Greetings Good People of Grace,

Wow! I said it before and I will say it again. Wow! Easter at Grace was so powerful. As I said in my sermon on the second Sunday of Easter, I woke up Easter day feeling a certain level of fear. Fear that I would not be able to do what was needed that day.

I was still in Good Friday after all, remember? How would I be able to proclaim resurrection with you all in any meaningful way? How would I do it?

But, I showed up. You showed up. The village showed up. And guess what? It happened! Easter Happened! "Alleluia anyhow," as Bishop Harris famously stated in her memoir. And as Father Mike reminded us, "We don't have time for everything to be okay before we sing out "Alleluia!" We don't have time to waste; the world needs to hear us singing "Alleluia!" now.

So, even though I was afraid I couldn't do it, <u>Easter happened</u>. And this is what I learned from it all: "I" didn't do it. That was never the plan— for "me" to do Easter—that is not how Easter works. We, the gathered community, WE do Easter. Turns out it does take a village to witness Resurrection, turns out none of us does any of this alone.

Did you know that every funeral service is an Easter service? And in every funeral service we say "Even at the Grave, we make our song, Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia."

Yes! Even at the Grave. And on Easter we cover that cross, a symbol of death, in flowers, new life, love and beauty. Because "Alleluia Anyhow." Because nothing, *nothing* is stronger than love, not even death. So we who proclaim a risen Savior; we who have gathered in His name, to walk His way; we who sing alleluia even at the Grave, we are his hands and feet now. We, who witnessed resurrection together at Grace on Easter day, we are now called out of our fears, out of our upper rooms, to be the Body of Christ. Because He has no hands and feet but ours now. And that is resurrection.

Resurrection is the moment we have the courage to leave our upper rooms and take on the work Christ has given us to do. That is when He lives among us, when we leave our fears behind, when we walk the way of love.

We don't have time to waste, the world needs to hear us sing, sing Alleluia now! Alleluia anyhow! And the world desperately needs us to leave our fears behind and have the courage to love.

Happy Eastertide. Let us pray that when the day of Pentecost comes, we find ourselves prepared to be the hands and feet of Jesus, active and alive in the world. Let us pray we are prepared to be the Body of Christ, the Church called Grace Episcopal.

Weekly Taizé, Tuesday Evenings at 6pm

WE ARE NOW OFFERING WEEKLY TAIZÉ WORSHIP! For many decades Grace Episcopal Church has offered a monthly Sunday evening Taizé styled service, and during that time, it became clear that this community desires this worship more often. And it is also clear that the world needs a refuge and a place of prayer for peace. In response to that desire, the service has moved to 6:00 p.m. every Tuesday evening.

The Taizé styled service is modeled after the renowned community founded by Brother Roger in Taizé, France. Begun in 1940 as a refuge for war torn Europe, it has grown to become a worldwide movement. These ecumenical services are known for their melodic chants and prayers. Although music forms a central part of the service, it is mixed with comforting periods of silence allowing for contemplation.

Lighted mostly by candlelight in the 100+ year old stone sanctuary of Grace Church, the vesper light of approaching evening offers a safe and nurturing space for a moment of peace in our hectic lives. Healing prayer is also offered throughout the service for oneself or on behalf of someone else.

Whether you are a regular practitioner of Taizé or are brand new to this worship style, we welcome you! Please join us on Tuesdays at 6:00 p.m. for forty-five minutes to an hour. We hope the peace you find will prepare you to offer more peace to our world.

And please share with others that our worship time is now every Tuesday at 6:00 p.m.


PURLS OF GRACE PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY. YARN! YARN!

Stewardship as a Way of Life

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT—AN ALTERNATIVE TO SHOPPING. Stewardship implies the management of all of our resources for the benefit of all, not just for our personal gain or for our family's well-being.

A resource to help us exists in a concept created by two friends, Rebecca and Liesl, in the Pacific Northwest. Enjoying the beach there with their children, they began to notice the types of plastics of all kinds littering the beach. They realized this plastic pollution came from homes, cars and yards and had washed down from watersheds. Rebecca and Liesl wanted to limit

these plastics. What emerged from their thinking was a concept of "buying less and sharing more."

Their idea became a movement called "Buy Nothing." It now has over five million members in over 44 countries. Interestingly, its primary focus is not first and foremost financial or ecological. Its primary goal is building community within neighborhoods and small geographic regions.

"Buy Nothing" provides an avenue for connecting people who have a need for something with people who want to let go of something. Money is not exchanged; instead, the mindset is one of abundance, not scarcity.

The program works via posts that let others know about your need or something you're ready to let go of. People in your area can then respond and make arrangements to exchange the items.


Relationships build and grow through these interactions and communities become stronger.

What We Need Is Here



Parker J. Palmer is an American novelist, poet, essayist, environmental activist, cultural critic, and farmer. As a member of Pendle Hill, a Quaker community of seventy people in Pennsylvania, he espoused that what we need is here, if we can learn to trust and draw upon the abundance within us and between us.

In 1975, my wife, our three children and I moved to Pendle Hill, a Quaker community of some seventy people near Philadelphia. Founded in 1930, and still going strong, Pendle Hill's cash crop is residential adult education done amid a daily round of communal life — shared meals, physical work, study, social action, silent meeting for worship, watching out for each other, and laughter, lots of laughter.

I lived and worked at Pendle Hill for ten years, slowly learning that Wendell Berry is right. What we need is here, if we can learn to trust and draw upon the abundance within us and between us. That was a principle worth knowing in a Quaker community where we didn't have a lot of money to buy external solutions our problems, but we had each other. It's a principle we need to know in these troubled times, as many embrace the fear-ridden fiction that "what we need is gone."

Scarcity need not be the law of life — not if we know how to tap into the endless resources of self and community. If you already understand that simple truth, may you and your tribe increase! It took a profound challenge to my sense of self and world to teach me about the abundance within my reach. Read the entire article.

The Wild Geese

By Wendell Berry

Horseback on Sunday morning, harvest over, we taste persimmon and wild grape, sharp sweet of summer's end. In time's maze over fall fields, we name names that went west from here, names that rest on graves. We open a persimmon seed to find the tree that stands in promise, pale, in the seed's marrow. Geese appear high over us, pass, and the sky closes. Abandon, as in love or sleep, holds them to their way, clear, in the ancient faith: what we need is here. And we pray, not for new earth or heaven, but to be quiet in heart, and in eye clear. What we need is here.



Budget Report for March 2022

- ♦ \$37,480.66 of Total Income (Contributions, Building/Admin) and \$36,910.88 of total expenses, resulting in a Net Income of \$569.78.
- Contributions were up 38% from last month (\$36,018.91 from \$22,740.20).
- ◆ YTD \$119,436.70 of Total Income (Contributions, Building/Admin) and \$106,015.10 of total expenses, resulting in a Net Income of \$13,421.60.

Endowment valuation is up \$5.6k from last month (\$695,436.79 from \$689,745.55).

The contributions for March improved to budget level and we are hopeful that this positive trend will continue. We look forward to seeing the donations of pledged income continue to rise. Please keep in mind that if all pledging members increased their contributions by \$ 1.00 a day, the result would be that contributions would more consistently meet or exceed budget.

PALM SUNDAY. The weather was beautiful! We gathered in front of the church and processed into the Sanctuary singing and waving palms.


















