### A Message from Fr. Gary

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

As our children are returning to school and beginning to learn new things, we parents and adults will be grateful for some of those things and not so grateful for others you know...those lessons learned on the playground, in the locker room, on the football field, at dances... things that tend to bring about that irrational behavior in our beloved little ones. I ran across an article recently by Missy Morain, Program Manager for Christian Formation at the National Cathedral, and it speaks directly to this topic. Here are a few excerpts.

"Being a young person in the world

today is a mixture of opportunities and expectations. Each person encountered has a different series of expectations and desires, which range from useful to downright ludicrous. At the start of a new school year we as members of the Body of Christ have an opportunity

have an opportunity to make new commitments to the young people in our worlds. "Manhood and Womanhood are free

"Manhood and Womanhood are free gifts from God. Adulthood is earned. The gift of manhood and womanhood like most free gifts comes with some strings attached; much like a "free gift with purchase" offer. That purchase is adulthood. Adulthood is only learned through relational community. One learns to be an adult through others and with the help of others. Our Judeo-Christian tradition provides some of the best models within which to become an adult.

"This model of becoming an adult begins in one of the first biblical stories, the story of Adam and Eve. Adam and Eve were the first to get this free gift of manhood and womanhood from God but they too had to learn their adulthood. Their time of learning occurred in Eden and their rather harsh introduction to adulthood occurred just prior to leaving. The world of introduction to adulthood is perhaps only slightly less difficult now and yet our young people are still filled with the fire and energy of creation in the same way that Adam and Eve were. It is no wonder that God chose a young woman, Mary, to be the vessel by which God came into our world. Who else but a young person would have had the fire, determination, and sheer gumption to say "yes" to God? Who else but a young person would have been able to say "This is totally going to flip my parents out...sounds like a great idea!"?

"As adults on the journey with our

the journey with our young people we have a special charge when it comes to our youth. We have to guide with intelligence the young people of our world. We have an obligation not to use this gumption to our advantage, to not manipulate the young people in our midst. We must assist in the learning process,

model the behavior of adults and walk with our youth in their formation pilgrimage as we continue in our own formation. Maybe through this mentorship we can earn back a little bit of that fire and gumption, earn back that energy to continue to change the world and to continue the creation of God's world which began back in Eden."

As we begin this new formation year with our youth remember that we need them as much as they need us and that we are making this journey together. We have many opportunities to journey with our young people. If you feel called to lead classes, work with the youth group, or mentor, let us know. Your reward will be rich.

September Makes ABCCM Sweat for Food. ABCCM staffers are sweating it, hoping they'll have plenty of food in the pantry this fall. In response, we're holding a food drive from September 8-22 to help ABCCM's Crisis Ministry serve hot meals and food bags to our neighbors and friends who are struggling with hunger. Foods needed include: canned meats (spam, stew, ham); canned fish (tuna,

salmon); canned goods (chicken, beans, soups, vegetables), and fresh & canned seasonal fruits. Also needed are cooking oil, hot & cold cereal, jellies & juices, pasta and sauce, saltine crackers, self-rising flour and sugar. As always, the needs are huge and we urge you to shop early and often for these vital supplies. Bags and a list will be available in your church pew by September 8. Thank you in advance for your on-going generosity in the project.

And one last big thank you to everyone who contributed to our matching project to buy **pregnant goats for Consider Haiti!** Through your generosity, we bought seventeen goats!

**PASTORAL CARE.** The Pastoral Care Ministry provides a number of traditional services:

- Feed My Sheep, which arranges for food to be available in the freezer at Grace Church for those who are, for one reason or another, unable to cook for themselves;
- **Cards and Calls**, an important contact ministry that recognizes parishioners on important days in their lives with a card or a personal phone call;



- Friends in Christ, the ministry that provides home or hospital visits, takes the Eucharist to those who request it, and sends cookies at Christmas and Easter baskets during Lent;
- **Purls of Grace**, the ministry that gives hand-knitted shawls that have been blessed by the rector to those in need of comfort for any number of reasons in addition to health concerns.

We have also added two new ministries in the past year: A Daily Prayer Request form that is available on the back table in the Church to add special requests for that day that can also be used to add a name to the prayer request list; and Recycling prescription pill bottles to be sent to developing countries where containers for prescription medications are scarce.

## Still Time to Register for EfM



EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EfM for short) is starting at Grace Episcopal Church. It is being started because there has been a strong interest expressed by some of our parish members and friends of Grace Church to sponsor an EfM MINISTRY Study Group.

What is EfM? It is a student driven four year course based on an adult learn-

ing model. It is more than just a Bible, Christian History, and Theology class. It is an education program that encourages group discussions on important theological and Christian issues such as: Living Faithfully in Your World – working with the contexts of a person's life; Living Faithfully with Plurality – living faithfully in the global village; Christian Maturity – where our Christian values come from and how did they develop over the centuries; Engaging the Journey to God - personal journey and Christian life.

What is so special about EfM? The EfM classes are small (6-12 people) with 1-2 Mentors. The group becomes close and delves into deep discussions about our personal lives and Christian experiences as well as what is happening in the world around us. We also discuss how we as individuals can improve our Christian life and experiences as well as contribute to the well-being of those around us.

Participants sign up for one year at a time. Reading & Reflections include: Year 1 – Old Testament – Hebrew Bible; Year 2 - New Testament; Year 3 - Christian History (3,000 Years); and Year 4 - Theology for a Troubled Believer/My Neighbor's Faith.

So, what are the plans for EfM at Grace? The structure of the course is set forth in the curriculum, but we all come to it in our own learning style and with our own emotional and intellectual needs. We will meet one evening per week in the library at Grace from September/October through to mid-June each year. Class will probably be from 5:30 or 6:00 p.m. through 8:30 p.m. on Thursday evenings.

Cost: Since Grace Church will be sponsoring this EfM Group, the cost will be \$375 per person per year (includes Registration/Books). An Incentive Program from Fr. Gary for this first year offers a \$ 200 scholarship to each student.

## Income Continues to Exceed Expenses in June

Pledge receipts through the end of July totaled \$204,795 compared to projected pledges of \$199,543. Considering all income sources, income received for the period totaled \$273,146 while we projected income to be \$248,796. We ended the month with a positive income variance of \$24,350.

This positive variance is largely the result of a decision by the vestry to transfer a portion of a recently received bequest for funding the discernment process (\$10,000); using a one-time donation from a parishioner (\$10,000) received for operations; and transferring the savings from 2018 (\$23,144) to use for operations in 2019. These additions totaled \$43,144 and were included with income. In July, \$12,500 from the Endowment Fund in support of our shared youth missioner was added to miscellaneous income, further increasing our income surplus.

Expenses through the end of July totaled \$241,206 while we projected expenses to be \$254,285. These savings totaled \$13,079 for the first seven months this year.

As a reminder, the budget is \$9,410 in deficit to provide support for key programs even though projected income was unavailable. Thus far, with income exceeding projections and with continued savings on expenses, it is likely that our deficit will be resolved. As we proceed through the year, we will continue to monitor and adjust to eventually eliminate this shortfall. In the meantime, parish financial reports will reflect an unbalanced budget.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts as we journey through this transition period for our ministries at Grace.
