## Reflections from Fr. Mike

Dear Grace Family,

On August 15th, I celebrated my one year anniversary as the new Associate Rector at Grace. The milestone has given me an opportunity to reflect on my time with you all thus far, and goals for our future together.

While I've been struck by myriad memories and learnings, I keep being brought back to one axiom that was often repeated during seminary. In the midst of an education that was far often theoretical rather than practical, this one statement was repeated enough times for me to remember it several years later. The advice went like this—don't change anything in your first year at a new church. These words are meant to act as a regulator for the intrepid priest who dives head first into a new job, full of ideas, and perhaps full of an unchecked sense of ego. It's not terrible advice; it's wise to observe, to sit, to listen, and to discern before enacting (or suggesting) changes. The problem is that it's not really possible in practice. Our

lives and our institutions are constantly in some state of flux. And frankly, they should be.

This year has been full of changes and "firsts" for me. I have officiated my first church wedding, my first funeral, assisted in baptisms and confirmations, and preached the first Christmas Eve and Easter services of my still green career. We've led and facilitated groups and committees together, held countless forums, and laughed and shared wisdom in Bible studies. And in the course of each of these things, I've changed. I hope that you've changed, too. I pray that our church has changed. I have felt the love and grace you have all shown me in my first year of ministry here. You have shepherded me through many firsts, with kind and patient hearts. For that I offer you my deepest thanks. Here's to many more firsts, and many more changes in our ministry together.



# My summer in a nutshell



## From Our Senior Warden

CALLING ALL POTENTIAL VESTRY PEOPLE! It's getting close to that time of year where we need to elect a new slate of Vestry Members to replace the incredible ones who are rotating off. So, for those of you who aren't sure what I'm talking about, here's some helpful info:

What is a Vestry? According to Google, a Vestry is "A room or building attached to a church, used as an office and for changing into vestments." So are we losing three rooms, you ask??!! No, that's silly, because another definition is "A meeting of parishioners, for the conduct of parochial business." Whew! That makes more sense (not really). ## You Know, the Church that Does the Pumpkins

THE PUMPKIN PATCH TRADITION. How do you direct people to Grace Church? Red doors? Stone church on the hill? Or maybe you say, "You know, it's the church that does the Pumpkin Patch," and you see the light come on. People know exactly what you're talking about. The Grace Pumpkin Patch is a community tradition. Some of our members and neighbors have literally grown up with this annual fundraiser for Consider Haiti.

This year, beginning when the big truck rolls in on Sunday afternoon, September 25, and continuing through the month of October, the Pumpkin Patch tradition comes alive once again! Volunteers gather to unload the pumpkins—and yes, come prepared for some sweaty, dusty, heavy lifting—but with enough able-bodied helpers and plenty of wagons and wheelbarrows, the job goes fast. We unofficially broke the Grace unloading record last year, and the plan is to do it again this time.

Next, with a front yard full of pumpkins and gourds of every size, color and shape, it's time to sell some pumpkins! Shoppers will actually start showing up while you're still unloading! And they keep coming. You meet some of the most interesting people. Lots of children with their parents and grandparents. People who want to know more about Grace and Consider Haiti. People who have bought their pumpkins at Grace for years and those who stop by for the first time. Tons of people with cameras. If you're "tending the Patch," you meet them all. And of course, there's an important reason for all this pumpkin business. Every penny we net (last year it was a whopping \$13,683) goes to Consider Haiti and the work they do providing medicine and supplemental food, medical attention as needed, clean water filters, and of course, goats for sustainable nutrition to children and their families in Montrouis, Fond Baptist, and Ivoire, Haiti.

As most of you know, the Patch is our single biggest fundraiser of the year and all proceeds go to our programs in Haiti. Again – thank you for your continued support! **About Our Pumpkins** 



#### FROM FARM TO TRUCK TO

CHURCH! Have you ever wondered where all those pumpkins come from?

• The pumpkins (43,000 pounds of them last year!) are grown, harvested and shipped by a family-owned, 75-year

-old organization called "Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers." Originally, they were grown right here in North Carolina, but after suffering damages during Hurricane Hugo, the farming operation was relocated to the Navajo Indian Reservation in Farmington, New Mexico. In cooperation with the Navajo Nation, the organization grows 1,200 acres or approximately 2 square miles of pumpkins and employs over 700 Native American workers during the harvest months of September and October. They also have a full-time off-season New Mexico staff comprised entirely of Native Americans. Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers offices are still located in Greensboro, North Carolina.

