A Message from Fr. Gary
Greetings in the name of our Lord and young family that v

Savior Jesus Christ!

A new school year is in full swing, the change of seasons is upon us, fall is in the air. And so, an appropriate question is, "Where is Jesus in your lives as parishioners of Grace as well as members of our community here in North Asheville, Weaverville, Leicester and all the other communities we call home?"

Many of you who have been at Grace for years may shudder at the thought that Grace is

a smaller church than it used to be. But it's the truth. Church attendance is decreasing all across the nation; yet, at the same time, we have much to offer a hurting and broken world. These two opposing views

place us in a position of great tension. We are realizing the challenges we face as a smaller church with regards to time, money, and resources.

During this time of transition, as we shine a light in some of the dark corners of our past, we are beginning to realize some of the real challenges we face. Here at Grace, we are facing the challenge of figuring out how God is calling us to live, move and have our being in our community. It seems that volunteering for needed positions as well as becoming involved in certain ministries lack enthusiasm.

I remember, as a young parent, hearing some of our more "established" parishioners say "We have done our time; it's time for the younger people to take over." This might seem logical to some, but is it what God is calling you and me to do or be? We are all on this Christian journey, and as Brian McLaren writes in A Generous Orthodoxy, "we are all unfinished Christians." A Senior Warden from my past shared with me some of her mother's advice about belonging to a smaller church, "When you take off one hat, you need to ask yourself what new hat am I going to pick up?

In the article "Oversized Expectations," The Rev. Kyle Childress writes, "I remember a young family that visited one Sunday morning. Several people in our church knew them and had invited them. I was excited. They were new to town, looking for a church, had two small children, and both adults were active with environmental issues, something our congregation is heavily involved in. But when I went to see them in a follow-up visit, they said, You have a good church, but a person has to work too hard to be a member of your church. We don't have time to work that hard.' They end-

ed up joining a much "Where is Jesus in your larger church.
Their criticism was

valid. It does take a lot of work to be in a smaller congregation. Many people visit a smaller church thinking that it will be simple and quaint, when

the truth is, life in smaller churches is complex. Members of a smaller church have multiple roles and responsibilities. Many activities and ministries are multigenerational, both because the church is too shorthanded to do otherwise and because it is endemic to being a smaller community."

In smaller churches we need everyone to serve. Everyone is responsible. It takes all of us to prepare and bring food and eat together. Old and young people, parents and children, singles and couples sing together, break bread together, pray together and play together. It is not simple; it is not polished and certainly not glitzy. It is loud, chaotic, and complex, at times dysfunctional and emotional, but it is who we are at this stage of our Christian journey, it is who we are and who we have been called to be.

It is also coming to that time in the year when we ask for your help and assistance with dedicating your time and treasure, so we can continue the journey toward becoming what God is calling us to be.

So, in the upcoming months when you are asked to take on a ministry or help others accomplish a ministry, serve on vestry, prepare a meal or something else, take a look in the mirror and see which hat you are wearing.





Dinner with UNCA's Episcopal Campus Ministry. Come help Grace welcome the ECM! Monday, October 21, we will host a home-cooked potluck supper for the ECM students and their leader Megan Cox. Serving family style using our round tables we want to have lots of parishioners come out and welcome these students. Just think back to your late teens, being away from home, and how important a welcoming meal was. It's really about the fellowship more than the meal. They'll come around 6:30 and have a meeting following. In addition to dinner, time permitting, we may offer a history/tour of the church and the windows. Watch for sign-up sheets and more details coming to a foyer in your church soon.

Grace Feeds Lazarus Twice. True to a recent Gospel reading, Grace has fed Lazarus twice in one week, first with the Pig Pickin' where four families of the Grace Community redeemed discounted tickets offered to them, and again with the forty bags of food collected and delivered to ABBCM, where one volunteer said: "Your food came in the nick of time...our shelves were almost bare."

