and Savior Jesus Christ,

Happy New Year to all, and best wishes for everyone in 2019. The last three months have been a blessing to me as I have entered into the life of Grace as your Interim rector. I thank you for your hospitality, acceptance, patience and love.

Christmas has come, but it is not

over (that's one of the many things that are great about being an Episcopalian). As Episcopalians, Christmas comes and then continues for twelve davs after Christmas until The Feast of the Epiphany. One parishioner sent me an email the other day that listed the Christian significance to the song "The Twelve Days of Christmas." I had never

heard this before, so I researched it and found that there does indeed appear to be a Christian connection. Here is what they shared:

The partridge in a pear tree is Jesus Christ.

The Turtle Doves are the Old and New Testaments.

The Three French Hens equal Faith, Hope and Charity, the Theological Virtues.

The Four Calling Birds are the Four Gospels and/or the Four Evangelists.

The Five Golden Rings are the first Five Books of the Old Testament, the "Pentateuch", which gives the history of man's fall from grace.

The Six Geese A-laying represent the six days of creation.

The Seven Swans Aswimming are the seven sacraments.

The Eight Maids A-milking represent the eight beatitudes.

The Nine Ladies Dancing are the nine Fruits of the Holy Spirit.

The Ten Lords A-leaping represent the ten commandments.

The Eleven Pipers Piping represent the eleven faithful apostles.

The Twelve Drummers Drumming are the twelve points of

doctrine in the Apostle's Creed.

Now, no one can be sure that this was the intent of the author, but as in all things, there is no doubt a bit of truth wrapped around it and it never hurts to discover a new meaning to an old tradition.

Following the Twelve Days of Christmas, The Feast of the Epiphany arrives. The Epiphany (Greek for "to manifest" or "to show"), is a Chris-

tian feast day which celebrates the "shining forth" or revelation of God in human form in the person of Jesus Christ. The Feast of the Epiphany falls on January 6 and falls on the last day of the Twelve Days of Christmas. As Western Christians, we also commemorate the visitation of the Magi to the child Jesus on this day representing his manifestation to the Gentiles.

In closing, let me encourage all of us to embark on 2019 with Christ in mind; to view and treat each and every day as miniature incarnations, where we are constantly being made new through the love of God and the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Let us see the good in all people, help all people and love all people...especially one another.

Women and Girls: Educating Girls Education lays a foundation for vibrant lives for girls and women, their families, and their communities. It also is one of

the most powerful levers available for avoiding emissions by curbing population growth. Women with more years of education have fewer and healthier children, and actively manage their reproductive health.

Educated girls realize higher wages and greater upward mobility, contributing to economic growth. Their rates of maternal mortality drop, as do mortality rates of their babies. They are less likely to marry as children or against their will. They have lower incidence of HIV/AIDS and malaria. Their agricultural plots are more productive and their families better nourished.

Education also shores up resilience and equips girls and women to face the impacts of climate change. They can be more effective stewards of food, soil, trees, and water, even as nature's cycles change. They have greater capacity to cope with shocks from natural disasters and extreme weather events.

Today, there are economic, cultural, and safety-related barriers that impede 62 million girls around the world from realizing their right to education. Key strategies to change that include:

- make school affordable;
- help girls overcome health barriers;
- reduce the time and distance to get to school; and
- make schools more girl-friendly.



Kenya has made significant gains in education, with more than 80 percent of all boys and girls currently enrolled in primary schools. In secondary schools, the rate of enrollment drops to 50 percent for both boys and girls. Poverty is the main cause of low overall enrollment, and given socioeconomic norms, boys receive priority for higher education when there are financial constraints.

BY THE NUMBERS

- 59.6 gigatons reduced CO2
- Impact: Two solutions influence family size and global population: educating girls and family planning. Because the exact dynamic between these solutions is impossible to determine, our models allocate 50 percent of the total potential impact to each. We assume that these impacts result from thirteen years of schooling, including primary through secondary education. According to the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, by closing an annual financing gap of \$39 billion, universal education in low- and lower-middle-income countries can be achieved. It could result in 59.6 gigatons of emissions reduced by 2050. The return on that investment is incalculable.

Pledge receipts through the end of November totaled \$346,342 compared to projected pledges of \$324,143. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$368,976, while we projected income to be \$378,573. We ended the month with a negative income variance of \$9,598.

The negative variance in income was offset by expenses which were less than budgeted amounts by \$23,083. When these savings were applied to the negative income variance of \$9,598, our income less expenses resulted in a surplus of \$13,485 at the end of November.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts as we enter this transition period for our ministries at Grace.
