A Message from Rev. Milly

Dear Good People of Grace,

"2021 Lent has been cancelled." This was the opening line to my Ash Wednesday service this year, halfjoking. Because for sure, if we have not learned that we are dust and to dust we shall return, we never will. If we don't know we are going to die; that in fact, we are mortal...no 40 days of Lent will teach us that.

The last year has been difficult, all this fasting from what and who we love, all this sacrifice for the good of others. All this death and fear. So, clearly, we know we are dust, we know we are mortal. But do we know we are teeming with life? That even in the midst of such difficulty, even in the midst of this season of Lent and winter's edge, that we are teeming with life?

My friend Phillip Hassett put out a beautiful and profound message to the community and he gave me permission to share it with you. He says:

"Old Testament scholar Ellen Davis translates the Hebrew word "Adamah" as "fertile soil." This word is part of the pun in Genesis 2, where God creates a human (Adam) out of the Adamah.

This translation is used in the Common English Bible translation, and so Gen. 3:19, from which the text for the administration of Ashes on Ash Wednesday is taken, is rendered: "you are soil; to the soil you will return."

This has resonated deeply with me ever since I first read it. And especially a year into a pandemic, where we have been so intensely reminded of our individual and collective mortality every day, I find this comforting. Dust is dry, dead, lifeless, nothing. But soil—fertile soil—is itself alive and full of the things needed to support life. It is teeming with life and potential.

And so too are you: you are full of life and potential for growth. Even if that growth has been limited during the past year, you still have the possibility of nourishing growth. And even when you die, the things you helped grow during your life will help nourish and feed other life and growth.

We are fertile soil, and to the fertile soil we will return."

Perhaps as we enter the interior of the Lenten Season, we are being asked to fast from all that keeps us from that potential and possibility, all that keeps us from sowing seeds in this fertile soil of our lives.

Look around, Spring is coming. Look around. I am not giving away the punch line here, we know Resurrection has the final word. Look around, you can smell it, you can see it pushing forth from the cold ground. Signs of new life, signs of fertile soil. Life, death, new life...this is the ancient and sacred path. As we prepare for new life found in Spring and Easter Resurrection, I invite you to ponder anew your potential...no matter how old or young, successful or winded, ill or well. No matter your condition on this earth, you have potential and are still full of life, you are still fertile soil waiting for the right seed to fall at the right moment. As we dig deeper into this season of Lent, prepare yourself to participate, to collaborate with God in the coming Resurrection.

Till the fertile soil of your soul, New Life awaits.

"Raise the Roof" Fundraising Campaign Begins

Our campaign is now underway for installing the new roof and repairing the stone parapets on our church, along with doing the associated structural repairs, masonry work and preventive maintenance.

The roofing project is expected to take four months with the most work being dedicated to the craftsmanship necessary for repairing and restoring the stonemasonry of our 116-year-old church. Doing so will help fix and prevent water leaks, improve energy efficiency, preserve the history and beauty of our church, and make the job of installing shingles in the future more efficient.

Funding-wise, we estimate we will need to raise \$200K from a capital campaign to go along with the designated funds and Capital Reserve. The campaign offers parishioners ways to give tax-deductible contributions, including giving assets with accumulated gain values, like stocks. How and What to Give

Giving by Mail:

You may send a check made out to Grace Episcopal Church and mail it to: Grace Episcopal Church, 871 Merrimon Avenue, Asheville, NC 28804. <u>Be sure to put on the</u> <u>MEMO line "Roofing Fund", so it is not counted as a</u> <u>pledge.</u> The amount given will appear on your quarterly statement.

Giving on the Website:

Under "Give to Grace", click "Donate Now by Clicking Here". Under "Fund", click "Special Gift-Raise the Roof", and then fill in the rest.

Giving Stocks:

You may donate gifts of long-term, appreciated stocks, bonds or shares of mutual funds. Please contact your financial advisor, stock custodian, or brokerage firm for information regarding transfers of stock, etc. So that you do not pay capital gains, the stocks, bonds or shares need to be transferred to an account that Grace has established with **Parsec Financial**. You will need some of the following information to make the transfer:

After all the above has been completed, please send an email to Anne Jarema, Treasurer, giving information on your stock, bonds or shares. Please specify in your email that monies are for the "Raise the Roof" campaign. Also, please seek the advice of your financial advisor on valuation for tax purposes. Upon receiving monies from the stock, etc. sale by Parsec Financial, a thank you letter will be sent to you with the amount Grace receives.

Giving from a Traditional (Taxable) IRA:

If you are 72 and must take the RMD in 2021 from a taxable IRA, you may want to consider donating the RMD through a Qualified Charitable Distribution (up to \$100,000). It must be a direct transfer from the financial advisor or brokerage firm to Grace Episcopal Church. Grace will send you a separate thank you letter giving the exact amount.

For information on reporting the QCD, please visit IRS.gov and consult your financial advisor. If you have already donated the RMD, you may not be eligible for this donation. However, you can start taking money out of your IRA penalty-free at age 59 ½.

