### **Notes From the Margins**

Here I am, 62 years old and I have finally learned how to retain what I read; I was wisely advised to 1) define my intention when starting a book, writing on the front page what my intention is; 2) underline and circle all passages that are important to me; 3) make detailed notes in the margins as to how and why the underlined and circled passages are significant; and 4) write the margin notes as if someone were listening...as if in conversation. I have also learned that there is much wisdom and insight in the margins of society. I have wanted to smack people who say that people who live in poverty...or the homeless...are that way because they want to be. But, I must be honest: I live in poverty, now, and if someone were to offer to lift me out of it, I would have serious reservations. I have not always appreciated the value and merit of my hard life. But with 20/20 hindsight, I can see that God has been answering my prayers...all along the way. I find myself now in a place of honor. The beauty is that I can stand toe-to-toe with scientists, professionals, bureaucrats, and managers; I have been all those things. I can stand shoulder-to-shoulder with single mothers, divorced women, abusive / neglectful parents, persecuted Christians, even the promiscuous because I have been them. Now, I can look in the eyes of customers who are missing teeth, wear worn-out clothing, and are buying cheap food with EBT cards and show them 'knowing love' and compassion; my smile is genuine. I can sit with patience as the crippled man and the one with slow speech get to the parts of their stories where the true deep wisdom of life comes out. I am one with them because I am truly one of them. The 'crazy' woman in the doctor's office is no different from me except that she is at a bad place in her illness and is unmedicated. To be no better off than anyone around me is a truly privileged place to be. I am never embarrassed by their poverty or uncomfortable with their conditions. I sit easy in the DSS or Social Security offices because I belong there. Jesus was able to break bread with the tax collectors and prostitutes because He was one with God. For me, though, it took a lifetime of abuse, neglect, mistreatment, and illness. But I had prayed for that...sort of. When I was a teenager, I prayed for the wisdom that scripture said was so valuable. I also prayed to have a mastery of words so that I might be able to heal and to help people understand life and to get along. Then I forgot that I had prayed for all of this. Thank God, God did not forget. So, here I am. God has been answering my prayers for the past 61.8 years. And God is not done with me yet. These days I'm learning how to obey that small voice that says, "Let her talk."

## Vestry Stewardship Commitment

### 2017 Vestry Stewardship Statement

We, the Vestry of Grace Church, embrace the following principles of stewardship for our parish:

- The Clergy tithes (gives at least 10% of their incomes back to God) as an offering of thanksgiving and as an act of obedience to God OR they are committed to a personal program of increased giving, the minimum goal of which is tithing.
- Each member of the Vestry tithes (gives at least 10% of his/her income back to God) as an offering of thanksgiving and as an act of obedience to God OR he/ she is committed to a personal program of increased giving, the minimum goal of which is tithing.
- Our Vestry and The Episcopal Church affirm the tithe (10%) as the minimum goal and the Biblical standard of Christian giving.
- The parish budget is formulated and approved after our parishioners' commitment cards are turned in. The Vestry is officially committed to proportionate giving as the pattern for Christian Stewardship and demonstrates that commitment by waiting until after the stewardship effort to formulate and approve the budget for the coming year.
- Our parish offers a tithe (10%) of our parish income to the Diocese. The Vestry is committed to proportionate giving, and demonstrates that commitment by giving a tithe of our income as an offering to our diocese each year.

This statement was approved by the Vestry of Grace Episcopal Church, Asheville, N.C., on September 18, 2017 with the intention of renewing this commitment each year in the future.

Usually it starts out with an email once or twice a month, and then gets a little more frequent as the wedding approaches. Because of this, by the time we meet the family they already feel like family. And then to be able to be there for the actual wedding is very special. As committee members we are very serious about keeping the sanctity of the church, so the people that use the church have to follow our specific guidelines, which they are happy to do. We encourage the new couple to come back and visit on their anniversary. Also, it's a great way to expose the church to all of the guests that come. We have a beautiful, historical church and the money we get from hosting weddings helps tremendously with its upkeep. In my opinion, it's a win-win situation.

Pledge receipts through the end of August totaled \$223,651 compared to projected pledges of \$228,695. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$270,795, while we projected income to be \$283,293. We ended the month with a negative income variance of \$12,498.

The negative income variance was reduced by expenses less than budgeted amounts by \$11,388. When these savings were applied to the negative income variance of \$12,498 our income less expenses resulted in a surplus of \$1,110 at the end of August.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.

# Keeping God's Children Safe

Copies of the diocesan *Guidelines for Appropriate Affection and Code of Conduct* have been distributed to vestry members, ministry leaders, and leaders and members of committees and groups. Parish leadership has requested that as many people as possible read and sign the guidelines as a reflection of the Grace Church community's commitment to insuring that all children and youth are protected from abuse. The Grace community wants to insure that it continues to provide a safe place for children to grow, play, learn, and worship.

The diocese is also committed to providing a positive, nurturing environment that protects children and youth from abuse. The guidelines establish appropriate and inappropriate forms of affection in order to create safe boundaries for children and youth. Establishing appropriate and inappropriate behaviors makes it possible to show positive affection in appro-

priate ways. Establishing those behaviors also makes it possible to recognize behaviors that do not create safe boundaries for children and youth. The guidelines make it possible to avoid inappropriate behaviors.

The guidelines list appropriate ways to demonstrate affection that establish safe boundaries for children and youth. The guidelines also list inappropriate forms of affection for interacting with children and youth. Those who sign the guidelines agree to prevent abuse and neglect of children and youth and to report any inappropriate behaviors with or abuse of children or youth to appropriate authorities.
