A Message from Rev. Milly

Dear Good People of Grace!

Happy November to you all! It is hard to believe we are deep into the autumn season, that the Pumpkin Patch has ended already (Best year yet!), and that our worship team is planning our Advent and Christmas season. In the ambiguousness of the pandemic and the unknowing of what is to come, life it seems, continues on.

Life out there and life at Grace is in full motion! Even in the unknowable mystery, our work here is gaining clarity and purpose of mission about how God is calling us to love God, Love ourselves and Love neighbor well.

To that end, your Vestry met in retreat Saturday, October 18, all day at Kanuga Retreat Center. It was a beautiful and chilly day...but we enjoyed the outdoors and the company of one another. We began with words from the Presiding Bishop as he addressed our call to become the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus Movement (https://vimeo.com/144415761).

The vestry also read this article (https://www.ecfvp.org/vestry-papers/article/774/stretching-our-strategic-imagination-part-1) to help us consider how we can use our Sacramental Imag-

ination to become that which we have received, which is the Love of God. It also addressed how, as a church, we are being called to build a movement that invites all to Walk the Way of Love; and how, as a church, we can Love our neighbors as Jesus has called us to do, and as we have committed to in our Baptismal Covenant.

Your Vestry spent time considering how our values of community, love, patience, generosity, honesty, transparency, resilience and tradition are lived out at Grace. Here, we are seeking clarity about vision, mission and purpose in the direction God is calling us to grow and move.

Joe Aull took time with us to answer all our budget questions and to begin our conversation about what a 2021 Budget looks like at Grace. Does the budget reflect what we say we value? Are we stewarding well that which God has given us?

We looked at the needs of staffing, and considered if and when we should call an Associate Rector and what that person might add to our growing community.

BEST PUMPKIN PATCH EVER! Thank you to everyone – volunteer unloaders, sellers, depositors, technicians, shoppers, our front loader operator, even our truck driver, whose timely delivery allowed us to unload in record time! You all contributed to an absolutely amazing Pumpkin Patch. Even though we lost some of our pumpkins due to an after dark "hoodlum adventure," and in spite of a couple of rainy weekends, sales this year were off the charts, and by Sunday, October 18, we had completely sold out! Repeatedly, shoppers told us how glad they were to see us up on the hill this year. It was a little bit of normalcy, they told us, in an otherwise very abnormal year.

And we now have a final count. **Consider Haiti will net a whopping \$12,681.00** in proceeds from this annual event, passing last year's total by over \$2,500!



A THANK YOU FROM CONSIDER HAIT!! On behalf of the Board of Consider Haiti, I would like to express profound gratitude to Kim Hayes and the Outreach Committee, to Anne Simmons who handled the finances, and to Reverend Milly for all their work and support in making this year's Pumpkin Patch the best ever. We sold out in 21 days and the donation to our work was more than \$12,000 - biggest ever. Consider Haiti, like many nonprofits, is struggling in this difficult time, so this donation will go far in allowing our work to continue.

Our thanks to the greater Grace community also for help and support in unloading all those pumpkins, in tending the patch, and buying pumpkins! We hope that our work together will continue as it has for many years.

What You Might Not Know about Our Pumpkins



FROM FARM TO TRUCK TO CHURCH! Have you ever wondered where all those pumpkins come from? We did. So, after doing a little research, here's what we found out:

• The pumpkins (44,000 pounds of them this year!) are

grown, harvested and shipped by a family-owned, 75-year-old organization called "Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers." Originally, they were grown right here in North Carolina, but after suffering damages during Hurricane Hugo, the farming operation was relocated to the Navajo Indian Reservation in Farmington, New Mexico. In cooperation with the Navajo Nation, the organization grows 1,200 acres or approximately 2 square miles of pumpkins and employs over 700 Native Americans during the harvest months of September and October. They also have a full-time off-season New Mexico staff comprised entirely of Native Americans. Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers offices are still located in Greensboro, North Carolina.

- There is no financial risk to Grace Church and Consider Haiti. A profit is guaranteed! The pumpkins come to us on consignment, no upfront costs, no product to pay for. We are not responsible for any unsold pumpkins. Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers absorbs any loss due to spoilage, breakage or theft and in return, they receive a percentage of what we sell. As they put it: "It's a wonderful partnership of trust!"
- Pumpkin pricing is pre-set by Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers. The more pumpkins we sell, the bigger our percentage of sales becomes. This year, we sold a total of \$31,702.50 worth of pumpkins. Consider Haiti netted 40% of that amount—a record-setting \$12,681!
- Grace Church receives no part of the proceeds from the Pumpkin Patch. The entire amount supports the work being
 done by Consider Haiti, a local organization that Grace has proudly partnered with
 for approximately fifteen years. The Pumpkin Patch is Consider Haiti's biggest
 fundraiser of the year.




