# Parson to Person

Dear People of Grace,

The beginning of the school year feels like the beginning of another church year, too, doesn't it? When school starts, our community gathers back together after summer vacations and recreational times away. It is a time when

we might pause and give thanks for this past summer. We might take some time to think about how God blessed us during the summer, giving thanks for the specific times and people through whom we were blessed.

It might also be a time to reflect on hopes we had for the summer that were *not* realized. What stood in the way? What might we do to accomplish those hopes in the future?

As we begin this new year, we have another opportunity to

submit ourselves to the Lordship of Christ. As we plan our busy fall schedule, let's be sure to block out time for Sunday worship, Christian formation classes, and service opportunities through Grace, like the Backpacker Program for school children and selling pumpkins in October for the support of children in Haiti.

I also want to tell you about a rather unique opportunity we have to increase our knowledge of the Bible. Brian McLaren has written a book called *We Make the Road by Walking — A Year-Long Quest for Spiritual Formation, Reorientation and Activation.*McLaren talked about this book in 2013 at The Wild Goose Festival. He said then that he was writing it in 52 chapters, one for each week of the year beginning with the first week of September, to help us with a general knowledge of the entire Bible. Each chapter contains a talk based on a part of the Bible.

The first chapters or weeks, for example, are on the Book of Genesis.

McLaren refers to himself as a person who loves the Bible. He also refers to himself as a progressive Christian, which means he

> takes what the Bible says seriously, but like us Episcopalians, he believes Christ died to take away our sins, not our minds. For this reason, his understanding of Holy Scripture takes into account both ancient and modern ideas, that which is old and that which is new, as the Scripture says. From his other work that I have read, I would say that he understands the Gospel to be about us as followers of Christ serving the world in His Name or us being Christ in the world today.

I'm putting this in my "Parson to Person"

letter to you this month for two reasons. The first is to invite you to join the Downstairs Adult Sunday School Class as we study one chapter of McLaren's book each week in the conference room downstairs beginning Sunday, September 7, at 10:00 a.m. The second reason I am including this here is to tell everyone in the parish about this book. Part of our charge from God is to grow in our knowledge of and love for God. This book, either with the class or purchased and read on your own at your own pace, would be a way to do just that. I often hear people, especially Episcopalians, say they don't know much about the Bible and wish they knew more. I commend this book as a way to grow in knowledge of God and in relationship with lesus.

Last year we provided food each weekend for forty students from Jones. These children are selected by the school for participation in the program based on need. Our goal is to provide food for the weekend for each child as well as some food that can be used by the rest of the family. Since the children are little and cannot carry large amounts of food at a time, we provide two smaller bags. We also provide a box of food for Asheville High School students who are living independently.

We are looking for volunteers who are willing and able to make a school year's commitment. We need people who can help shop at MANNA food bank, pick up the food, pack the food, and help take it to Jones. Our greatest need is for additional packers. # Healing Prayer Corner



I think it is so exciting to discover a new way to pray. Recently I was watching a DVD presented by Fr. John Rice and he referred to praying using a "Flash Prayer." I had never heard of this type of prayer, but upon hearing his explanation, I was intrigued. A Flash Prayer is a brief moment of prayer for a particular person. Here is how it works: first I see a picture, in my head, of that person with Jesus; Jesus is holding out his hands; I place that person in His hands. And that is it. I leave the person in the capable hands of Jesus. Jesus knows the need and Jesus does the healing.

There are several scenarios in which I could see this being an effective tool for praying. One way would be when we pray for those on the Grace Prayer List that we receive every week in our bulletin. It would take a great deal of time to offer a prayer for each of person listed, but with a Flash Prayer, I can look at a name, call up a picture of Jesus and place that person with Jesus. I have done my part by placing that person with Him.

Another time I could use a Flash Prayer is during the day, when someone's name comes into my mind. I feel that God has placed that person on my mind. So if I immediately commit the person to Jesus, leaving Him holding them in His capable hands, I have effectively prayed for them. So here is just another tool for your "Prayer Tool Bag." Blessings to all of you as we begin a new school year.

Richard Rohr is a globally recognized ecumenical teacher, the author of numerous books, a Franciscan priest of the New Mexico Province and founder of the Center for Action and Contemplation in Albuquerque. Join us for this five-session discussion in the parish hall on Sunday mornings at 10:10 a.m. beginning September 7. Facilitated by Becky Hannah. All are welcome!

**The Downstairs Even Better Coffee and Conversation Class** (in the downstairs Conference Room) will be reading together and discussing short weekly segments of Brian McLaren's latest book called *We Make the Road by Walking — A Year-Long* 

Quest for Spiritual Formation, Reorientation, and Activation. Phyllis Tickle, Episcopal author and speaker, wrote the following about McLaren's book: "One of the most remarkable documents in recent Christian writings...There is no evangelizing here, and no preaching, only a sinewy, but orderly and open, presentation of the faith. The result is as startling as it is beautiful." Because each class will be somewhat autonomous, if you have to miss one or two, it is still worth coming to the others. # Building a School in Kenya Fr. Gary Coffey

Over the past ten years, the family of Watson and Megan Jordan has been working with various charities on projects that would honor their late son, who passed away as an infant. This year, they are working with an organization called "Free the Children." The organization is involved in building schools in various third world countries. Specifically, the Jordan family is fundraising to build a school in Kenya.

In Kenya, public education was made free to all students. However, while this new law is well intentioned, there is a shortage of schools in the country, making it difficult to meet the needs of an increased number of young children trying to get an education. Money raised through this fundraising effort will go toward sending a group over to Kenya along with the supplies necessary to build a school.

The Vestry agreed at its July meeting to designate the loose plate offering on the third Sunday of September to this project. We hope you will be generous in your support. The loose plate offering on the third Sunday of each month is normally designated for the Parish Ministry Fund (Clergy Discretionary Fund).

Every Tuesday, from about 8:16 a.m. until approximately 10:00 a.m., in the Library (except during Advent), we get together, and we invite you to join us to better understand what His Gospel could actually mean for your life! Through Scripture and study of some of the critical books of that and our time, the Early Birds continue to take an in-depth look at the real meaning of Christ's coming. # Slow Start to Second Half of 2014

Total contributions for the first seven months of 2014 were \$247,950, coming in \$3,168 under budget. Without the inclusion of \$6,510 in prior year pledge payments, total contributions would be \$9,678 under budget. When considering all other sources of income, year-to-date receipts totaled \$262,784 with a budget of \$265,078 resulting in a negative income variance of (\$2,294).

Total expenses for the first seven months were \$245,691, coming in under budget by \$19,387. This positive variance is largely due to the timing of future budgeted needs in the areas of Mission & Outreach, Parish Programs and Operations.

When considering the (\$2,294) negative income variance with the \$19,387 positive expense variance, a \$17,093 positive variance results. As remaining 2014 budgeted needs become due, this positive variance will decrease.

Moving ahead, it is our prayer all needs will be met with continued offerings.
