Dear Friends of Grace.

Being from the North, I find winter in Asheville to be an absolute delight. Where I'm from, I have fond memories of shoveling a foot and a half of snow on Halloween while trick-or-treaters stroll by. Though this was an anomaly, it is safe to say that winter was something to be endured. It was almost always long and sometimes harsh. When I moved to Asheville, I remember being shocked by the fact that spring existed here. In my memory, March and April were months of frigid drizzles and the occasional snowstorm. To come to a place where March and April are pleasant, and with ubiquitous blooming of flowers, has been a great blessing. And yet, winter does exist in Asheville. And in the beginning of February, we find ourselves right in the thick of its embrace. I pray on these sometimes frigid winter days in the mountains you have an abundance of coffee, tea, and a warm fire to kick your feet up next to.

Though it can seem like a boring time, there is a deep spirituality to winter. As the temperatures drop, everything seems to slow down. Our life and commitments are pared down. Like the bears that surround our precious landscape, we, too, enter a kind of hibernation (or at least I do!). We have taken time to reflect on the year that has passed, and settle in to our commitments for the budding new year, growing in body and in spirit closer to the light that Christ invites us all to participate in.

In all seasons, I begin each day looking out three portrait windows that sit alongside my couch. Usually I have a hot cup of coffee clasped between my hands. It is fascinating to watch the landscape change with the seasons. In winter, my view carries on further than usual with the trees having dropped their leaves. With a particularly cold morning, I can see where snow has blanketed the mountaintops beyond, and where exactly that snow stopped falling as elevation decreased. As the landscape awakens to spring's arrival, frost and snow will be replaced by the budding of leaves, and eventually the flowering of rhododendron thickets in those same mountains. As Pete Seeger once wisely sung (I think he may have been quoting some earlier tradition), "To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven." Whatever season you find yourself in, I pray that God grants you the patience and the wisdom to find Christ's message within.

• February 7: Seeing Jesus as Healer and Teacher (Luke 6:17-26)


• February 14: Seeing Jesus as the Flow of Mercy and Love (Luke 6:27-38)

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MAKE STEWARDSHIP YOUR WAY OF LIVING. Greetings from your 2021-2022 stewardship team!


First, many thanks to all of you who responded so generously during the Stewardship Campaign and also in November and December when you heard Grace's further needs. You made it possible for us to move even closer to reaching our budget goal for 2022.

In the next few months, we will be focusing on stewardship as a way of living, as a perspective which is ever mindful that "the earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world and those who live in it" (Psalm 24). Everything we have we owe to God. Stewardship can help us remember the primacy of our relationship with God and of being conscious of each of God's blessings to us.

As part of the spiritual practice of year-long stewardship, we invite you to engage in the following exercise and to invite family members to join you. The intention of this exercise is to remind us of God's love to us and of our dependence on God. It is to help us be more aware of God's gifts and our relationship to those gifts and to God.

- Everyone is invited to select a very ordinary but "essential" object in his or her life: a car, refrigerator, bicycle, bed or a favorite article of clothing or pair of shoes.
- A special place can be set up in the home with a picture of the chosen objects for all to see.
- Every day each person can take a moment of silence while reflecting on the object and intentionally praying, "Thank you God for blessing me with this \_\_\_\_\_ and for blessing me with a grateful heart. May I use it and all your blessings to your glory this day and every day."
- Each person is asked to make note of what the experience is like and to share it as a family at the end of each week. Perhaps children can draw a picture of the experience.
- Insights from those family discussions can then be shared in as many places as possible (Bible study, Women's Walk, choir practice, etc.).

# **Grace Outreach Updates**

What can I do to help build the kingdom of Heaven on earth? Too old, too busy, too burdened with my own le can do this! problems, how can I advocate for those who struggle every day to find shelter, put food on the table, provide for their families? Just one individual in the midst of so many in crisis, what can I do to make a difference?

Actually, a lot! All together, as the Grace Church family, we really can "collaborate in realizing the kingdom of heaven on earth through seeking and serving Christ in all persons, respecting the dignity of every human, and striving for social justice and peace." Let's make it a vision we all share.

KEEPING OUR BROTHERS & SISTERS SAFE & WARM. As we appreciate all the gifts we receive, let us show our love of Jesus now by helping ABCCM provide winter clothing and blankets to our neighbors in need (Matthew 25:40) through their "Safe & Warm" Campaign.

With overnight temperatures regularly dropping below freezing, ABCCM is asking its member churches to collect winter clothing, coats, gloves, hats, and blankets through February.

ABCCM is giving these items to the people who come to its Downtown Crisis Ministry (24 Cumberland Ave.). Also, volunteers are taking the blankets and protective clothing to the homeless on the streets during Code Purple nights (less than 32 degrees).

During the last "Safe & Warm" campaign, ABCCM collected and distributed over 4,000 items.

