Message

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,

This is the time for stewardship talks, sermons, articles and fund drives. Wouldn't it be nice if we didn't think of this time as a "time" at all but as part of our daily living so that

"stewardship" became a part of our "Christian living!"

I happened upon a past letter from one of my previous Stewardship chairs

and wanted to share it with you.

"When I think about the gifts God has given me, my first thoughts are my family and my career. My next thoughts are what I will call my 'real' thoughts, and they have to do with those little things that make the difference between the mundane and the joyful: my mother's face as we savor a delicious meal she has prepared; a moment of kinship in Sunday school or after church; the tearful embrace of a friend; some ridiculous, highly animated phrase my spouse says in a fit of our mutual laughter.

It is God who creates these moments and allows them into our hearts and into the full recognition of our minds, so we recognize them for what they are: They are the smallest slivers of Heaven on earth, which God gives us to remind us of the joy awaiting us when we are done here.

So what are we doing in the meantime? We work, we play, we retire. We buy things, we buy time, we buy services, both for ourselves and others. We do these things for our own comfort, for the comfort of our friends and family, maybe even to impress an individual or a group from whom we seek recognition; but most of all, at the very heart of the matter, we do these

things to get a taste of those moments of Heaven, the perfect life that we all strive for, yet never attain except in those wonderful fleeting moments.

These sacred moments cannot be purchased. These moments will be with us whether we earn \$1200 or

\$10,000 per month, whether our children have college expenses or need braces, whether our relatives are in the hospital or have fallen on hard times. These moments, I believe,

may be part of the reward of recognizing that every gift, every moment, everything we have is borrowed.

We should not give of our gifts simply because we ought to, or simply because our church needs us; we should give because we are 'trustees' of these gifts, charged by God with the obligation to see them grow, making them as fruitful as possible. We give because we love."

These words encapsulate three important points: 1) What we have is not ours, but on loan to us from our loving God; 2) we are trustees for the future generations who will call our church "home"; and 3) we are called to give because of love! Love of God and neighbor, rich or poor!

It is now that time of year when we are once again called to make our financial pledge or promise to the advancement of the Kingdom. By doing so and increasing your pledge from last year, Stewardship time becomes a time of joy when you are able to "give back" to God so that your stewardship becomes an integral part of your "Christian Living."

Outrageous Grace Outreach!

Often, we don't get involved because we don't have enough information. In the months to come, the Grace Outreach Committee will be spotlighting parish outreach programs. We'll also be sharing some outrageous new ideas with you about what outreach might look like in our future.

According to recent surveys and conversations, there is a yearning here at Grace for "outrageous outreach" - the kind that not only writes a check or meets a need in a crisis, but also advocates for social and institutional change that offers long-term impact.

Just think about it. Homeless people have little access to showers and laundry facilities. What if we had a mobile shower/

laundry trailer that was available to meet those needs? What if we figured out a way to better utilize our space and provide a food pantry or a thrift store or both? Who are the people in our midst with the skills and willingness to challenge core issues related to homelessness and affordable housing, food insecurity, healthcare, justice, human dignity and equity for all? Our population is aging. Could we put together a ministry that helped us age safely and comfortably in place? People come into the church office every day in need. What if we gave them vouchers to nearby gas stations and grocery stores and regularly reimbursed those partner retailers? Yes, it's outrageous. But what if...?

This is a change for us in how we have traditionally looked at outreach. Clearly, to make it work, it's going to take planning and a lot of creative involvement from a lot of people. Are you one of them? Let's start the conversation with your feedback, questions, great ideas and volunteer support!

Discernment: Where We Are Now

Dear Grace Family,

Thank you for your interest, input, and prayers over the past several months. We have completed the first phase of our important work. This process has been intentionally discrete, even from our spouses and families. I hope the monthly updates in the *Grace TEAM* have helped you stay patient. We are right on track with the schedule prescribed by the diocesan

recommendations when we began.

Here's a recap. In March, your discernment committee was called and commissioned by the vestry to drive the search for a new rector. In April, we held a daylong retreat with our diocesan support, Canon Augusta Anderson, to learn about the selection process and build a team to work together for 12+ months. Vestry liaison Lorie Tola and others began building our new website to help tell the story of Grace Church and support the calling of our new rector. Hopefully, by now you have seen that website. In June, we launched the Church Assessment Tool (CAT) and received a 54% response rate in collecting insights to the opportunities and challenges we share as a congregation. In late July, we held a joint 3-hour meeting with the vestry to hear the results of the CAT and how we, as a committee, can use this data to identify the needs of the church. (To review an executive summary of this report, please pick up a copy on the table in the hallway outside the church office or click here). In late August, we invited all parishioners to participate in three Holy Conversation opportunities. Sally Withers led the effort in bringing fun and food to these events, and we "got our groove on" as we shared personal experiences, hopes and dreams for Grace. Over 100 people participated in these events with thoughts and feedback that confirmed the information we received from the CAT.

