In the meantime, regardless of who the rector is, the activities and ministry of the church continue every day. We never close. Therefore, here at Grace, we continue to provide quality worship opportunities on Sundays as well as through the week;



INTRODUCING OUR NEW INTERIM RECTOR! Back in July, I shared with you a broad outline of the process ahead of us as we move forward from the retirement of Father Gary Coffey as our rector. At that time, I told you that we had only one job: to celebrate and to say goodbye to the Coffeys. And what a celebration that was! Thank you to all of you for your role in that poignant and wonderful day.

I am happy to report that the Vestry can now check off another box on our task list. On Monday, October 1, **Gary Butterworth** will begin his work with us as our interim rector. I can go on at length about his background as a retired naval officer, his successes in empowering congregations for ministry, his work as a national search consultant at the parish and diocesan level, and his experiences in leading change processes. But none of those skills would matter if he weren't the right person to be our spiritual leader at this important time. What struck us as a vestry more than anything else was his personal warmth and his energy. We're excited about the beginning of Gary's ministry with us as we move forward on our journey of discernment.

Speaking of our journey, Father Bob and I will host another update on our process and answer questions (to the best of our ability, of course!) during Adult Education on September 23.

Gary Butterworth's first Sunday with us will be October 7. As we did in July, we'll have the 7:45 service and then we'll combine the 9 and 11:15 with a 10:00 Eucharist. We'll also move the Fifth Sunday Brunch from September 30 to October 7, so we can welcome our new Father Gary!



MORE ABOUT FR. BUTTERWORTH! The Rev. Dr. Gary Butterworth currently serves the People of God at All Saints Episcopal Church in Gastonia, NC. He is Chair of Congregational Vitality in the Diocese of Western North Carolina and is an Episcopal Search Consultant currently working with the dioceses of Nevada, Vermont and Missouri. His first call was in The Diocese of Southern Virginia where he served three rural parishes. Gary has been a Deputy to General Convention three times, a Trustee for The University of the South and serves on The Alumni Council at Sewanee. He earned his Doctor of Ministry (DMin) from Sewanee writing on Family Systems and the Colonial Church and its impact on colonial dioceses. He has a MBA in Negotiation and Conflict Management, a Masters in National

Security Studies and a Graduate Certificate in Organizational and Leadership Management. He served as a Naval Officer for over 30 years leading Sailors throughout the world.

He is a practitioner of the Jesus Movement, serving as pastor, priest and teacher alongside the priesthood of all believers, acting in concert to Gather, Transform and Send Christian servants into the world to act and proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Gary is married to his bride, Christina. They have been married for 33 years and have two children: Justin, who lives outside Boulder, Colorado and is an educator and Emma, who begins her PhD studies at UMass Amherst this fall.



NEW IN THE GRACE TEAM THIS FALL: PROJECT DRAWDOWN. With all the environmental debates raging around us these days, it's easy to be overwhelmed to the point of "tuning out" or only listening to our own adopted viewpoints. Given the diversity of Grace's philosophical make-up and in keeping with our "Christ-Following" mandate, the



TEAM will begin sharing positive, hopeful and helpful news on the sometimes controversial issues surrounding our call to be good stewards of Creation.

A recent daily meditation referenced a year-old book by Paul Hawken titled Drawdown – The Most Comprehensive Plan Ever Proposed to Reverse Global Warming.

Drawdown maps, measures, models, and describes the 100 most substantive solutions to global warming. For each solution, the book describes its history, the carbon impact it provides, the relative cost and savings, the path to adoption, and how it works. The goal of the research that informs *Drawdown* is to determine if we can reverse the buildup of atmospheric carbon within thirty years. All solutions modeled are already in place, well understood, analyzed based on peer-reviewed science, and are expanding around the world.

The book is the result of Project Drawdown, a nonprofit organization and coalition of scholars, scientists, entrepreneurs, and advocates from across the globe that is mapping, measuring, modeling, and communicating about a collective array of substantive solutions to global warming, with the goal of reaching "drawdown" – the point in time when the concentration of atmospheric greenhouse gases begins to decline on a year-to-year basis.

Project Drawdown's research program has developed realistic, solution-specific models, technical assessments, and policy memos projecting the financial and climate impacts of existing solutions deployed at scale over the next thirty years.

Project Drawdown's role is not to implement these solutions, but rather to point to how they are *already* being implemented by humanity around the globe and the potential of these solutions if they are scaled over the next thirty years.

Project Drawdown is the first effort to measure and project the collective impact of a broad range of solutions if implemented at scale. Rather than focusing on a single solution or sector of solutions, Project Drawdown has done the math on what humanity is capable of achieving with the broad range of tools already in use around the globe.

Over the next year, the Grace *TEAM* will feature a selection of the proposed solutions (100 at this point) that will work to effect Drawdown. We will steer clear of political debates and fracturing rhetoric. This is intended to be hope-giving and informative in keeping with our Christ-Following. Your feedback is welcomed and encouraged. Electricity Generation: Rooftop Solar

September

19th-century solar panels were made of selenium. Today, photovoltaic (PV) panels use thin wafers of silicon crystal. As photons strike them, they knock electrons loose and produce an electrical circuit. These subatomic particles are the only moving parts in a solar panel, which requires no fuel and produces clean energy.

Small-scale solar systems, typically sited on rooftops, accounted for roughly 30 percent of PV capacity installed worldwide in 2015. In Germany, a leader in solar, rooftops boast 1.5 million systems. In Bangladesh, population 157 million, more than 3.6 million home solar systems have been installed.

Rooftop solar is spreading as the cost of panels falls, driven by incentives to accelerate growth, economies of scale in manufacturing, and advances in PV technology. Innovative end-user financing, such as third-party ownership arrangements, have helped mainstream its use. Yet, costs associated with acquisition and installation can be half the cost of a rooftop system and have not seen the

In grid-connected areas, rooftop panels can put electricity production in the hands of households. In rural parts of low-income countries, they can leapfrog the need for large-scale, centralized power grids and accelerate access to affordable, clean electricity—becoming a powerful tool for eliminating poverty.

By The Numbers:

#10 Rank and Results by 205024.6 gigatons reduced CO2\$453.14 Billion net implementation cost\$3.46 Trillion net operational savings

Impact: Our analysis assumes rooftop solar PV can grow from .4 percent of electricity generation globally to 7 percent by 2050. That growth can avoid 24.6 gigatons of emissions. We assume an implementation cost of \$1,883 per kilowatt, dropping to \$627 per kilowatt by 2050. Over three decades, the technology could save \$3.4 trillion in home energy costs.




Pledge receipts through the end of July totaled \$226,518, compared to projected pledges of \$206,272. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$242,246, while we projected income to be \$240,910. We ended the month with a positive income variance of \$1,336.

The positive variance in income was offset by expenses which were greater than budgeted amounts by \$4,098. When these overages were applied to the positive income variance of \$1,336, our income less expenses resulted in a deficit of \$2,762 at the end of July.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.
