A Reflection from Fr. Mike

I've spent a lot of time recently reflecting on beginnings. Just five weeks into my tenure as your Associate Rector here at Grace, perhaps this is unsurprising. But I have found myself in the midst of so many sacred beginnings—not just the beginning of my own call, but Rev. Milly's installation, Arthur Johnson's baptism, and my first ever wedding at Grace! What an abundance of beautiful beginnings. And so it felt fitting to fetch my mail yesterday morning and

receive a quarterly newsletter from the Hartford Catholic Worker—the place where my faith journey began. Scrawled across the top of the newsletter was a quote from the Catholic Worker Movement's founder, Dorothy Day. It

reads, "Those who cannot see Christ in the poor are atheists indeed."

It is a bold statement from an exceptionally bold woman. At the heart of Day's audacious spirit was the notion that care for and solidarity with the materially poor could not be achieved through any government program, no matter how ambitious, but instead only through the dedicated works of everyday people derived from a sense of *love*. In other words, the Kingdom of Heaven is not programmatic, but lives in the spirit that guides our actions. It is found in actions small, but consistent. As a journalist wrote memorializing Day, "If

small is not always beautiful, at least it is human." Though our acts may seem small, we must seek companionship and solidarity with those who have been made to feel small by a disordered world.

I pray that this spirit may guide us as we end Ordinary Season and move toward All Saints Day on November 1. It may be predictable that efforts have begun to canonize Dorothy Day as a saint. Her advocates have often reminded others that she is already a

saint. The church does not make saints, but merely recognizes them. This year, let us reflect on those who have been made saints by God, and yet are unknown to the church. There are countless saints, unnamed and anonymous, whose lives ap-

pear insignificant through the lens of the world, but who are cherished in God's holy communion. As St. Paul reminds us in Hebrews, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it (Hebrews 13:2)." I suspect there are angels unknown—saints unknown—cast aside in poverty, sitting in detention at the border, grappling with the trauma of racism. How will we commit to receiving them?

THE GOOD INFECTION. Dear Grace, it's a colossal understatement to say that our lives are different from 18 months ago. We are more guarded than ever of our personal space and equally conscious of our fellow travelers' space. We are hypervigilant to neither catch nor spread the infection that has proved so devastating to our way of life.

But for us as Christians, we are also called to spread our faith and God's love throughout the world. Getting to know God is, in the words of C.S. Lewis, "the Good Infection." It takes on life because of who Jesus is. It infects every aspect of our being, and it is rather contagious. It spreads by contact, sometimes physical acts of charity, sometimes as an idea and often through relationships.

The most organic way for that to occur is by being in proximity with our neighbors and others in our communities and beyond. Hence, tension can arise between what we know is required of us from a public health standpoint and what God commands of us from a spiritual health standpoint. But through thought and prayer, I believe we can square these two calls.

Paul instructs us that in the face of all the challenges that life brings, this Good Infection of Christ in us becomes armor against the forces that seek to rob us of peace, hope and faith. Through our prayers, communion, and other spiritual practices, we are taking Jesus in to become part of us so that we can become who he has meant us to be.

There are ample opportunities for us to spread God's love in these challenging times. The pumpkins are here for our annual fundraiser benefiting Consider Haiti. And once again, that impoverished island nation is in desperate need of help. Refugees from Afghanistan will soon be coming to our area, and I hope we'll be able to extend support to them as well. The eviction moratorium has been lifted, and many will find themselves houseless. And right here at Grace, our stewardship season is upon us, where we seek commitments from parishioners to fund our operations for another year.

The Lewis metaphor of the Good Infection reminds me of one of my favorite songs of worship: "It only takes a spark to get a fire going / And soon all those around can warm up in its glowing / That's how it is with God's love, once you've experienced it / You spread His love to everyone / You want to pass it on."

Let us join together to spread the Good Infection of Christ's Love far and wide. Amen!

DECISIONS ABOUT IN-PERSON WORSHIP. COOK TEAMS NEEDED FOR TRANSFORMATION VILLAGE. The pandemic has wreaked havoc on many aspects of our lives including our outreach opportunities, but at least one of them is back and exponentially better than before!

