## Parson to Person

Dear People of God,

I recently purchased a copy of *The Little Prince* to reread. As I mentioned in a recent homily, the only thing I really remember from that book is the phrase "matters of consequence." The little prince noticed that some things really didn't matter much at all. But some things, which he called "matters of consequence," were extremely important. In polite

conversation, if we are not careful, we will naturally stick to the "safe subjects." We often do that because we don't want to make waves. We are all familiar with the three subjects that are taboo in polite conversation, one of which is religion. As people of faith, it is rather difficult for us to

avoid that unmentionable topic, isn't it?

Recently one of our parishioners came to my office to say that she is troubled by the seemingly casual approach being taken today by our society toward the subject of abortion. Tony Campolo wrote a book a while back called 20 Hot Potatoes Christians Are Afraid To Touch. Surely abortion could have been one of those hot potatoes in his book. I talked with this woman about how to find other Christians who are interested in discussing the issue. We thought of having her write an article for the Grace Team, but that seemed too impersonal. So I thought of having at least four evenings in October when anyone who is willing to sit together as brothers and sisters in Christ can do so to consider some of those matters of consequence.

I am reminded of the verse, "Bear one another's burdens and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). Whether we agree or disagree about those matters of consequence, those hot potato topics, as brothers and sisters in Christ, we can gather with one another to listen to one another, to love one another, to pray together and listen to God about those important issues. If we can't discuss important issues in the Church, then where *can* we discuss them?

I am inviting anyone who wishes to come together for these listening sessions

on four Wednesdays in October beginning on Wednesday, October 9 (as I will be away on October 2, and I would like to facilitate the meetings). We will meet from 7:00-8:30 p.m. in the parish hall. What I hope we can do is to create a holy space each week where we can come together to share our

hearts and to listen to each other's hearts. I will develop some guidelines we can agree to follow.

On Wednesday, October 9, our topic will be abortion, women's rights, the rights of the unborn and related issues. At the end of that evening, we will decide if we need to continue with the same topic on October 16 or change to another topic. The group will decide on the next topic to consider. If you are interested in sitting with us on those evenings, please come. If you are not interested in coming, we would ask for your prayers for the gatherings. Also if you have had some experience in facilitating a group like this and/or if you know of some guidelines to recommend, please send those to me as I will be looking for some to use. We will publish the other subjects for the evenings as we decide on them.

**Hands of Faith Cancer Training Ministry** 

Hands of Faith Cancer Training Ministry is equipping the body of Christ to know what the needs are of those on the journey of cancer and how to minister to them. The training has been developed by Dr. David Hetzel, oncology surgeon at the Hope Cancer Center in Asheville. It includes information and instruction on subjects such as what cancer is; what the side effects of treatments are; what the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs that accompany the diagnosis are; and how we can come alongside as Christians, family members and friends to give support. One of the most popular sections of the training is "The Do's and Don'ts of Conversation." Often, we do not get involved because we fear not knowing what to say and the awkward feelings that accompany that fear. The training is free and the manual is offered for a donation of \$10.00 for those interested in one. The goal for those who take the course is to be equipped and ready to move forward to meet needs at Grace and even outside the church by possibly hosting a cancer support group. Many who are considered "survivors" have joined the movement to see the church equipped to fulfill in a more powerful way the words of Christ, "I was sick and you visited me." ## October Meditation Card Scriptures

This month's theme is "Love God." The corresponding weekly verses are below.

#### MEDITATION FOR WEEK ONE

(This passage for Week One really captures the essence of what we are trying to do with our meditation/memory card practice.)

Hear, O Israel: The LORD is our God, the LORD alone. You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart. Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them as an emblem on your forehead, and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates. (Deuteronomy 6:4-9)

#### MEDITATION FOR WEEK TWO

Jesus said, "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love." (John 15:9-10)

#### **MEDITATION FOR WEEK THREE**

"Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" Jesus said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." (Matthew 22:36-37)

#### MEDITATION FOR WEEK FOUR

Jesus answered him, "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them." (John 14:23)

Monthly verses are published in the TEAM for you to preview or to clip and use in case you miss a Sunday.

**ROOM IN THE INN.** We will host Room in the Inn from Sunday, October 13, to the morning of Sunday, October 20. Room in the Inn is a ministry to homeless women that strives to help them find permanent housing and jobs as they complete the program. There will be a maximum of twelve women staying with us.

This year we are blessed to have the members of the Church of the Holy Spirit to help us with Room in the Inn. They will be responsible for half the week when the women stay with us. We will still be responsible for providing breakfasts, bag lunches, dinners, and chaperones for some of the days of their stay.

We will also need breakfast supplies such as milk and cereal if you would like to donate those items. Volunteers will be needed to help set up and make the beds on Sunday, October 13. Another way in which you may serve is to help drive the van we use to transport the women to and from their meeting place in downtown Asheville. There will be an information session for anyone who would like to help, during which any questions you might have will be answered. There is a sign-up sheet in the foyer for those of you who are willing to help with the ministry.