Parish News, Updates & Reminders

VIGIL FOR THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED, NOVEMBER 1. In just over six months the world has lost over a million lives due to COVID 19. As humans, we cannot ignore or minimize the impact of that kind of loss and grief on our souls and bodies.

Grace invites our congregation to gather in vigil to acknowledge our collective lament on November 1, 2020, in celebration of The Faithful Departed. The service, held outdoors on our lawn, will be prayer and Taizé, with a time to light candles in honor of those faithful departed. We will begin with music at 5:00 p.m. on the lawn and will end by sunset around 6:00 p.m. All are welcome. Masks are required. We will have candles or you may bring your own. No need to register; just come as you are able.



ADVENT STUDY: "LOVE IS THE WAY" BEGINS NOVEMBER 29. This Advent season, join your community in a study of our Presiding Bishop's newest book; "Love is the Way: Holding on to Hope in Troubling Times." Led by Rev.



Milly, we will meet on Zoom at 1:00 p.m. on Sundays, beginning Sunday, November 29, and continuing through December 20. All are welcome to attend, but please register here: https://tinyurl.com/GraceAdvent. Book purchase and reading is required before the beginning of our group. What better way to prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ at Christmas than to prepare ourselves to walk the way of Love. Walk the path of love with one of the warmest, most beloved spiritual leaders of our time, and learn how to put faith into action. As the descendant of slaves and the son of a civil rights activist, Bishop Michael Curry's life illustrates massive changes in our times. Much of the world met Bishop Curry when he delivered his sermon on the redemptive power of love at the royal wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle at Windsor Castle. Here, he expands on his message of hope in an inspirational road map for living the way of love, illuminated with moving lessons from his own life. Through the prism of his faith, ancestry, and personal journey, "Love Is the Way" shows us how

America came this far and, more important, how to go a whole lot further. The way of love is essential for addressing the seemingly insurmountable challenges facing the world today: poverty, racism, selfishness, deep ideological divisions, competing claims to speak for God. This book will lead readers to discover the gifts they need in order to live the way of love: deep reservoirs of hope and resilience, simple wisdom, the discipline of nonviolence, and unshakable regard for human dignity.

Milly is committed to being available and deeply engaged in the care of this community. And yet, as a solo priest with no assistant or deacon, she needs a strong team of lay ministers to assist in this essential work.

And that team is becoming a reality! For the last two weeks, a growing pastoral care team has been meeting via Zoom on Wednesdays at noon. This group is made up of members of Grace who have been deeply involved in pastoral care for years. Their experience and relationships are invaluable now.



pastoral care for years. Their experience and relationships are invaluable now, as Rev. Milly grows to know the Grace community. This last week, the Pastoral Care Team met and established a central mission and regular weekly tasks.

The mission of the Pastoral Care Team at Grace Episcopal Church is making the compassionate presence of Christ known through intentional connection and through the physical and spiritual care of those in need.

Their weekly tasks are to pray for all people on the prayer list, to make regular phone calls to those on the prayer list, to visit when possible those who are homebound or in need of care, to connect through cards of celebration or sympathy, to bring the Eucharist (when safe and possible) to those who request the sacrament, to be aware of and provide for the basic needs of those among us who are struggling with transportation, food, clothing or assistance.

We have all been given the work of caring for and loving one another. This Pastoral Care Team is the body that will help to organize this care at Grace. We invite any among you to join us in this work if God is calling you to extend yourself in care of your neighbor. We meet every Wednesday at noon via Zoom. Parishion Generosity Unaffected by Pandemic

After nine months of 2020, we have received pledged income of \$254,804; income from all sources totaled \$323,859. Mission, Operational, Program, and Personnel expenses at the end of September 2020 totaled \$276,613 and were \$14,518 less than those forecast in the budget approved by the vestry in their June meeting.

The approved budget includes a small deficit, \$4,758.25, but thus far in the year, we are experiencing a surplus. The surplus is largely attributable to the receipt of our Paycheck Protection Program loan of \$34,900 and several onetime gifts received early in the year coupled with savings resulting from our limited operations. While we have filed for forgiveness of the PPP loan, we will not know until later this year or

The current health crisis has not yet affected our financial situation adversely. Parishioners have been generous through September and our expenses have been restricted with our confinement. We prayerfully hope that this positive trend will continue as we all adapt to a new normal.