Timing and Planning from Jr. Warden Jim Compton:

- Final preparations to sign the contract with Scott MacAlister of Cornerstone Construction are underway.
- Projected start date is March 1. The contract specifies 150 days to complete the job with a number of days figured in for bad weather, and no work on Sundays.
- The handicapped parking space will be temporarily relocated, and the parking spaces along the front lawn will be designated as a construction zone.
- A plan submitted by Mike Cox of Architectural Design Studio in November of 2019 revealed issues that, in addition to replacing shingles, required attention to the stone walls and flashing.
- The first part of the project will involve removing the capstones of the four gables, installing a water barrier and then replacing each stone in its original position. A groove will be cut parallel to the roof to receive new counter flashing.
- The roof itself will then be addressed, including sagging between rafters. Waterproof barriers, copper valley flashing and 45-year shingles for the entire roof will then be installed.

"As the work on our new roof progresses, we ask your prayers for all involved. May everyone work safely together. And may the old stones, the new materials, and the weather cooperate."

Vestry Report from Our Sr. Warden

Your Vestry held its monthly meeting on February 15. As you can probably imagine, one of the main topics of discussion was the roof project and the campaign to pay for it.

We received a report from our Treasurer, Anne Jarema. Anne told us that the PPP loan we received last year has been forgiven by the Small Business Administration and our bank, which helped offset the dip in revenues due to the pandemic.

Turning to the roof project, Anne presented the anticipated timeline of payments to the contractor and identified four funds to be used for the project – the Chiott and Mason bequests, the Capital Reserve, and of course, the Roof fund, which includes a contribution from the Endowment, as well as some donations that have come in. I know elsewhere you've been reading about the "Raise the Roof" campaign, so I won't belabor the point here, other than to say, please help us out where you can.

We heard from our Junior Warden, Jim Compton, that we are aiming for a March 1 start to the roof project (though that is now looking like a week or two after that). Jim also discussed revisiting the plans and funding for the Fellowship Hall project, and efforts to be undertaken to address issues with trees on the grounds, including our recently designated "Treasured Trees."

Rev. Milly's report touched on work done on issues related to regathering, and we discussed plans and proposals regarding what we can do as a faith community to address the short-term needs of our house-less neighbors, thrust into our consciousness by the DOT's clearing of the encampment under I-240 at Lexington St earlier this month.

One of many innovations Rev. Milly has brought to us is the addition of a "Wisdom Chair" to our Vestry meetings. This position rotates among former Vestry members. The Wisdom Chair sits in on the meeting, without participating in discussions or votes, but rather as an observer. At the end of the meeting, the Wisdom Chair shares with us her or his thoughts on how the meeting went and, as the title implies, nuggets of wisdom for how to make future meetings even better. This month's Wisdom Chair was Jackie Schauer, whose comments and insights were well-received and appreciated by all.

Valerie is available to share the recordings of our Vestry meetings with all of you. I hope that you'll avail yourself of this resource by emailing grace.church.asheville@gmail.com or calling the church office. We are committed to transparency in all we do on the Vestry, because this is your church. We're only temporary stewards in these roles.

I've said this before, but it's worth repeating that I've never been prouder to be a member of this church and this community. Amen!

A Success Story from Haiti. Shebno Saint-Georges is one of the very first children enrolled in the [Consider Haiti] program in 2009 in Guibert (locality near Fond-Baptiste). [He is probably] 18 or 19 now. ... his parents could barely provide for his food and school needs. He suffered from malnutrition. He had the face of a little old man. Although he was over the age required to be enrolled, [it was] decided to include him in the group of children who were going to be the first enrolled. He received a pregnant goat which ... gave birth to three young. In the meantime, Shebno is slowly recovering from his malnutrition... To pay for his school fees and buy class materials, Shebno's parents had to sell goats each time from the population of his goats. At the end of 2020, thanks to his goats, Shebno finished his classical studies. Shebno is very grateful to have been among the very first to enroll in the program.

In 2019, we here at Grace Church raised money for the purchase of pregnant goats for this Consider Haiti

COVID-19 Vaccines Available



According to NCDHHS guidelines, if you are a healthcare worker, or 65 years of age or older, you are eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccination. UNC Asheville has joined forces with the Mountain Area Health Education Center (MAHEC) in the global fight against COVID-19. Starting on Feb 19 through early summer 2021, UNC Asheville and MAHEC will operate a COVID-19 immunization site at the UNC Asheville Reuter Center located on

1 Campus View Road in Asheville. The indoor site will operate as vaccines are made available by the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services. The site is scheduled to operate on certain days depending on vaccine availability. Appointments are required. No one without an appointment will be allowed to enter.

Hopeful that Positive Trend Continues in 2021

After one month of 2021, we have received pledged income of \$37,057; income from all sources totaled \$68,755. The 2021 income from pledges and open offerings almost replicates January 2020. Both totals include about \$15,000 in prepaid pledges from the prior year. Removing the prepaid pledges, we are pretty much on target related to budget. Funds from last year's surplus totaling \$29,905 were brought back into operating income for 2021. Administrative, Mission, Operational, Program, and Personnel expenses at the end of January 2021 totaled \$417,885 and were \$29,760, less than the \$33,849 in the budget approved by the Vestry in December 2020.

The approved budget included a deficit of \$25,618, and the Vestry is hopeful that this will be reduced as the year progresses. As programs and offerings expand, we anticipate greater participation and involvement in both the spiritual and financial life of the Parish. The budget is based also upon a hopeful resumption of normal parish life later this year.

We closed last year on a very positive note given the turmoil we all experienced. Parishioners have been generous and our expenses have been restricted with our confinement. We prayerfully hope that this positive trend will continue in 2021. The stewardship effort for operating year 2021 provided pledges totaling \$315,540 of the \$385,000 goal. Pledges continue to be received
