A Message from Rev. Milly

Dear Good People of Grace,

Throughout the book of John, we find Jesus attempting to explain himself. Now, let's be clear, he wasn't defending Himself, He was attempting to build relationship with those around Him, by offering insight into who He was/is. He was using metaphors that were relatable for people in their particular context and time.

And Jesus said:

"I am the Bread of Life," "I am the Resurrection and the life,"

"I am the door or gate,"

"I am the vine,"

- "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life"
- "I am the Light of the World"

"I am the Good Shepherd"

"I Am"

And now, here we are in the middle of Eastertide and Jesus has risen, Jesus has ascended and the disciples are now out in the world, tending and feeding the flock.

And of course, we are being called to do the same. So our lectionary wisely circles back to the middle of the story, where we find Jesus explaining Himself to those who are curious, because if we are to go into the world "to all nations" in His name, we need to be reminded of exactly who He is and who we are.

Jesus is the Good Shepherd and we are the sheep. Jesus is the Vine and we are the branches.

Jesus is the Light and we are those who have walked in darkness.

Jesus has Risen, Jesus has ascended indeed! But Holy Scripture has left us with many ways of seeing the Christ all around us. Ways that help us better understand who Jesus Christ is and to better understand who we are, in relationship to Him.

So, what about for you? If Jesus were sitting with you at the table right now, what metaphor might He offer to you so that you could better understand who he is, and who you are? How might He explain Himself, so that you and He could understand one another and be in deeper relationship?

Perhaps Jesus might offer us;

- "I am the vaccine that has 100% efficacy," or
- "I am the gardener, you are the rose that blooms in winter," or
- "I am the river that flows north, you are the paddler."

Try it. Have fun imagining what Jesus might say to you to help you understand Him more deeply, and to understand yourself in relationship to Him.

This Eastertide is all about coming to know the Christ among us. Because, after we have come out of the Upper Room and begin the work of love in His name, we will see Him everywhere.

From Our Sr. Warden

As I write this, the verdict in the Chauvin trial has just been announced. A lot of prayers were answered today. More prayers are needed tonight. Justice is not a destination. It is a journey. For us Christians, it is a journey with Jesus guiding us down the path. Amen.

A recent Gallup poll reported that, as of last year, only 47% of Americans say they belong to a church, synagogue, or mosque. In this same poll, yearly from 1937 until the late 1980s, over 70% of Americans acknowledged their church membership when asked. But since the turn of the century, that number has steadily declined. Now, it has dropped below 50%. In other words, for the first time in a very long time, we selfacknowledged followers of the God of Abraham are officially in the minority in this country.

The authors of the study attribute much of the decline in church membership to the increasing number of Americans who express no religious preference. In other words, collective and organized worship of God is fading in popularity. More troubling, perhaps, are the numbers showing that formal church membership among Americans who do have a religious preference has declined. More and more of Abraham's followers are not buying what the institutional churches are selling.

Of course, the power of the institutional churches far exceeds their popularity. In no way are we in danger of being oppressed by the majority today. But wouldn't it be a good thought experiment to consider these statistics through the longer lens of history and compare the risks and benefits of being a Christian now to being a Christian in the first 400 or so years A.D., when Christians were truly a powerless minority.

Christianity in ancient Rome was a dangerous venture. Religion was especially important to the Romans. Within the Roman Empire, Christianity was banned, and Christians were fed to the lions for entertainment. The safest, most prudent decision an early Christian could make would be to turn away from Christ. Yet thousands persisted. Christianity not only survived; it flourished and prospered, becoming the world's largest religion.

The spark that fueled that exponential growth was the teachings, the message, and the story of Jesus Christ. That spark lives on amongst us here at Grace. Our church plays an enormously fruitful role in the everyday lives of our parishioners and the communities we call home. For us, Christianity is not simply an ideological affiliation. It is a comprehensive way of life.

I think it would behoove us to look to the example of the early Christians and not be concerned with whether we're popular or cool or whether our numbers are going up or down. None of that is as important as the message of loving one another that Jesus declared as Commandment #1. That is how we honor, praise and worship our Lord!

That, and we need to pay for this roof project! Check your mail and see Doug's letter on page 2 for more about how you can get involved.

stirring song that has the power to lift us up, and a few questions that you can reflect on with those you love.



Grace Outreach: What Can I Do?

Quarantined, what can I do to be the hands, feet and eyes of Christ in a suffering world? Too old, too busy, too burdened with my own problems, how can I advocate for those who struggle every day to find shelter, put food on the table, provide for their families? Just one individual in the midst of so many in crisis, what can I do to make a difference—right here, right now?

The Grace Church outreach committee is working for you right here, right now on projects and activities that will help and advocate for safe and affordable housing; for enough food for everyone; for affordable and adequate healthcare; for sanctuary for those living in fear; and for respect and equity for all.

OUR VISIT TO BELOVED ASHEVILLE'S TINY HOME PROJECT. On April 18, Grace Church gathered 26 of our members at Beloved Asheville to visit their Tiny Home project. This project is just one of the many actions Beloved Asheville has taken in response to their daily walk with people on the margins, with people suffering and with those who lack basic needs like housing, food, and connection.

While this Tiny Home Village is one response to the growing need for housing in Asheville, what Beloved really has is a vision of Community, not just housing. Even if a person gets a house and has food, "if they do not have love they have nothing" (1 Corinthians: 2). Beloved is building community, where love can grow.

And they have invited us to join them! We will soon have a community meeting about how we might engage Beloved Asheville in their work. In the meantime check out all that they are doing in this community at <u>https://belovedasheville.com/</u>.



ASHEVILLE AREA HABITAT FOR HUMANITY CHALLENGES HOUSING DISCRIMINATION. After discovering a racial covenant in a deed for property pur-

chased for the development of affordable housing, Asheville Area Habitat for Humanity is delving deeper into discriminatory housing practices in our community. The result is a powerful 18-minute video, *This Divided Land*. We encourage you to view it.

Anticipating a Bountiful Year as Grace Grows

After three months of 2021, we have received Pledged Income of \$95,354, including prepayments for the year. Income from all sources totaled \$130,809, largely as a result of retained earnings from the prior year. The amount is somewhat less than last year's Pledged Income at this time.

Mission, Operational, Program, and Personnel expenses at the end of March 2021 totaled \$86,331 and was \$15,215 less than those forecasted in the budget adopted by the Vestry. This difference is due to expenses less than the amount budgeted in all but Personnel, as social distancing remains. Expenses are expected to increase as the church reopens.

The approved budget included a deficit of \$25,619, and the Vestry is hopeful that this will be reduced as the year progresses. As programs and offerings expand, we anticipate greater participation and involvement in both the spiritual and financial life of the Parish. In the event that our optimism isn't rewarded, at present we do have sufficient reserves to adequately cover this possible shortfall.

The 2021 stewardship effort has provided \$315,540 of the \$385,000 goal. This amount is more pledged monies than had been received at this time last year. We anticipate this trend to continue as Grace attracts new members and we all look forward to reopening the church. We are prayerfully hopeful that this year will be a bountiful one as Grace grows.
