Parson to Person

Dear People of God,

Due to a delay in finalizing the Bishop's visitation schedule for 2014, I just heard at the Clergy Conference last week that our Bishop, Porter Taylor, will be visiting Grace in January for his Parish Visitation and Confirmation. That means we only have November and December to prepare folks for Confirmation! Gulp!

Confirmation is the time when two

things happen. First and most importantly, people reaffirm their faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and vow to follow Him in the Episcopal Church. Secondly, since this is the *Episcopal* Church, people are officially received into this communion through the laying on of hands by a bishop. The Greek word for bishop is *episcopas*, and the *Episcopal* Church is one overseen by bishops.

Two groups of people normally prepare for Confirmation. One is made

up of young people for whom it represents a coming of age rite. For our young people from 12-18 years of age, this is the time when they affirm for themselves the faith that was affirmed for them at baptism. This is why, at Confirmation, the question is asked, "Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil and do you renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?" The Candidates for Confirmation are reaffirming and renewing because this was first done for them at their baptisms. It is an event when young persons say for themselves that they renew their commitment to Jesus Christ and, with God's grace, will follow him as their Savior and Lord. When young people have done this, they become confirmed adult members of the Episcopal Church and are eligible to serve on Vestry and represent us at our Conventions.

The second group of people we

normally prepare for Confirmation consists of those who are either coming to the Christian faith as adults or who have been Christians in another part of Christendom, but were not confirmed by the laying on of hands by a bishop in apostolic succession. The other parts of Christendom whose bishops *are* in apostolic succession, meaning the laying on of hands, can be traced back

to the Apostle Peter. They are the Roman Catholic Church and the Orthodox Church. When someone joins the Episcopal Church from one of these churches, the bishop lays hands on them and recognizes them as "already confirmed members" of Christ's One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church and simply receives them into our communion.

If you are an adult or a young person over the age of twelve who has not been confirmed or received,

I would urge you to call me and let's work out a plan to prepare you for Confirmation between now and January, either through classes or independent study. The advantage to taking the classes and\or studying for Confirmation is that it really orients one to the practice of the Christian faith in the Episcopal Church. The study, however it is done, will answer scads of questions – some you may not have even thought of yet. (Details on p. 4)

Being confirmed will equip you to continue growing in your Christian faith and following Jesus more closely. Young people and adults, please call me at 828-254-1086, ext. 14, and let's get you enrolled in a class or started in independent study.

Adult Confirmation/Inquirers' Classes

Adult Confirmation/Inquirers' classes will be held on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 p.m. beginning November 5. Each class will last one hour. These classes will continue through Tuesday, December 12. If you are a couple with children and this interferes with evening activities and bedtimes, one member of the couple may attend the classes for both of you, you may alternate coming to the classes week by week. These are also called Inquirers' classes because they are a way to learn about the faith as practiced by Episcopalians, with no obligation to be confirmed at the end of the process.

Since the classes are only one hour long, they will be action-packed! It's guaranteed that no one will fall asleep! We will use our time wisely and will cover a lot of ground at each class. As Fr. Gary said in this issue's "Parson to Person" article, knowing more about the practice of the Christian faith as Episcopalians will help you grow in your Christian faith. ABCCM FOOD DRIVE. We will hold our final food drive of the year for ABCCM this month. In the pews Sunday, November 10, look for grocery bags with lists of items needed for the food pantry and for the shelters. We will then collect and bless the bags you fill at all three services on Sunday, November 17. As you have probably read in the newspaper, this year has seen a big increase in the number of people who are using food pantries and other agencies to obtain food for their families. During the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons, let's come together to provide as much as we can to help these hungry residents of Western North Carolina.

OPERATION SHOEBOX. Once again we will be collecting shoeboxes for Christmas for children who live in poverty overseas. There will be a display in the foyer with information on what to put in your shoebox and how to pack it. Items such as school supplies (pencils, paper, crayons), hygiene items (toothpaste, toothbrushes, combs), and small toys are examples of gifts that can be packed in the box. The shoeboxes will be collected on Sunday, November 17. This is a great project to share with your children.