ABCCM's Steadfast House, the shelter for women and children, is now Transformation Village, and it is aptly named. A few of us at Grace have toured the facility and are awed by its size, beauty, safety, and the hope and love that are abundantly apparent throughout the building. That hope is also reflected in the faces and carriage of the women and children living in Transformation Village. The women have access to beautiful clothes and delicious food for them and their children, daily living supplies, and in-house classes to help them learn skills and eventually transition to independent life where they can provide for themselves and their children

The new facility has a state-of-the-art kitchen, but still needs cook teams. For the past several months, a skeleton crew from Grace has been providing a fabulous taco bar on the second Friday of each month. We need your help to build back up

to a crew of four (4), four- to six-person cook teams so that each team can cook and serve once a quarter instead of once a month. Don't cook? No worries, the nice thing about a taco bar (or whatever your team decides to provide) is that there are plenty of items like sour cream, grated cheese, guacamole, and chips that you can just buy and bring. The cafeteria has a rolling salad bar stocked by area restaurants and the facility, so we don't need to supply salad, and they usually have plenty of sweets as well. Grace just supplies the main course, servers, and smiles.


\$25,000 GRANT AWARDED! We are delighted to report that the Human Hurt and Hope Fund of the Diocese of WNC has awarded a \$25,000 grant to BeLoved Asheville. The Cathedral of All Souls serves as Sponsoring Parish for this project in collaboration with four parishes in the Asheville Deanery: St. George, St. James Black Mountain, St. Mary's, and our own Grace Church.

Recognizing that faith communities are uniquely positioned to understand the physical/emotional/spiritual and social needs of Villagers, these five parishes collaborated this spring on a proposal to the Diocesan Human Hurt and Hope Fund to build communal infrastructure on-site at BeLoved Village. Our collaboration brought additional match-

ing funds to build walking paths among the houses, gathering spaces and structures that eventually may include a community building, pavilion, and a community garden. BeLoved residents will also be doing hands-on work to build the commons. Funds will be used primarily for materials.

We here at Grace are inspired by the Village residents as they live and work together to build infrastructure for longlasting community. And we are grateful to the Human Hurt and Hope Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of WNC for this extraordinary opportunity.

WORLD HOMELESS DAY 2021. World Homeless Day is an annual event on the 10th of October. The concept emerged from online discussions between people working to respond to homelessness from various parts of the world. The Inaugural World Homeless Day was marked on the 10th of October, 2010. Since its founding, World Homeless Day has been observed on every continent except Antarctica, in several dozen countries.

The purpose of World Homeless Day is to draw attention to people who experience homelessness needs locally and provide opportunities for the community to get involved in responding to homelessness, while taking advantage of the stage an "international day" provides.

Here at Grace, as our outreach focus turns more and more toward homelessness and the many critical issues it creates, we invite you to join us in wor-

ship Sunday, September 10, as we honor World Homeless Day during our 10:30 service. We will include special intercessory

prayers and a sermon focused on how housing insecurity relates to the message of Jesus. A portion of proceeds from the offering will be donated to Pisgah Legal Services, who are the region's foremost source of legal support for those at risk of losing housing.

GAL SERVICES provides free civil legal aid to people struggling to make ends meet in WNC. With early legal intervention, PLS can keep difficult housing situations from spiraling out of control and trapping families, seniors, children and other vulnerable people in poverty.

Budget Report for August 2021

After eight months of 2021, we have received Pledged Income of \$211,300, including prepayments for the year. Income from all sources totaled \$256,433, largely as a result of retained earnings from the prior year. If we did not have retained earnings from the prior year, we would currently be in a deficit position.

Mission, Operational, Program, and Personnel expenses at the end of August 2021 totaled \$245,966, and were \$24,824 less than those forecasted in the budget adopted by the Vestry. This difference is due to expenses less than the amount budgeted in all but Personnel. Expenses are expected to increase as the church continues to reopen and due to the addition of the Tech Director and the Associate Priest.

The approved budget included a deficit of \$25,619, and the Vestry is hopeful that this will be eliminated as the year progresses. As programs and offerings expand, we anticipate greater participation and involvement in both the spiritual and financial life of the Parish. In the event that our optimism isn't rewarded, at present we do have sufficient reserves to adequately cover this possible shortfall.

The 2021 stewardship effort provided \$315,540 of the \$385,000 goal. This amount is more pledged monies than had been received last year, although pledged receipts were more at this time in 2020. We are prayerfully hopeful that this year will be a bountiful one as Grace grows.