### Let's love our neighbors now and fill the marked ABCCM box in the foyer at Grace with warm winter clothing, gloves and hats, and

FROM HAITI WITH LOVE. Every six months, Consider Haiti's community health agents in Montrouis, Fond Baptiste and Ivoire identify 55 children who are malnourished. These kids are seen monthly for weight checks, vitamins and deworming medication when needed. If a child is sick, medical care is provided. For example, last November, a little girl needed hospitalization. Consider Haiti provided extra funds to send her for care, and she is now better and back home. Additionally, Consider Haiti provides supplementary food, water filters and goats, along with training and education, not only for the children, but for entire families. In December, Consider Haiti colleagues made 89 home visits, provided 12 families with water filters and instructions as to their use, and distributed 114 goats to families. As a note, they now have a population of almost 2000 goats!

PEACE AND JUSTICE. Our world, our nation, our community, our selves. Where is peace in these spaces? How do we find it and once found, how does it become ministry that serves justice? In our baptismal creed, we are asked: "Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?" We answer: "I will, with God's help."

Today, this is not an easy commitment. Can we build peace-filled spaces within which to address poverty, violence, racism, war, divisiveness? We can, with God's help.

If you are called to the ministry of peacemaking and justice, Jesus reminds you: "You are a child of God."

# Mental Health: The Other Pandemic

"Wherever two or more are gathered, I am there with them." Matthew 18:20



THE IMPORTANCE OF CHURCH IN THE "POST (NOT POST) PANDEMIC PANDEMIC." Just google Mental Health Post Pandemic and you will see the results of many studies suggesting what we could have guessed with simple observation: the reality that the COVID pandemic has led to another pandemic which we will be recovering from for years to come. That is the pandemic of disconnection leading to real mental health crises

Humans are social creatures. Our wellbeing—physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually— is deeply dependent on our living well, together. Our wellbeing is dependent on

our care of one another and our connection to each other in sustainable and loving ways.

Yet, for almost two years, we have been told our health relies on the opposite—that in order to be safe we must be distant. And so, we have been. We have lost connections to many of our greatest coping tools. # **Learning From a Treasured Tree**

As you may already know, our Vestry had to make the sad decision recently to remove one of our beloved "Treasured Trees." The words below are reflections on that loss by Rev. Milly.

The decision to remove our Historical Treasured Tree at Grace was a difficult decision to make for our Vestry. After having invested in this beautiful tree, celebrated around it and marked it as sacred, accepting that it was indeed dead and needed to be removed, was a painful process.

And yet, we watched as it grew more and more fragile and we thought of our new roof and the potential for costly damage. We thought of the potential for falling limbs and of the children playing on the playground. And we knew, we needed to accept this death and do the responsible and hard thing; we needed to remove the Treasured Tree.

Today, the tree has been taken down. As our Junior Warden Scott McKenzie supervised the job, he kept us updated on the process. As the last of the limbs fell, he stated; "Wow, it's amazing how much brighter it is now. I hadn't noticed that the dead tree was still casting such a big shadow. The mass of it was deceiving; it is really a big change."

It can be true, that we learn to live with things that need to be removed from our spiritual lives because the mass of them can be deceiving. It is true that to accept that something is dead and then to allow that thing to be taken down, can be very, very hard. Letting go can bring up so much grief.

But, letting go makes room for new things to grow.

I am indeed sad that our Treasured Tree died. And, I am grateful that our Vestry was able to accept it and to make the right decision to protect our building and the people in it by removing the dead tree. And, now a congregant who is a master woodworker is taking the wood and will create beautiful objects that we will auction off in the months to come. That money will be used to further our mission at Grace. Perhaps you can have a piece of the Treasured Tree which has become a "new thing" to remember the power of letting go and of new growth.

I wonder what will grow now with all this new sunlight?



# **Budget Report for December 2021**

- December had \$42,772.85 of Total Income (Contributions, Building/Admin) and \$42,350.40 of total expenses, resulting in a Net Income of \$422.45.
- December pledges were \$13,771.13 higher than budgeted—Excellent!
- 2021 had \$411,718.78 of Total Income (Contributions, Building/Admin) and \$416,063.72 of total expenses, resulting in a Net Loss of \$4,344.94
- 2021 Actual performed \$21,273.87 better than budgeted. The following are factors that influenced this balance:
  - Contribution income was \$24,547.36 higher than budgeted
  - Admin income was \$9,710 higher than budgeted
  - Admin/Personnel Expense were \$20,713.76 higher than budgeted
  - Operations/Program Expenses were \$10,834.79 lower than budgeted
- December income was \$6,497 higher than November income.

We are pleased to see actual pledges exceed budget in December, resulting in a much better YTD Actual Net Income than YTD budgeted! The finance team would like to start analyzing expenses in relationship to the percentage of total income to help navigate our opportunities and provide direction for planning as we evolve in a growing church. We're looking forward to seeing how January plays out with the spending freeze and continued efforts to expand pledges and membership.