ANGEL TREE. Can you believe that it is already time to put up our Angel Tree in the foyer and find Christmas gifts for foster children in Buncombe County? The tree, which will go up around Thanksgiving, will be decorated with angels, each with the name and age of a child and that child's Christmas wishes. Remember as you take the name of a child that the list is "wishes." You do not have to buy everything on the list, just as you would not buy everything your child or grandchild has asked for. But please note, the number of children who have come into custody and foster care as a result of abuse and neglect during 2013 is the largest ever for the foster care system here, and although foster parents *do* get a stipend for the children's care, it does not include money for things like Christmas presents.

Since Christmas falls on a Wednesday this year, the Department of Social Services has requested that presents be returned the week of December 16. Please return your gifts to the church by SUNDAY, DECEMBER 15. Remember to include your angel with the presents to make sure we get the gifts to the child who requested them. If you are unable to take an angel but would like to bring in one or more presents for a child, please label them and bring them to the church and we will get them to a child who wants them. HABITAT FOR HUMANITY. We continue to build Episcopal House X in partnership with Habitat and area Episcopal churches. Tenth-grader Noah Clary was the guest preacher on Sunday, October 20, as we celebrated National Children's Sabbath.

Many of you have requested the following transcript of his homily.



Hello. My name is Noah Clary and I have been attending Grace Church for 4 years. I am in the 10th grade. Today I want to simplify the readings to a few basic ideas, and then explain how to use them in our everyday lives. The first reading today tells about sitting at the side of God in heaven. The disciples James and John asked to sit at the right and left hand sides of Christ. However, in the book of Revelation, it talks about how we are the "bride" of Christ. We will all sit at the right hand side of Christ as one. James and John got their wish, but we will also inherit their gift. We must remember that we should attempt to act like one with Christ in all that we do, and that even when there might not be any consequences, we are still representing our God. The second part of the reading talks about not being great by surpassing others, but that how, by being

a servant to all, we are great. There are a great many ways to serve people around the world, from providing food to giving care. Christ teaches how if we do not serve others like he serves us, we will never learn of his grace to us. We should serve not only who we know, but those in need who we don't know. Grace Church, in particular, has always, from my perspective, done everything it can to give to the community around it. We do many projects such as the Backpacker Program, Steadfast House, and Room at the Inn. We have many groups of people, like those who attend service regularly, those who lead service projects and teach Sunday schools, and those who lead the church as a whole such as Father Gary. We do it to see the appreciation and love on the faces of those we have helped. By helping in our everyday community and giving to others, we represent Christ's love for us. The big question to everyone in this congregation is, how much can you give to the people around you?

MEDITATION FOR WEEK ONE

Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets" (Matthew 22:37-40).

MEDITATION FOR WEEK TWO

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things (I Corinthians 13:4-7).

Love never gives up. Love cares more for others than for self. Love doesn't want what it doesn't have. Love doesn't strut, doesn't have a swelled head, doesn't force itself on others, isn't always "me first," doesn't fly off the handle, doesn't keep score of the sins of others, doesn't revel when others grovel, takes pleasure in the flowering of truth, puts up with anything, trusts God always, always looks for the best, never looks back, but keeps going to the end (I Corinthians 13:4-7--The Message).

MEDITATION FOR WEEK THREE

Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another (John 13:34-35).

MEDITATION FOR WEEK FOUR

Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:43-45a).

Jesus said, "You are familiar with the old written law, 'Love your friend,' and its unwritten companion, 'Hate your enemy.' I'm challenging that. I'm telling you to love your enemies. A Healthy September Rally

September proved to be a healthy month with Pledges of \$36,797, bringing year-to-date Pledges to \$270,737 or \$737 over budget. This is very encouraging as we move into the last quarter of the year. When combined with all other income, September's Income totaled \$45,222, bringing year-to-date Total Income to \$333,022. Since total budgeted Income for the first nine months was \$334,968, a negative variance of (\$1,946) resulted. This is a mix of under budget Open Offerings and Building Income.

September Expenses totaled \$32,500 and were \$4,719 under-budget, primarily due to the timing of Operations and quarterly Personnel costs. Since September Income of \$45,222 exceeded September Expenses of \$32,500, a surplus of \$12,821 resulted for the month. This positive variance brought year-to-date operations to a healthy positive variance of \$13,191.

Budgeted expenses left to be paid in the remaining months of this year total \$111,656. It is our continued prayer offerings will meet those needs.
