimonies would be a powerful thing in our little church. Because we are on a tight Sunday morning service schedule, we would probably need for those giving their testimonies to write them out and read them. But think of what God could do as one person bears witness to the goodness of God and thereby encourages and emboldens others to do so.

Would you pray about this with me? And if you have ideas, I would love to hear them. Thank you!
