# A Message from Fr. Bob

## The Importance of Christian Community

One of the things we notice about Jesus is that he lived his life with others. All through his ministry, Jesus was constantly gathering folks like us around him, and he ended his time on earth by promising always to be with us.

As followers of Jesus, we follow

his example by participating in the church, which by definition is the community of the followers of Jesus. While it is true that God seeks a personal relationship with each of us, and solitude is vital to our spiritual health, Jesus makes it clear that we need to balance our private,


personal relationship with God with our coming together in community on a regular basis for worship, study, prayer and fellowship.

For me, there are two primary reasons we need to gather often in community as followers of Jesus. First, although Jesus calls us personally and individually to follow him, we see only partially. Most often we, as individuals, need the insight and wisdom of others. Since God often reveals part of the picture to one person and another part to another person, it makes sense that we need to come together to share with one another in order to discern the fulness of the truth God wants us to have. This is why we have Sunday worship together. This is why we do Bible study, and have adult and youth formation in groups. This is why we work together with others as a Vestry and in committees in order to get things done. By sharing and listening with others, we learn from God individually, as together we grasp a common vision of God's truth and direction for our community of faith.

The second primary reason we come together as Christians is to both

offer and to receive support, not only from God, but also from one another. Life can be hard, and to practice one's faith in a complex world is often challenging. For me, it's a comfort to know I'm not alone in my walk with Jesus. Not only does he encourage me, I also feel support and encourage-

ment from my brothers and sisters in the faith when I am with them at church. By participating in church, we make ourselves available to offer support to others as we ourselves are strengthened by God's presence and by the presence of our brothers and sisters in Christ. Therefore, it's important for us to be in church, not only for the support we receive, but also for the support we render to others just through our presence.


LET'S WELCOME FR. GARY BUTTERWORTH ON SUNDAY, OCTOBER

PROJECT DRAWDOWN CONTINUES: Each month the TEAM is featuring a "Drawdown solution" from "Drawdown – The Most Comprehensive Plan Ever Proposed to Reverse Global Warming." Each solution is ranked by it's effectiveness in reducing greenhouse gases by avoiding emissions and/or by sequestering carbon dioxide already in the atmosphere. In the book Drawdown, each solution is measured and modeled to determine its carbon impact through the year 2050, the total and net cost to society, and the total lifetime savings (or cost). The exception to this are the "Coming Attraction" solutions, which are a window into what is still emerging. For these solutions, cost, savings, or atmospheric impact were not measured, but illuminate technologies and concepts whose growth continue to be watched.

# Materials: Refrigerant Management

October

Every refrigerator and air conditioner contains chemical refrigerants that absorb and release heat to enable chilling. Refrigerants, specifically CFCs and HCFCs, were once culprits in depleting the ozone layer. Thanks to the 1987 Montreal Protocol, they have been phased out. HFCs, the primary replacement, spare the ozone layer, but have 1,000 to 9,000 times greater capacity to warm the atmosphere than carbon dioxide.

In October 2016, officials from more than 170 countries met in Kigali, Rwanda, to negotiate a deal to address this problem. Through an amendment to the Montreal Protocol, the world will phase out HFCs starting with high-income countries in 2019, then some low-income countries in 2024 and others in 2028. Substitutes are already on the market, including natural refrigerants such as propane and ammonium. Scientists estimate the Kigali accord will reduce global warming by nearly one degree Fahrenheit. Still, the bank of HFCs will grow substantially before all countries halt their use.

Because 90 percent of refrigerant emissions happen at end of life, effective disposal of those currently in circulation is essential. After being carefully removed and stored, refrigerants can be purified for reuse or transformed into other chemicals that do not cause warming. ("By the Numbers" is how this solution is ranked overall among all the *Drawdown* solutions.)

#### BY THE NUMBERS

- ⇒ #1 Rank and Results by 2050
- ⇒ 89.74 gigatons reduced CO2
- ⇒ Implementation cost: Data too variable to be determined
- ⇒ \$-902.77 Billion net operational savings

Impact: Our analysis includes emissions reductions that can be achieved through the management and destruction of refrigerants already in circulation. Over thirty years, containing 87 percent of refrigerants likely to be released could avoid emissions equivalent to 89.7 gigatons of carbon dioxide. Phasing out HFCs per the Kigali accord could avoid additional emissions equivalent to 25 to 78 gigatons of carbon dioxide (not included in the total shown here). The operational costs of refrigerant leak avoidance and destruction are high, resulting in a projected net cost of \$903 billion by 2050.

Pledge receipts through the end of August totaled \$252,482, compared to projected pledges of \$235,740. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$269,945, while we projected income to be \$275,327. We ended the month with a negative income variance of \$5,382.

The negative variance in income was offset by expenses which were less than budgeted amounts by \$4,832. When these savings were applied to the negative income variance of \$5,382, our income less expenses resulted in a deficit of \$550 at the end of August.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts as we enter this transition period for our ministries at Grace.