- There is no financial risk to Grace Church and Consider Haiti. A profit is guaranteed! The pumpkins come to us on consignment, no upfront costs, no product to pay for. We are not responsible for any unsold pumpkins. Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers absorbs any loss due to spoilage, breakage or theft and in return, they receive a percentage of what we sell. As they put it: "It's a wonderful partnership of trust!"
- Pumpkin pricing is pre-set by Pumpkin Patch Fundraisers. The more pumpkins we sell, the bigger our percentage of sales becomes. Last year, we sold a total of \$34,207.83 worth of pumpkins. Consider Haiti netted 40% of that amount—a record-setting \$13,683.13!
- Grace Church receives no part of the proceeds from the Pumpkin Patch. The entire amount supports the work being done by Consider Haiti, a local organization that Grace has proudly partnered with for approximately fifteen years. The Pumpkin Patch is Consider Haiti's biggest fundraiser of the year.

## "Democracy May Not Exist . . .



BUT WE'LL MISS IT WHEN IT'S GONE" is the title of an intriguing book by Astra Taylor, and it seemed so appropriate, we couldn't help borrowing it for the title of this upcoming adult forum at Grace.

This past June, when Tahani Sticpewich and Kim Hayes participated in the **Poor People's March on Washington**, their goal was to distill what they learned and bring something home to share with *everyone*. You've probably already heard little bits and pieces about the long bus ride, the amazing crowds, the great speakers and music—but what you haven't heard much about is **what that march really wanted to say to Americans**, **us included**. "Democracy May Not Exist But We'll Miss It When It's Gone," is that story, and we want to share it with you. Then, we invite you to consider your own stories.

What are your personal voting experiences? Do you know your candidates and what their core goals are? Do you know how to talk to people about voting? Do you have a story about voting? How do you think Jesus would vote? What does it mean to "Vote Faithfully"? What does it mean to you when Bishop Curry says:

"It is a Christian obligation to vote, and more than that, it is the church's responsibility to help get souls to the polls."


Death & Dying Conference, November 5-6


INTRODUCING MALLORY McDUFF. Mallory discovered the field of Environmental Education as a Peace Corps volunteer in the Central African Republic, where she saw the critical importance of integrating local communities in conservation. Growing up in Fairhope, Alabama, she watched her parents connect their spiritual beliefs to environmental stewardship by actions such as giving up driving and even trash for Lent. Mallory is the author of three books examining the intersection of spirituality and the climate crisis: *Natural Saints* (OUP, 2010), *Sacred Acts* (New Society Press, 2012) and *Our Last Best Act* (Broadleaf Books, 2021). OUR LAST BEST ACT. As we begin to contemplate death and to embark on practical planning for life's end,

many of us long to leave a legacy beyond a transfer of money and property—one that ensures a sustainable earth for our loved ones, our communities, and generations to come. But where do we even begin?

With the sudden deaths of both of her parents, Mallory McDuff found herself in a similar position. Utterly unprepared both emotionally and practically, she began to research sustainable practices around death and dying, determined to honor their commitment to caring for the earth. For McDuff, an educator and environmentalist, what started as a highly personal endeavor expanded into a yearlong exploration and assessment of green burials, aquamation, green cemeteries, home funerals, and human composting.

In *Our Last Best Act*, McDuff bridges the gap between environmental action and religious faith by demonstrating that when the two are combined, they become a powerful force for the greater good. Full of practical information and support, this book equips readers to make decisions for their own end-of-life planning.



In a world experiencing a climate crisis and a culture that avoids discussions about death and dying, this book opens the conversation about the choices we make--and how it's possible for our death to honor our values, create a sustainable legacy, and help to heal the earth.

COMMUNITY PARTNERS BREAKFAST. Grace Church has launched a new program, in cooperation with agencies and providers in Asheville, for providing more comprehensive support for the homeless, elderly and poor who need food, clothing, shelter, health care and legal assistance. The goal of the cooperative program is to collectively advocate, educate and address both the root causes and social justice needed for meeting the growing needs in the Asheville community.

Currently, grant proposals are be accepted from both current and new community outreach organizations. 

OVERVIEW: SEPTEMBER THROUGH NOVEMBER, 2022. September, October and November budgets each consist of the following: \$37,430.62 of Total Income (Contributions, Building/Admin) and \$39,248.21 of total expenses, resulting in a Net Loss (deficit) of \$1,817.59.

Endowment valuation will continue to fluctuate given the negative economic growth January-June. We will likely see a late year rally given a favorable outcome in the Fall election. Discussions with Parsec will continue into the coming months.
