Good Morning, Grace!

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,

Good Morning, Grace. These were my first words in my first sermon at Grace. They have continued to roll off my tongue easily here. The welcome I have received has been wonderful and I look forward, with hope and excitement, to many months of hard work, joy and the love of Jesus Christ.

Coming into a parish at this time of year is unique. The rector is usually faced with Stewardship time and so we hear and read stewardship talks, sermons, articles, and listen in on conversations. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we didn't think of

this time as a "time" at all, but as part of our daily living so that "stewardship" became a part of our spiritual selves as we live by faith with Christ?

Ín the 17th Chapter of First Kings, the prophet Elijah is engaged in an epic struggle with King Ahab over the worship of pagan gods. At one point, God sends Elijah, for safety and refuge, some distance away from King Ahab:

Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying "Go now to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and live there; for I have commanded a widow there to feed you." So he set out and went to Zarephath. When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, "Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink." As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, "Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand." But she said, "As the Lord your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die.'

Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. For thus says the Lord the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the Lord sends rain on the earth." She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. The jar of meal was not emptied,

neither did the jug of oil "When we give, fail, according to the word of the Lord that he spoke to Elijah. (I Kings 17:8-16)

> Unlike the widow of Zarephath, none of us face starvation and utter deprivation. Nonethe-

less, the wisdom of our culture tells us that we don't have enough stuff and that we had better hold onto what we do have lest we run out of stuff. Such an ethos of scarcity generates fear. Yet, we find in the Bible that the wisdom is often reversed. The first will be last, and the last will be first. It is in dying to ourselves that we get our lives back. If we choose to be rich in spirit, we somehow become rich in spiritual things. It is in giving that we receive.

The Scriptures strongly suggest that one of the bedrock principles of God's kingdom and grace is: When we give, we get back – some way, somehow. The widow of Zarephath witnessed this first-hand.

I choose to believe that we witness first hand this counter-cultural reversal and richness here at Grace in our worship, fellowship, study, and outreach. Please think about the widow of Zarephath as you consider your financial commitment this year and you will be blessed by your generosity.

Since then we have had two other meeting — one at St. James and the other at St. Mary's. Both focused on getting to know each other, with discussion about faith and what faith looks like. We had eight kids at St. James (all eight from St. James) and five kids at St. Mary's (three from St.

Mary's, one from St. James, one from St. John's), so overall a good turn out and everyone left with smiles on their faces!

Hopefully we will continue to grow and learn together! We are continuing our weekly Sunday afternoon activities — combined middle and high school gatherings on November 4 at Grace, 1:00-3:00 and November 11 at St. James, 1:00-3:00.





PROJECT DRAWDOWN CONTINUES: Each month the TEAM is featuring a "Drawdown solution" from "Drawdown – The Most Comprehensive Plan Ever Proposed to Reverse Global Warming." Each solution is ranked by it's effectiveness in reducing greenhouse gases by avoiding emissions and/or by sequestering carbon dioxide already in the atmosphere. In the book Drawdown, each solution is measured and modeled to determine its carbon impact through the year 2050, the total and net cost to society, and the total lifetime savings (or cost). The exception to this are the "Coming Attraction" solutions, which are a window into what is still emerging. For these solutions, cost, savings, or atmospheric impact were not measured, but illuminate technologies and concepts whose growth continue to be watched.

Food: Reduced Food Waste

November

A third of the food raised or prepared does not make it from farm or factory to fork. Producing uneaten food squanders a whole host of resources—seeds, water, energy, land, fertilizer, hours of labor, financial capital—and generates greenhouse gas-



es at every stage including methane when organic matter lands in the global rubbish bin. The food we waste is responsible for roughly 8 percent of global emissions. Losing food to one waste heap or another is an issue in both high- and low-income countries. In places where income is low, wastage is generally unintentional and occurs earlier in the supply chain—food rots on farms or spoils during storage or distribution. In regions of higher income, willful food waste dominates farther along the supply chain. Retailers and consumers reject food based on bumps, bruises, and coloring, or simply order, buy, and serve too much.

There are numerous and varied ways to address key waste points. In lower-income countries, improving infrastructure for storage, processing, and transportation is essential. In higher income regions, major inter-

ventions are needed at the retail and consumer levels. National food-waste targets and policies can encourage widespread change. Beyond addressing emissions, these efforts can also help to meet future food demand.

BY THE NUMBERS

- ⇒ #3 Rank and Results by 2050
- \Rightarrow 70.53 gigatons reduced CO2
- ⇒ Global cost and savings: Data too variable to be determined
- ⇒ Impact: After taking into account the adoption of plant-rich diets, if 50 percent of food waste is reduced by 2050, avoided emissions could be equal to 26.2 gigatons of carbon dioxide. Reducing waste also avoids the deforestation for additional farmland, preventing 44.4 gigatons of additional emissions. We used forecasts of regional waste estimated from farm to household.

This data shows that up to 35 percent of food in high-income economies is thrown out by consumers; in low-income economies, however, relatively little is wasted at the household level.

JOIN US AS WE REVIVE "GRACE MOVIE NIGHT" AT CRAGGY

PRISON. Grace Church has a long history of ministering to the inmates at nearby Craggy Prison. It has always been a blessing to the inmates and to the volunteers from Grace who facilitate. Unfortunately, attendance at movie night



has fallen off recently, and the priority now is to rebuild attendance and encourage more involvement from Grace parishioners.

Every Thursday evening in the Craggy Prison Chapel, we have "Grace Movie Night." The Chapel workers put this program together and run it, but there must be a facilitator present or no assembly can take place. We are down to just two people for this special ministry, and it would be really great to find a few more folks to share the load.

There is some paperwork involved to get inside the fence, but once it's completed, you get your "blue card," and your name is on the list for admittance. We show up at about 6:15 p.m. and go through a metal detector (after a couple of visits, you learn what shoes and belts, etc. not to wear). Then a guard escorts us to the chapel and the chapel workers are called. When they are set up, the general call is made. Next comes the meet and greet, handshakes and smiles as the guys come in. After that, there is a call to order, a standing moment of silence, recitation of the Lord's Prayer, and then, the movie begins. When the show is over, a benediction or some other blessing is made and they are dismissed. Our role is to say goodbyes and answer any questions. Often someone will ask for prayers or some other moral support. Then the guard escorts you out.

Attendance for "Grace Movie Night" has fluctuated, and now, our priority is to once again fill the chapel with inmates, fellowship, prayers and blessings.

Pledge receipts through the end of September totaled \$283,288, compared to projected pledges of \$265,208. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$302,153, while we projected income to be \$309,742. We ended the month with a negative income variance of \$7,589.

The negative
variance in income was
offset by expenses, which
were less than budgeted
amounts by \$17,040.
When these savings were
applied to the negative

expenses resulted in a
surplus of \$9,451 at the