Steadfast House is a community of single women, mothers with children, and female veterans. Currently located in North Asheville, their mission is to provide comprehensive services to help women and families move from homelessness to stability. Steadfast House provides programs that focus on education, training, personal skill building, and reintegration into communities. The program, supported by ABCCM, will soon move to the new Transformation Village. Grace Church has been providing a monthly meal to the residents of Steadfast House on the second Friday of every month. Typically, we have had three rotating teams of 2-5 people, who make, deliver, and serve a meal to the 35-45 residents of Steadfast House. Currently, there is a need for more volunteers to maintain our existing schedule of operations. This program will be changing



Produce Truck at Grace Beginning Wednesday, October 2. Grace is teaming up with the YMCA to host a Produce Truck in the church parking lot distributing free fresh produce on the first Wednesday of every month, 5-6:00 p.m. In bad weather, we will use the foyer of our parish hall. In addition to fresh produce, healthy recipes and easy to understand information is

often included. The produce is available to all who show up, with no questions asked. As we all know, access to fresh produce is often not available, especially to those on a limited budget. The YMCA offers free produce markets across five counties in WNC.

The "Y" provides the produce, tables to put it on, and "know how." Grace provides a few friendly faces to help set up and greet people. We need four to five volunteers each month for less than one and half hours. Larry and Lucy Bowen are coordinating with Grace and the "Y", and will be there monthly. One year ago, I wrote you about how busy a year we had had, and how much lay in front of us. So where are we, a year later?

Father Gary Butterworth approaches his one-year mark as our interim, a year spent helping us look at who we are and, as he says, "shining the light in corners we have neglected over the years in the past" and helping us identify our needs and aspirations as we move forward in the discernment process.

Paul Vest is leading the Discernment Committee in their work of expressing and identifying who we are as we search for a new rector.

We have a new web page almost ready to roll out.

We're about to update the look of our parish hall and foyer to contemporary standards with new paint, window treatments, doors, and technology to help us tell our story.

We've explored moving to two Sunday services and found opportunities for fellowship with breakfast and coffee hour. We've just reached the end of our trial period of two Sunday services and are reaching

out to you for your thoughts on what our Sunday schedule should be.

Jim Cassarino has joined us as our new Director of Music and we welcome his family—wife Elise, daughter Celeste, and son Peter—to Grace Church, to Asheville, and to the South.

And once again, we've covered—or will soon cover—our yard with pumpkins, as sure a sign of fall here as anything. This year, we've started a different approach to building our church budget. Instead of building the budget to limit our ministry, we've asked ministries to share their vision for the future with the Vestry. Instead of thinking of how we can pare our vision down to fit our budget, let's create a vision that inspires us to give.

This month, we kick off our fall stewardship campaign, "Shining Christ's Light, Sharing Christ's Love, Making God's Love Visible." In Matthew 25, Jesus tells us "Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." Expenses Lower Than Expected for First 8 Months

Pledge receipts through the end of August totaled \$227,044 compared to projected pledges of \$228,049. Considering all income sources, income received for the period totaled \$296,604 while we projected income to be \$284,338. We ended the month with a positive income variance of \$12,266.

This positive variance is largely the result of a decision by the vestry to transfer a portion of a recently received bequest for funding the discernment process (\$10,000); using a one-time donation from a parishioner (\$10,000) received for operations; and transferring the savings from 2018 (\$23,144) to use for operations in 2019. These additions totaled \$43,144 and were included with income. In August, \$12,500 from the Endowment Fund in support of our shared youth missioner was added to miscellaneous income, further increasing our income surplus.

Expenses through the end of August totaled \$278,097 while we projected expenses to be \$290,611. These savings totaled \$12,514 for the first eight months this year.

As a reminder, the budget is \$9,410 in deficit to provide support for key programs even though projected income was unavailable. Thus far with income exceeding projections and with continued savings on expenses, it is likely that our deficit will be resolved. As we proceed through the year, we will continue to monitor and adjust to eventually eliminate this shortfall. In the meantime, parish financial reports will reflect an unbalanced budget.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts as we journey through this transition period for our ministries at Grace.
