Parson to Person

Dear People of Grace,

I hope you are enjoying this taste of fall as much as I am! I think you would agree that it is a glorious time of year to live in the mountains. The parish is back in full swing after the summer and it is good to have us all back together again.

Yesterday, I heard a friend/parishioner use the phrase "Christian on the spot."

A Christian on the spot is a follower of Jesus who happens to be somewhere where he or she may be the only person around to help. A simple example of this might be you walking down the sidewalk and seeing a very elderly person who has just slipped and fallen. Of course, you would go over to help him or her. In doing so, you would bring glory to God as the Christian

or God's representative "on the spot."

In relation to this, I began to think about the phrase from St. Paul's letter to the Colossians, chapter one, where he refers to "this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory." In times past when I heard that phrase, "Christ in you, the hope of glory," I thought of it as Christ's indwelling presence in us and that one day we would be with Him forever in heaven or in glory. I'm pretty sure that this is not what St. Paul meant by that phrase.

When he talks about "Christ in us, the hope of glory," I am pretty sure he means that Christ's presence within empowers us to bring God glory by the way we live our lives. Christ's presence in us is the same as the Holy Spirit's presence in us, because God is One. Therefore, Christ's presence in us produces the fruit of the Holy Spirit,

things like love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, gentleness, goodness and selfcontrol. These wonderful attributes are not something we have to try harder to produce in ourselves, but are the result of Christ's presence in us. They are imputed or gifted to us by Him.

However, we do have a part in it. We

must be open to the work And remember of Christ or the work of the Spirit within us. I are the Spirit within us. I am reminded of the words of the risen and glorified Christ in the Book of Revelation where He says, "Listen! I am standing at the door, knocking; if you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to you and eat with you, and you with me." I was going to refer to "that famous painting of Jesus knocking at the door," but when I went to that source of all knowledge,

> the internet, I found about thirty different pictures of Jesus knocking on the door of our hearts and lives! The point is that our part is to fling the door of our hearts and lives open and invite Christ in to fill us with His presence and make us fully human as we were created to be.

So, Christ in us is our hope of bringing glory to God by inviting Him over and over again to fill us afresh with His presence and to bring forth the fruit of the Holy Spirit in our lives. And remember this, wherever you are, you are the "Christian on the spot," or God's means of loving others. It can be done with something as simple as a smile or an encouraging word, by which you will bring glory to God.

The Labyrinth — Walking the Sacred Path October 22, 10:00 a.m.-12:00 noon

The labyrinth is an ancient archetypal imprint that is gaining recognition as an effective meditation practice with many applications. Walking a labyrinth gets us moving, reminds us to look around, to remember life events, to implore metaphor, to listen. It can help us quiet our minds, reduce stress, find forgiveness or discern the response to a question. It can open our hearts in compassion or give us insight into conflicts and ways to deepen and enrich our lives. It can be used as a path of prayer or a way to encounter parts of ourselves that seem to be out of control. In our time together we will review the basics of labyrinth walking and then look into the wisdom that is evoked by walking the labyrinth together in community.

Our leader for this special workshop at Grace will be Tommy Bratton, Minister of Christian Formation at the First Baptist Church here in Asheville. Tommy has a certification in Labyrinth Facilitation from Veriditas.

Space for a Prayer Table Mark Silvers & the Catechists

Items needed: lovely rug, low table, a cloth that corresponds to the color of the liturgical season, ornate or beautifully bound Bible, candle, a sacred image (photo or statue of Jesus), some type of flowers or greenery, and a cushion.

I know what you're probably thinking. Why would I put a prayer table in my home? Well, in this busy world, our families are often involved with so many activities that it takes a toll on our physical and spiritual well-being. Also as our children grow and develop, we want to assist them with one of the most crucial parts of their religious lives — prayer. We, however, must understand what that is. Prayer is not offering God our grocery list of wants, wishes, needs, and concerns. Prayer is taking time to stop and listen to Him, to create a silent place where we can meet and reflect on Him. Certainly all of those items are appropriate for prayer. However, for the young child, silence and wonder will be the most profound prayer they can offer. Why not create a place where they can be invited to do so?

Begin by placing your lovely rug in the area you choose for your prayer table. Then add a low table to make it accessible for the child. Next, set the table with a cloth that corresponds to the liturgical seasonal color (green, blue, white, purple, or red). Your cloth can be as simple or elaborate as you like. Then, place a nicely bound Bible in the middle of the table where it will invite reading. Also add your candle and sacred image (to help pause and reflect). Last, place your flowers or greenery. Now your table has been set! The very last item on your list will be a cushion on which the child or you may sit or kneel to create that much-needed silence for prayer.

This is a great family project that can be done with all ages of children. Allowing the child to be involved in the selection of the items will create a sense of ownership. I am reminded by this table, as stated so eloquently in the book *Listening to God with Children*, that "Our prayer is both preparation and a vehicle for arriving at the greatest prayer of thanksgiving: the Eucharist."

