Message from Rev. Milly


Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, Welcome to the Summer/ Ordinary Time edition of TEAM! In this edition we hope to give you all the good information you'll need to participate in the life of Grace Episcopal Church. And as always, you will receive regular Friday updates through email, as well.

The time between Pentecost and Advent in the seasons of the Church is what we call Ordinary Time. I've always thought that was a funny thing to call our longest season of the church. Ordinary has such a benign and neutral tone to it. "Eh, it was an ordinary day." "That meal was just ordinary." The word ordinary denotes something to lack uniqueness, to be anything but special, to be just simply common. The word Ordinary comes from the Latin root "Ordo", meaning ordered. So, the time between Pentecost and Advent is a season that is ordered not by feasts (Christmas or Easter) or by penance (Lent and Advent). These ordered days pass, with the observance not of feast or famine, but of our daily living out of the gospel call to love. And while we call this Ordinary Time, there is nothing at all ordinary about being loving every day. In fact, while there is no feast day or day of penance within these months of our calendar, it may be the most important season there is! It is during Ordinary Time, following Pentecost that we, followers of Jesus are deeply committed to our own spiritual maturation and development of the gifts that the Holy Spirit has given us. It is the

time we are called to focus on our mission in the world. It is this time, undistracted by feasts and holidays and celebrations or by fasting, that we are invited to focus, really focus, on simply being followers of Christ every day.

So, as we move more deeply into this season, I invite you to find a practice of prayer, reflection and action that allows you to come to know how to live out your gifts even more profoundly day to day. Perhaps by taking part in our August Formation offering with Justin Goldstein or joining pastoral care or outreach or offering your gifts to the work of fellowship and receptions at Grace. Perhaps by finding a spiritual director and discerning your gifts with a trained mentor, or with a daily practice of writing or painting or singing to experience the Holy Spirit's indwelling presence more

fully in your life, and of course through service. There is no better way to come to know yourself and your God than to serve others.

The invitation of this season we find ourselves in is one of deepening, maturing, and growing. And in that invitation is the joy and tenderness of new life found in the Spirit. Good Days and Bad Days: An exploration into Ecclesiastes with Rabbi Justin Goldstein

The ancient Jewish Sages questioned why the Book of Ecclesiastes was included in the Hebrew Bible. Looking into its wisdom and paradox, we can see that it is a different sort of message than other Scripture usually provides. What can we learn

from traditional Jewish understandings of this biblical book for our lives today, and how can we find relevance and meaning in its complex and contradictory ideas? Whether you're intimately familiar or freshly new to Ecclesiastes, you're sure to never look at this text the same again.

WELCOME RABBI JUSTIN GOLDSTEIN TO GRACE

EPISCOPAL CHURCH! Born and raised near Chicago, Justin's interest in Jewish wisdom began around age 12. After studying ancient history, archaeology, anthropology, and literature at Hampshire College, Justin began learning traditional Jewish texts and became ordained as a rabbi in 2011. During his time serving congregations in Bangor, ME, and Asheville, NC, Justin developed a reputation as a dynamic teacher and speaker, being selected as one of the most inspiring rabbis of 2016 by "The Forward." As a "Rabbis Without Borders" fellow, Justin believes all expressions of Jewish identity are authentic and valuable. Published in numerous books,



articles, and websites, Justin has been teaching about the intersections of Jewish wisdom, environmental stewardship, and ancestral agricultural wisdom for over 20 years. Justin left the rabbinate in 2020 to help create "Yesod Farm+Kitchen" and fulfill his lifelong of becoming a farmer.

ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE MEETING. Your Endowment Committee has scheduled a quarterly meeting for the week of Monday, July 11, 5:30 p.m. at Grace (Edwards library). Your committee members, Anne Jarema, John Chastain, Gael Paschall and Steve Birkhofer, welcome any interested parishioners who would like to be in attendance. Please notify Steve Birkhofer in advance of your interest to attend.

