Dear Good People of Grace,

We have all been waiting for a long time to be brought home, to be gathered back in. It has been a long Lent and an even longer year.

Roof Construction Begins! Take a Look!

Grace's parking lot is now the scene of a work crew, a roof-high scaffold, and an aerial platform bringing the capstones on the roof back to the ground. Click <https://photos.app.goo.gl/bLbXD2rm2VGLA39dA> for a video update from Junior Warden Jim Compton.



On site is a stonemason removing the old mortar and repairing the stones, getting them ready to be placed back on the roof, this time with copper flashing for sealing out the rainwater, and with longer-lasting protection for our roof and structure. The roof shingles have been selected as well, thanks to Jackie Schauer and Jim Compton. The shingles will provide excellent, long-lasting protection from the elements and better complement the texture of the stone walls architecturally.




Sealing Water Out of the Parapet Stones

The dark seam of mortar between the stones running down to the window peak is evidence that water has penetrated the wall in several places. The water barrier installed under the parapet stones will seal the water out.



Preserving Roof & Structure with Proper Flashing & Sealant

Look at this patchwork of improper flashing, curling shingles, and exposed nail heads. You can also see the poor seal at the flashing's top edge to the stone as it goes upslope. Also, note the excessive use of sealant. Using the right flashing with the proper way of joining it with shingles will provide a superior way for preserving the roof and adjoining structures.



Applying a New Design for Longer-Lasting Protection

Using much wider "valley flashing" and waterproof barriers under the shingles will help us avoid problems like the one shown in the photo on the left. Also, see the swelling beneath the shingles on the roof of the Sanctuary and the pronounced sagging of the sheathing between the rafters on the right indicating the need for new and better roof sheathing.

Construction Phases for Our New Roof

Stonemasonry

(1) Structural Inspection & Repair

- Clean and inspect capstones and joints
- Remove three capstones at a time
- Install flashing along top of remaining wall
- Reinstall capstones to original position
- Dress new mortar joints

(est. time to complete #1: 2-3 months)

Roofing

(2) Roof Tear-off

- Remove gutters and downspouts
- Remove vents, shingles and all barrier layers

(est. time to complete #2 & #3:

1-2 months)

(3) Roof Replacement

- Inspect sheathing and replace as needed
- Install new barrier layers, fix counter flashing to stonework and install valley flashings
- Install new shingles, vents, gutters and downspouts

From Our Sr. Warden: Spring is Here Again!



Wow! It's really starting to feel like Spring around here! Birds chirping, flowers blooming, leaves starting to fill in on the trees. Oh, I know we may have another snow before the reliably warm weather returns, but I can't help feeling that this Spring is unlike anything we've seen in the past. Both in nature and metaphorically, there's so much new growth happening all around us, so much cause for optimism and excitement. Especially right here at Grace.

A year ago this time, we were full of trepidation and fear. Uncertainty gripped us like a vice. Tempers were short, and everyone was on edge. As hospitals filled up and the death toll began to rise from this disease, some of us felt forsaken, and many of us felt alone. This year feels so much different, doesn't it? So many of us have now been vaccinated. More restrictions are lifting each and every week. Schools are reopening. Sporting events are once again offering their customary escape. Concerts and festivals are coming back. The fear is all but gone.

And finally, the moment we've all been waiting for has arrived. Our Bishop has allowed us to re-open the doors at Grace to welcome in parishioners once again. Maybe not everybody at once, but this Easter Sunday, our new Rector, Reverend Milly Morrow, will for the first time be able to look out and see actual live human faces looking back at her from the pews of Grace Church as she preaches the Holy Gospel. Praise be to God!

In the coming months, we will all be able to gather again in groups both large and small. We will again hear the choir sing and the organ play. Children will chatter and scamper around. We'll eat meals together in the parish hall and the parking lot. We'll sip (or chug) cold beverages while we belt out Gospel tunes with Monty at the PubSing.

We will meet in person once again as we study the Bible, as we teach and learn from each other, and as we dream and plan and strategize how best to leverage our plentiful assets to do God's work. We will grow in numbers and in spirit as we spread Christ's love all over the place.

I feel like we have all learned a lot about ourselves and our church during the past year. We've learned how resilient we are, both individually and collectively. We've learned how much we need each other. We have learned how to use Zoom, sort of. (Uh, Ben, you're muted.) We have learned that, despite our fears and doubts, God is always there for us, listening to our prayers and sending angels when we need them the most.

Yes, Spring is here again. The garden that is Grace Church is ready for planting. Amen!


How we read the Bible matters. Where we come from and our life experiences inform the way we understand what we read in the Holy Bible, and shape the way we follow the teachings of Jesus.



The idea for the Beloved Village was born as a new, innovative approach to creating deeply affordable housing where social connections and equity lead to better health, more opportunities and long-term stability. Beloved Asheville’s plan is to build a dozen 440-640 square foot micro homes on land in East Asheville as the first of many villages. They have completed their model home and members of Grace Church have a special opportunity to visit on Sunday, April 18. We will meet in the Grace parking lot at 1:00 p.m. and caravan to the site. Social distancing and masks are required. Make plans now to come see the “new face” of deeply affordable housing.

After two months of 2021, we have received Pledged Income of \$64,132. Income from all sources totaled \$98,122, largely as a result of carryover of end of year 2020 operating surplus. Pledged income tends to be higher at the beginning of the year due to prepaid pledges. The amount is somewhat less than last year's Pledged Income at this time.

Mission, Operational, Program, and Personnel expenses at the end of February 2021 totaled \$54,633 and were \$13,064 less than those forecast in the budget adopted by the Vestry. This difference is due to expenses less than the amount budgeted in all but Personnel, as the lock-down continues.

The approved budget includes a deficit of \$25,619, and the vestry is hopeful that this will be reduced as the year progresses. As programs and offerings expand, we anticipate greater participation and involvement in both the spiritual and financial life of the Parish. In the event that our optimism isn't rewarded, we do have sufficient reserves to adequately cover this possible shortfall.

- ◆ Abbreviated discussion of the roof replacement project and review of how your endowment will contribute to this project.
- ◆ Abbreviated review of the By-Laws regarding the allowable and required uses of the endowment funds.
- ◆ Continued discussion regarding a re-energized Planned Giving program. Planning has been on hold due to COVID 19 restrictions.