Soles for Hope Project for Children's Sabbath

Like most Americans, you probably have a nice home, two cars, and a closet full of shoes. While we are blessed by these things, we are always reminded that there are children beginning their day in places like Uganda, Africa with barely enough to wear, no clean water, and NO SHOES.

This year, as part of our annual Children's Sabbath, Sunday, October 30, we are once again joining in a partnership with the organization "Soles for Hope." By collecting old denim jeans (to be used in making the uppers for the shoes) and plastic file folders and gallon milk jugs that are cut into pieces to give the shoes their shape, we can contribute to shipments being sent to Africa where tailors and shoemakers will craft shoes that are then given away at medical clinics.

Right now, you can learn more about this project at www.solehope.org/. We also encourage you to dig up at least one pair of old denim jeans and plastic from file folders or gallon milk jugs, bring them to church and add them to the collection already started in the Atrium III room downstairs. Another need for our project will be scissors that will be used to cut the pieces from patterns that will be supplied.

More information about our shoe-making project and the Children's Sabbath will be coming soon.

Feed My Sheep

He saith unto him the third time, Simon, son of Jonas, lovest thou me? Peter was grieved because he said unto him the third time, Lovest thou me? And he said unto him, Lord, thou knowest all things; thou knowest that I love thee. Jesus saith unto him, Feed my sheep. John 21:17

The Pastoral Care Committee will soon offer an updated version of "Feed My Sheep." The program will provide immediately-available emergency meals to those dealing with situations such as emergency surgeries or short-term but serious illnesses.

There will be five or six easy to re-heat and serve menu items — soups or one-pot meals — available in the church freezer at all times. The meals will be available in one-quart disposable freezer bags so no dishes will need to be returned to the church. Depending on the number of meals needed, multiple bags could be taken at one time. It is preferred that meals be picked up from the church when possible, but delivery will also be available.

Menu options will be selected and prepared by the Feed My Sheep committee based on seasonal availability of ingredients, current donations or personal whim. Yes, we plan to have fun and might just get a hankering for some home-cooked chili or a seasonal butternut squash soup!

When a need arises, parishioners will simply need to call Mary Jane Westall at 254-6221 or 273-1857. Mary Jane will provide a listing of our current options (recipes will be available for review in case of food allergies) and will arrange for pick-up or delivery with the rest of the Feed My Sheep team.

While full menu options won't be available until October, there are already meals available, so please don't hesitate to contact us if you find yourself in need. Current selections include a kale, white bean and sausage stew as well as an Italian sausage tortellini soup.

Several parishioners have volunteered to assist on the committee. If you are one of those volunteers, thank you. We'll be contacting you soon to find out how you'd like to help. My blisters have calloused over, but all of my memories from Panamá this year working with the nonprofit PROMESA are still fresh in my mind. I had a wonderful year serving in the Young Adult Service Corps in Panamá as a missionary for the Episcopal Church. This year gave me the opportunity to lead and facilitate projects with indigenous and farming communities throughout the country. I am so grateful for my experiences with the people from la Comarca Kuna de Madungandi, las Tierras Collectivas de Embera, and the district of Coclé, and I know that I will never forget them.


Julio Cesar, farmworker from PROMESA, who we built a tilapia pond with during my project "Pescado Para Tod@s," told me before I left that he wanted me to come back to Panamá in four years. In four

years, he told me, he would not only have the one pond that we helped construct with him and the other farmworkers, but four ponds. Four ponds, filled with carp and shrimp, in addition to tilapia, that he plans on selling to his entire community. He also wants to adopt the sustainable system that we encouraged during the farm-exchange and grow pigs next to the ponds along with a vegetable garden in the space where the water leaves the ponds. The pigs produce fertilizer for the pond that grows algae and feeds the fish. The water that leaves the pond is also laced with fertilizer

and provides a moist space to grow tomatoes, cucumbers, lettuce, onions, carrots, and beets. Julio Cesar has big dreams for his fishpond! It is so satisfying to know that my projects have not just ended with my return to the U.S., but are

still being carried on by all of the farmers back in Panamá. This is just one example of the many projects that I helped facilitate in Panamá.

None of this would have been possible without the enormous support and encouragement that I received from Grace Church. I am so thankful for my church family here, for believing in my dreams, and encouraging me to chase after them. Thank you for loving me, so that I could go out and love in Panamá.

Kids of the Kingdom. . . That's What We Are. I grew up with a rich church music experience as a child. From Bible School singing, to family weekends, to the more formal songs in the choir at church, music was a huge part of my faith-shaping experiences and my own personal contributions to worship.

Another Positive Variance

Pledge receipts through the end of August totaled \$246,475, compared to projected pledges of \$219,333. Considering all income sources, income received to date totaled \$301,986, while we projected income to be \$268,302. We ended the month with another positive variance in overall projected income of \$33,684. We continue to experience a very positive trend in overall income.

The positive income variance thus far was reduced somewhat by expenses which were greater than budgeted amounts by \$3090. When subtracted from the positive income variance of \$33,684 our income less expenses resulted in a still healthy surplus of more than \$30,594 for the year.

While we continue to move in a positive direction, your prayers and attention to our stewardship efforts are still encouraged.