The Committee's agenda will likely include:

- Limited market and investment performance review. Mr. Charles Thompson of Parsec Financial will lead the in-person update.
- Review of the minutes from the April meeting.
- Review of available funds for calendar 2022 and 23. Consideration of funding needs in the coming year, including playground capital. Added review focus on general turbulence across the investment market land-scape with consideration of need to rebalance.
- Abbreviated review of the By-Laws regarding the allowable and required uses of the endowment funds.
- Continued discussion regarding a re-energized Planned Giving program.
- Committee vacancy discussion.

Grace Goes Solar!

With an outlook for our children and grandchildren and to help preserve God's creation, Grace is installing solar panels on the new roof this year. We have our installer, picked from three local and well recommended firms. Sugar Hollow Solar has already helped us already get the commitment of the <u>Duke Energy rebate of \$15,000</u>, to be received after installation anticipated in September. With contributions, pledges, and a borrowing of \$15,000 from the Capital Reserve (to be repaid from Duke rebate), we are still seeking \$8,000.

Besides <u>lessening our dependence on fossil fuel</u>, going solar will <u>lessen our Duke</u> <u>Energy cost</u> every year, providing more funds for operation. By going solar this year, we also assure ourselves of the Duke Rebate, and we will be <u>grandfathered for the</u> <u>current net metering credit formula (poised to change to one that is less advanta-</u> <u>geous after 2022).</u>

The solar panels will be on the side of the kitchen and parish hall. They will be <u>a</u> positive reflection on Grace for all to see.

We only need \$8,000 more for this wonderful project. Whatever you can contribute now or pledge to contribute by September will be greatly appreciated.

Poor People's March on DC Kim Hayes/Tahani Sticpewich

FORWARD TOGETHER! **NOT ONE STEP BACK!**

OUR JOURNEY TO WASHINGTON, DC. Friday, June 18, Kim Hayes and Tahani Sticpewish boarded a midnight bus headed for the Poor People's March on Washington, DC. It was hard to know what to expect as, in a sleep-deprived daze, we stumbled out eight hours later into a bright, breezy, cool morning at 8:30 a.m. just steps from the Mall and a growing gathering of people from literally every corner of this country. As we worked our way up toward the main stage, the Capitol Building in the background, we could feel the masses surging behind us. There were signs from every state. Groups congregated advocating all the many causes: health care, living wages, voter suppression, reproductive rights, mental health care, veterans, affordable housing, gun control, military spending—all causes addressed by the stories of real people. They stood before us, one by one, all colors, races,

tribes, genders. They sang. Their voices trembled with emotion. They had the courage to bare their souls to over **WHAT WE CAN DO**: 100,000 people and to over a million watching online, all standing with them in unity.

It lasted almost five hours. We stood there mesmerized by what we were hearing, and we came home

> changed and wanting to do something that would make a difference for the people right here in our community who are too often unheard and uncared-for. The theme for the Poor People's March was "We Won't Be Silent Anymore" and we came home not wanting to be silent any more. We, in partnership with our companions on the journey, spent time thinking about our next steps. There is action we can take.

- Learn about our candidates and vote this fall; urge everyone you know to do the same.
- Educate yourself; the Episcopal Public Policy Network (EPPN) is a great resource for learning more about what our national Church is advocating (see p. 10)
- Take action. Call or write letters to elected officials. Let them know what you think. Sign up for EPPN "Action Alerts."
- Protest. March. Care about the people around you.
- Pray. Love. Pray. Love.

The trip was exhausting. We are still processing everything but look forward to talking more about the experience. And talking about it, we pray, is just the beginning. There's work to be done. This march and

CONNECTION, EDUCATION, ACTION. The <u>Episcopal Public Policy Network, (EPPN)</u> is a grassroots effort of the Episcopal Church's <u>Office of Government Relations</u> to educate, equip and engage individual Episcopalians in federal public policy advocacy. It is guided by the resolutions of the General Convention and the Executive Council</u>. Policy areas include Creation Care • Racial Reconciliation • Ending Poverty • Migration, Refugees and Immigration • Human Rights and Peacebuilding.

In today's world, news is a click away 24/7. We hear, see and read disturbing things every day but are uncertain about how to react.