**EPISCOPAL HOUSE X FOR HABITAT FOR HUMANITY.** We will begin building the Episcopal House X for Habitat for Humanity this month. Grace will partner with other Episcopal churches in the diocese to build the house. Tracey Corn will be the occupant of the house that we will build in Swannanoa. You will have an opportunity to meet Tracey on Sunday, October 27. Grace has been asked to provide two volunteers for each of seventeen days between October 22 and January 4. The sign-up sheet that lists the dates when we need people and the jobs you will be asked to do is in the foyer. Please consider prayerfully your ability to help us move Tracey and his son into permanent housing. We want to make it a successful project. #### SOIL AND SACRAMENT: A SPIRITUAL MEMOIR OF FOOD AND FAITH,

I was completely unfamiliar with the "Food and Faith" movement when I opened the recent release by Duke Divinity School graduate and local author Fred Bahnson. What I expected was a series of somewhat dry essays explaining how the earth, the environment and the food we eat are linked and how as believers we are called to protect those resources. However what I found was a book of stories — stories of people throughout the country and beyond who have been changed and who have intentionally sought a closer walk with their Creator through the simple act of growing food.

I met Emma, a recluse and watermelon thief, who became a vital member of a community garden. Then there is Zach, who makes the journey from cooking meth to roasting organically-grown coffee beans. Bahnson travels among Trappist monks in South Carolina; Pentecostals in Washington State; Mayans in Chiapis, Mexico; Jewish farmers in Conneticut; and even our neighbors down the road in Fairview. He shares his own soul-searching throughout his writing.

I found the book to be quite readable and thought-provoking. The characters populating Bahnson's book seek God not only through growing food but also through the simple and mundane acts of daily living. It is not only working the soil that is sacramental but also preparing a meal, repairing a tool, sharing a warm cup of coffee with a friend on a cool morning. It's fair to say that Bahnson's God is not high above in the heavens but rather is down to earth in the very soil upon which we walk.

We are now into October. Winter is approaching, and it is the time of year that I call the gentle time. But we humans can make it a time of confusion and chaos. The holidays are here and expectations are high. Family dynamics can create a less-than-gentle atmosphere. It is a time when we need to double our efforts to remain spiritually connected, to spend quiet time with our Lord. The quietness can wash over us and erase the negative influences that stress brings into our lives. Here at Grace, we are fortunate to have four prayer services to help us accomplish our goals. ## SENIOR HIGH FALL YOUTH CONFERENCE

A note from Osondu McPeters, Missioner for Youth, College & Young Adult Ministries with the Episcopal Diocese of WNC

Hello, All:

I hope that everyone is now getting into the swing of things with school and EYC starting back. Just wanted to give you an update on the **Senior High Fall Youth Conference** this year.

Earlier this year, the Bishop changed the date for the Diocesan Convention (which is held at Kanuga) and moved it back a week, which is now the same weekend that the Senior High Fall Youth Conference is planned. After meeting with the Commission on Youth Ministries and the Diocesan Youth Council, we have agreed to (1) keep the date of the conference the same weekend as Convention but (2) move the location of the youth conference from Valle Crucis Conference Center to Kanuga Conference Center.

This decision was made so that (A) there is still a youth presence at Convention this year, (B) representatives at Convention can see parts of what a youth conference looks like (this is especially good for parishes who aren't connected with diocesan youth ministries), and (C) we can try something new and different to see if it helps get more participants to the weekend event.

In addition, after experimenting with a one-night event last year, we decided that we wanted more time to build community with one another, so we are going to change the structure back to a two-night weekend in 2013. The theme for the weekend is "Come With Me Bro" and will focus on how we can be more inclusive of everyone's beliefs so that together we can all spread the "Good News." The Diocesan Youth Council will lead the discussions and activities.

I hope that everyone will be supportive of these changes. We are planning a FRESH conference and we look forward to a great turnout from our EYC! See information below:

## Leaner than **Anticipated August**

Total Income for August of \$32,201 was under budget by \$5,018 and included Combined Offerings of \$31,640 and Building/Other Income of \$561. Year-to-date Total Income at the close of August was \$287,800 or \$9,949 below targeted income of \$297,749.

Total Expenses for August of \$32,726 were \$4,493 under budget, primarily due to the timing of Operations and Personnel costs. Since August Expenses of \$32,726 exceeded August Income of \$32,201, Grace operated at a deficit for the month of (\$525). Year-to-date Total Expenses at the close of August were \$287,332 or \$10,418 under budget, primarily due to the timing of Outreach commitments and Personnel costs.

Budgeted expenses to be paid in the remaining months of this year total \$148,874. It is our prayer offerings will meet those needs.