Throughout this 7-month period, the committee has met, prayed, laughed and dreamed about what lies ahead for all of us. All the while, Kim Hayes has led the effort to compile the collected information into a "Parish Profile." I firmly believe this work has been Spirit-led. We have been blessed by Kim's gifts and talents, and at least 50 hours of her time, to produce a profile that has been identified as "one of the best ever seen." The profile has been blessed by our vestry and the bishop and can now be viewed publicly on our website by clicking here. The profile will be used to invite candidates to be considered for our next rector. As of November 1, we are open to receive applications. Feel free to share this with anyone that you hope will apply. Applications and resumes will be accepted through the end of the year.

For now, we will rest and wait.

Thank you again for your ongoing thoughts, prayers, and patience. We would also like to thank our vestry for their confidence, Canon Augusta Anderson for her guidance, and Valerie Heavens for administrative support. If you have any questions or concerns regarding the work of the discernment committee, please bring those to our attention directly.

From Our Senior Warden

Fall is traditionally stewardship time. While we normally think of our time and treasure, stewardship also means taking care of our community. Two surveys come together to give us a vision of our Grace Church community. The first is actually not a survey: the CAT, which we completed back in the spring tells us something many of us sense: that Grace is at a low point in its corporate life right now. Yet in that realization is hope that we can re-engage as a community and bring new energy to our parish. To this end, I share these thoughts regarding the survey we conducted regarding worship services at Grace. 75% of the respondents see the 10:30 as a positive change, and many identified the change as bringing about better community. The 25% who prefer the former service schedule raise issues that we must address: a schedule that is beneficial to young families and a more contemporary style of service. So here is the work we need to do to reengage the parish. Many see this as a choice between the old service schedule and the new. But there's another way to approach this: why don't we look forward and create a new service? Let's work for a new vision for our corporate worship, one that builds community and welcomes new families into our parish.

Another important aspect of stewardship is taking care of what others have given us, in this instance, our beautiful church. The Vestry has retained the services of Mike Cox, FAIA to evaluate our roofs and oversee their renovation. This will be a major initiative, and we'll share more information as we move forward.

As we do this work, I ask that you consider what you can give to support our ministries at Grace Church. Help us build a community that shares Christ's light and shines His Love on our world.

More About the Service Times Survey Fr. Gary Butterworth
Our service times survey is complete and the data is being analyzed by the Worship Committee and the Vestry! What we

Our service times survey is complete and the data is being analyzed by the Worship Committee and the Vestry! What we discovered is that about 75% of the congregation is happy with the current two service times schedule. The other 25% are not necessarily unhappy but do have concerns that they would like to see addressed by parish leadership. I like to think of those 25% as "wondering" what might be done to change their concern to a positive.

25% of the congregation is a significant number, so parish leadership takes your comments and concerns seriously. Please know that we are addressing your concerns. When we studied and discussed the results we looked for common threads. Here is what we discovered:

September Ends Positive

Pledge receipts through the end of September totaled \$257,933, compared to projected pledges of \$256,555. Considering all income sources, income received for the period totaled \$329,465, while we projected income to be \$319,880. We ended the month with a positive income variance of \$9,585.

This positive variance is largely the result of a decision by the vestry to transfer a portion of a recently received bequest for funding the discernment process (\$10,000); using a one-time donation from a parishioner (\$10,000) received for operations; and transferring the savings from 2018 (\$23,144) to use for operations in 2019. These additions totaled \$43,144 and were

included with income. In September, \$12,500 from the Endowment Fund in support of our shared youth missioner was added to miscellaneous income, further increasing our income surplus.

Expenses through the end of September totaled \$319,458 while we projected expenses to be 326,938. These savings totaled \$7,480 for the first nine months this year.

As a reminder, the budget is \$9,410 in deficit to provide support for key programs even though projected income was unavailable. Thus far, with income exceeding projections and with continued savings on expenses, it is likely that our deficit will be resolved. As we proceed through the year, we will continue to monitor and adjust to eventually eliminate this shortfall. In the meantime, parish financial reports will reflect an unbalanced budget.

We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts as we journey through this transition period for our ministries at Grace.

Concerns: A number of respondents asked us to find ways to reduce the length of the 10:30 service. Additionally, the preponderance of concerns centered on finding a better way to synergize elements of both the previous 9:00 and 11:15 services. Some feel the current 10:30 is heavily weighted towards the previous 11:15.

Overall we feel good about the honesty, transparency and integrity of the process and the responses. As we move ahead, here are some of the things we are studying or have already begun addressing:

1) The priest will now do announcements, which over the last few weeks has resulted in a 5-10 minute savings; 2) Our Director of Music will be factoring in comments regarding the 9:00 service into the musical selections; 3) The Worship Committee continues to fine tune and creatively address the liturgy; and 4) we are looking at how the current 8:00 service will alternate seasonally between Rite I and Rite II and possibly include a prelude/postlude as well as incorporating one hymn sometime in the future.

These actions as well as the monthly gatherings of the Worship Committee provide a method, as well as process, to adapt to our new service times while at the same time maintaining the traditions, faithfulness and integrity of the Episcopal liturgy. Please know that as members of Grace Church you are all de facto members of the Worship Committee and are encouraged to communicate or attend whenever you have a concern or new idea.

As we move forward, parish leadership has unanimously decided that we will stay with the current two service time format for the foreseeable future. As members of Grace Parish you are our "BEST" advocates. If you have concerns or hear of others who have concerns, please share with them what you have learned here and encourage them to communicate their specific concerns and desires.