But the news is not all bad! On a national level, our Episcopal Church *is* responding, challenging and engaging lawmakers, and we, as Episcopalians, are invited to join the conversation. "Action Alerts" from EPPN give us the information we need and the opportunity we've been looking for to add our voices to communications that go directly to members of Congress. A pre-prepared email is available as well as space for adding personal comments.

To sign up for EPPN Action Alerts that come to your personal email AND to receive a unique code to listen in on a fastpaced, 30-minute Zoom call every Thursday at 1:00 p.m. ("Congress Weekly"), simply <u>register here</u> as an EPPN network member.

URGE CONGRESS TO GUARANTEE REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS. The recent Dobbs v. Jackson Women's

Health Supreme Court decision eliminated federal protection for the right to abortion. The Dobbs ruling gives states the power to outlaw abortion at every stage of pregnancy. This decision effectively means that abortion will be illegal and inaccessible in many states throughout the country. Congress must act to provide a right to abortion care in federal statute.

GIVE DACA RECIPIENTS A PATHWAY TO LEGAL STATUS. On July 16, 2021, the United States District Court for the Southern District of Texas issued a ruling stating that the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) policy was unlawful. The Department of Justice has filed an appeal to the Texas court ruling in the Fifth Circuit Court, but with the outcome of the case unclear, DACA recipients are once again in a state of anxiety and uncertainty about their future. Only Congress has the tools to provide permanent protections by passing legislation to create a pathway to legal status for Dreamers. Efforts to pass protections for DACA recipients and Dreamers have stalled in the Senate.

PASS AMBITIOUS CLIMATE CHANGE LEGISLATION. The Episcopal Church and other advocates are continuing to urge Congress to pass legislation that will address many of the nation's most essential needs. We call on Congress to pass legislation to dramatically reduce emissions, establish a clean energy standard, and invest in communities that are already most impacted by climate change.

Also, the EPPN Alerts let us know about timely programming. Here is a recent example:

<u>A Closer Look with OGR: Gun Violence Prevention</u>: During this 1-hour call, EPPN, a part of the Office of Government Relations, hosts speakers from the Prevention Institute who will be providing information about ongoing gun violence prevention efforts at the local and federal levels. A recording has been made available for later viewing.



STEWARDSHIP SURVEY RESULTS ARE TABULATED! Thank you for your responses to our survey. We received 36 paper responses and 10 electronic via Survey-Monkey. Your feedback was very helpful in preparing for the fall campaign and we are putting into action your suggestions for how to make the 2022-2023 campaign better!

Most people thought the amount of communication from the Stewardship Committee was just right and most people preferred electronic communication or through the bulletin (which is both paper and electronic). This year we will give folks a way to opt out of receiving a mailed stewardship letter and pledge card.

About a third of the respondents were interested in an educational/social event with a financial focus. Another 10% might be interested, so we are exploring having an event this fall.

We particularly appreciated hearing what inspires people to give to Grace:

- Gratitude to God: 54%,
- Valuing the beauty of the church and wanting it to continue as a church: 41%,
- Grace's mission to parishioners and the community: 59%,
- I've always given: 26%
- Other: "Share God's gifts", "understanding that pledges pay the bills", "guilt from tithing lessons in childhood", "it's a good habit", "tithe", "see a need, fill a need".

About half the respondents were interested in more information about how pledges are used. Almost every respondent valued the regular updates about the progress toward the goals of the campaign.

Budget Report for May 2022

- \$38,859.01 of Total Income (Contributions, Building/Admin) and \$38,662.36 of total expenses, resulting in a Net Income of \$196.65.
- Contributions were down 19% from last month (\$37,787.28 from \$46,922.31).
- YTD \$206,253.82 of Total Income (Contributions, Building/Admin) and \$179,042.47 of total expenses, resulting in a Net Income of \$27,211.35.
- Endowment valuation is down \$114k from last month (\$654,969.87 from \$769,403.69).

We're anticipating monthly summer expenses to hover around \$30-\$35k based on prior months. Expected Contributions each month should meet or exceed \$30-\$35k as we continue to build a healthy cash balance. We encourage members to increase their contributions by just \$1 a day to help meet or exceed budget.
